A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR ANDY

THE PROBLEM OF PAIN - LESSONS FROM THE GRIDIRON

I've been considering the problem of pain a lot lately. No, not because my knees hurt almost constantly (they do), but because it comes up a lot when thinking theologically about heaven, hell, and the afterlife. The problem can be simply stated like this: *How can a perfectly good God allow such pain and suffering in the world?* This is an age-old question that cannot be adequately answered in numerous volumes, let alone a newsletter article! But I pray some of what I share will encourage you.

One of the most helpful ways I've found of approaching the problem of pain (known as a *theodicy*) is to see the potential for evil, pain, and suffering as the necessary optimal conditions for moral and spiritual formation. This type of philosophical thought is referred to as the *soul-making theodicy*. In other words, a perfectly loving world where pain and evil and suffering are absent, would not produce the kind of person that God created us to be. To be conformed to the image of Christ (the end goal of moral and spiritual formation) we not only need free will to choose what is good and right, but we need to experience the possibility and even likelihood of adversity through pain and suffering. I can't say for sure if that is true, although I think it is entirely plausible, but I know that I don't want to hear it! I spend so much of my life trying to avoid pain and suffering!

But is that entirely true? Many of you know that I am an assistant coach on my son's high school football team. Our head coach said something recently that I found to be true. "Pain is inevitable. You get to choose between the pain of discipline and the pain of losing." It got me thinking that we do choose to endure pain for a greater purpose. When we have a reasonable assurance that the pain of our discipline will yield the kind of fruit we want, we are inclined to make that sacrifice. I've also heard it said that you stay stuck until the pain of staying the same outweighs the pain of change. Pain is inevitable, but by God's grace we get to choose what pain we endure.

But again, that isn't completely true either. Another football example: in back-to-back weeks, our team experienced the elation of a close, come-from-behind victory, and the devastation of a close, come-from-behind loss. In a matter of 7 days we ran the gamut of competitive sports emotions. To make matters worse, we felt our loss was the result of two significant unjust calls. (It's always the officials' fault, right? Just kidding!). We were suffering pain that we didn't bring upon ourselves.

Many things happen to us that we do not bring upon ourselves. Sometimes we experience pain and suffering that we don't choose, and we cannot avoid. But even then, God can use that pain for greater purposes. Although I don't attribute pain and suffering to God's intention, I do believe in his sovereignty to allow a world where pain and suffering exist because it provides the optimal opportunity for us to experience the greatest of end-goals – conformity to the image of Jesus. If you are experiencing pain and suffering remember to trust God – for we know that *in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose.* (Romans 8:28)

2024 CONVENING GENERAL CONFERENCE – GLOBAL METHODIST CHURCH

I was so privileged to be elected as a lay delegate to the convening General Conference of the Global Methodist Church, in San Jose, Costa Rica, which was held September 20 - 26, 2024. It was historic, exciting, encouraging, and Holy Spirit-filled. I served on the Finance & Admin Legislative Committee, helping craft that legislation for presentation to the entire body for ratification. Many committees came together to present the work of their committees for approval for inclusion in the new Book of Doctrines and Discipline, which as of the end of General Conference, is no longer provisional, but final until revised further at the next General Conference to be held in Central Africa in the fall of 2026. After that, the General Conference will be held every six years.

Each day had inspiring music and preaching services, with many in tears due to the miracles seen and the working of the Holy Spirit. It was a dream come true to watch God work in and through the delegates. The global nature of the church was on full display, with delegates from all over the world attending and voting. Those that could not get visas in a timely manner were present on zoom, and their voices and votes were counted. The fellowship was wonderful, an indication of what heaven will be like. I came away with a much deeper love for the Lord, the Global Methodist Church, and faith in the power of God. The fact that the conference came together quickly with so much unity, and the immediate growth of the Global Methodist Church was a testimony to the grace, power and presence of God. As was mentioned many times, the transition and disaffiliation process was not easy, but God never left us, and we are reaping the blessings of our convictions and obedience.

Highlights included:

- Six new part-time Bishops elected.
- Global Methodist Church Constitution ratified.
- General Church Committees established and members elected.
- Meeting and fellowship with the Methodist Church of Costa Rica. An offering was taken, and \$18K was raised for their mission and ministry.
- Meeting, fellowship, and hospitality at the Methodist School (K-12) of Costa Rica.
- Stories shared of what God is doing world-wide in the Global Methodist Church.
- Continuous prayer at the conference and world-wide during the conference by church members everywhere.
- New mission statement and vision statement approved.
- Presiding Elder title changed to Conference Superintendent. Our Great Lakes Conference Superintendent is Dr. Scott Pattison, covering Illinois, Indiana, Wisconsin, and Michigan.

God is on the move! The Holy Spirit is alive and well in the Global Methodist Church. Be encouraged! You are part of a wonderful Wesleyan “movement” that will change the world and populate heaven. People are finding Jesus in this new church, and we want to pray for all the new churches being planted and birthed by the excitement and the power of the Holy Spirit. 
GRIEFSHARE - “SURVIVING THE HOLIDAYS”

SHARE THANKSGIVING 2024

Share Thanksgiving is a great opportunity for each of us to help others in our community share in a traditional Thanksgiving meal. By donating a full meal, or one or more meal components, you will assist those who are not able to purchase these holiday foods on their own.

FIRST STEP

On Nov. 3, 10, and 17, you can sign up to bring an entire meal, or one or more meal components listed below by filling out a sign-up form which will be distributed each week. On Sunday, November 24, all items need to be brought to church. We will compile meals for delivery that morning.

Meal Components: turkey (frozen), rolls and stuffing, vegetables and sides, dessert, and drinks

WHAT DO I BRING?

The idea is that you bring items that you enjoy cooking for your own Thanksgiving meal. If you usually make pumpkin pie for dessert, we suggest a can of pumpkin pie mix (including the spices), a pie crust mix, and cool whip or dream whip. Some of you have used your creativity to include a favorite casserole recipe with all the ingredients as a side dish.

SUGGESTIONS & IDEAS

- *Vegetables/Side Dishes:* potatoes (fresh bag of potatoes or boxed instant mashed potatoes), gravy, canned vegetables, canned yams, your favorite recipe with ingredients (green bean casserole, candied yams, etc.)
- *Desserts:* pie mix, crust mix, cool whip, cookies, cake mix, your favorite recipe with ingredients

OUT OF TOWN?

Will you be out of town the Sunday before Thanksgiving? You can still arrange to get your items to the church by dropping them off during office hours the week prior. We do ask that you carefully label your items with your name and whatever meal components you are providing.

HOW MANY PEOPLE PER MEAL?

While it is difficult to predict the sizes of the families for whom items will be provided, we ask that you bring enough to feed a family of four. We can make adjustments as we compile the meals, if needed.

HOW CAN I HELP?

- Be a deliverer! Deliverers head off in their own vehicle with addresses in hand, and we have maps of Troy available if needed. We also have instructions should you not reach someone at home.
- Bring in meal components or an entire meal
- Pray for the families receiving meals




INCREDIBLE IMPACT: SHOE DRIVE SUCCESS!


