For the year, we have received \$126,450, which averages \$15,806 per month. This is well over what was budgeted. Some of our expenses are slightly over what was budgeted, but many areas are much lower. We have a healthy balance in our checking account, and all apportionments are paid to date.

The Future Glory Challenge is going well. We have \$55,367 in pledges and gifts, so we are close to meeting the challenge. It would not take many more gifts or pledges to take us to the top. Thanks to everyone for your response.

Thanks also to Kevin and all who helped with the new sign, and to all those who are constantly volunteering and working around the church. What a great church family we have!

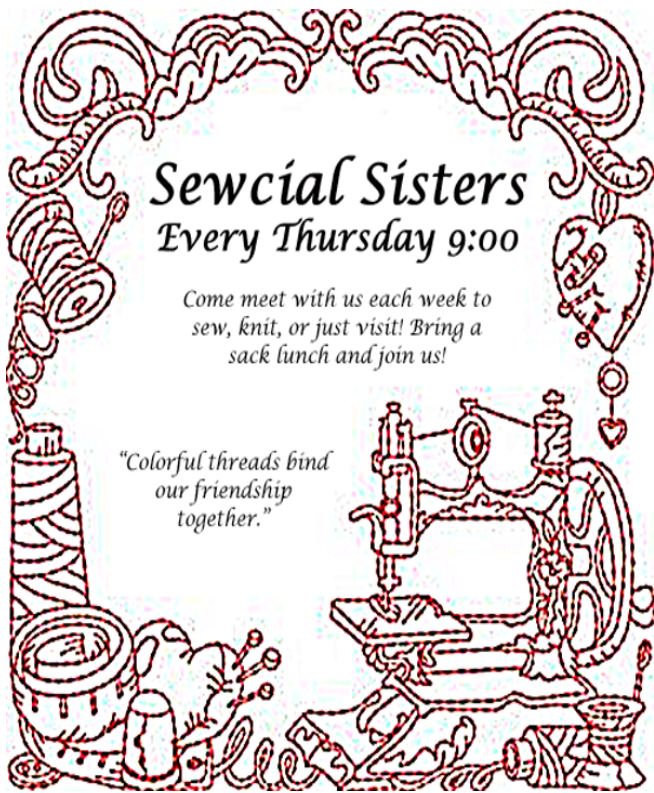

Figit quilts are little (18x20) lap quilts with items attached that patients can play with, feel, zip, button, etc. They are basically a busy box for adults.

These are fascinating to these patients and it will keep their attention for hours. They are much needed. So, we thought the congregation could help us by supplying some of the items we use to sew on the quilts.

Here is a list of things that may be around your own house:

Ribbon (all kinds and colors), buttons (as large or larger than a quarter), beads (any kind any color), zippers, Velcro, fabric scraps that have a texture or are very soft, metal rings, key rings, old keys, pockets cut off blue jeans (with some fabric to spare around the pocket), zippered notebook pencil holders with clear plastic windows, shoe laces, stuffed toys from McDonalds , jingle bells, buckles that connect on a strap, neckties, beanie babies, ponytail holders, barrettes, stickers, embroidered patches, etc.

The beautiful soul of Earl Warren Waddell was welcomed into heaven on July 9, 2021. A celebration of life memorial service was held on Saturday August 14, 2021 at Midway Locust Grove UMC, with internment at the church cemetery. A luncheon was provided.

Earl was born on April 14, 1956 in St. Louis, Missouri to Charles Earl and Gracie Mae Waddell. The family moved to St. Charles, Missouri where Earl grew up. He attended Francis Howell High School in Weldon Springs, MO, graduating in 1974.

Earl went on to attend the University of Missouri in Columbia, where he graduated with a double degree in Horticulture. After graduating college, Earl continued to call Columbia his home. He found a spiritual home at Midway Locust Grove United Methodist Church, where he also became a choir member. He departed his earthly home for eter-



nity in the heavenly home Jesus prepared for him.

Earl had many interests. While growing up he obtained Eagle Scout rank, played trombone in Francis Howell High School bands and developed his love of music and plants. He worked at Total Environments Nursery for many years, until it closed. His knowledge of plants and landscaping was eagerly shared with all, from customers to friends and family, earning him much respect as a sought-after expert.

In addition, Earl was a student of all things nature and history. He enjoyed writing poetry and shared them with many, some written specifically for individuals. His passion for dogs led to him having many pets over the years.

Earl is survived by his mother, Gracie Mae (Watson) Waddell, sister Barbara (Joe) Boillot, sister Janet Hood, brother Robert Waddell and sister Gloria (David) Miller. He is also survived by niece, Mindy (Ryan) Earley, nephew Charles (Shelby) Miller and niece Lynnea Waddell and three great nephews Jack, Zachary and Liam Earley. In addition, many cousins, aunts and uncles survive him. Earl's father, Charles Waddell preceded him in death.

To Earl

“And the Lord God planted a garden in Eden, in the east, and there he put the man whom he had formed....to till it and keep it.” Genesis 2: 8, 15.

During this extraordinarily challenging year, many of us have lost family and friends. Every one of those lives leaves behind a legacy: an enduring impact. Earl Warren Waddell, a long-time member of this church and good friend to many, will not soon be forgotten.

Earl had a keen intellect, and had earned no less than 4 university degrees, including in business, biochemistry, forestry, and horticulture. He especially loved to learn about God’s creation, the natural world. This love of nature led to his interest in native peoples, especially the Cherokee. Earl had a big role in having part of our cemetery designated as a Northern Cherokee burial ground.

My daughter Rachel worked closely with Earl in the last 4 years of his life, landscaping at local homes. Rachel loved working with Earl. He was unfailingly patient, kind, and a wonderful mentor to her. I hired them to landscape my yard, and it has never looked better. Rachel has fond memories of pruning Earl’s beloved elderberry bushes in his garden and tasting the home-made juice he

made from them. At the end of each landscaping job, Earl chose his favorite venue to celebrate at with Rachel: Clover’s Natural Market. There they would share a snack of grape tomatoes and tangerines.

Earl had a long history with this church. He sang in the choir for years, and participated in church dramas, including the 1993 “Living Last Supper”, and also portrayed John the Baptist at another event. After all, who better to portray the rugged prophet who subsisted on wild honey? Earl also enthusiastically participated in church pot-luck suppers, always bringing a plant-based casserole from produce grown in his abundant garden. And he always brought friends with him – to share in the bounty. Bill and I always chose to sit at Earl’s table, because we were assured of meeting some new and interesting people.

Bill recalls Earl as always eager to help his friends, sharing his knowledge of plant care. When squash beetles were threatening Bill’s spaghetti squash, Earl patiently explained exactly how to eradicate them. It worked. Earl was unfailingly positive, never complaining or cynical. Even as he suffered back pain and other work-related ailments, he would always say, like the old Beatles song, “It’s getting better, it’s getting better all the time”. Earl was such a wonderful friend, unsparing with his support and praise. He always greeted Rachel with the words: “How are you, my fine human”. And he always introduced Bill and I as “my groovy friends”, or, “These are my groovy people”.

Earl had a great sense of humor and was a master of the corny joke. One I heard him tell recently went like this: “There was a lobster who refused to share his food. So, his friend scolded him for being so “shellfish”.

In Genesis chapter 2 we are told that God planted a garden in Eden and placed the man he had created there to till it and keep it. The garden was planted by God immediately after he had created the man, and before the creation of the first woman.

With his life’s work, Earl was following God’s original plan for man, to be a gardener.

It is hard to say goodbye to this generous, kind, fine human, and groovy friend. But my grief is eased by picturing him as he is now, tending and keeping God’s Garden. And, as Earl himself would say (and how he ended every telephone conversation with me), “Toodles, my friends!”

Twice Blessed had really good attendance during the month of August with several new faces each time we were open.

We have the following updates about getting more storage down at the Twice Blessed annex. We have received a very generous memorial donation. Also, we are in the final stages of receiving a possible grant from Veterans United.

At this time, we are trying to get a couple of construction estimates for adding on an addition (unfinished interior walls) to the existing building to be used for storage only. If these estimates are cost prohibitive, we will proceed with purchasing a 10ft x 14ft storage shed to be set on the existing adjoining concrete pad. With this additional space we will be able to move the Twice Blessed inventory now stored in the church basement down to the Twice Bless annex.

Give Back Day will be Sunday, September 19th from 2:00-5:00 PM. There will be a sign up sheet posted for 8-10 volunteers to help move Fall/Winter inventory from church to Twice Blessed, stock shelves, and move Spring/Summer inventory back to the church basement for storage.
