Small Groups

As I shared a few weeks ago, toward the end of a Sunday morning teaching, the next step in the life of our local church is establishing and launching sustainable small groups. There are many ways to go about small groups, but after meeting with a friend and colleague, Roger Ross, I think the direction and organization of our small groups has become clear.

Our short-term goal is to launch 4 small groups. Each small group will require 3 volunteers to be successful: 1 host, 1 leader, and 1 apprentice. A host is simply the person/family willing to open their home for a small group to meet. The leader is the person who will keep the meeting flowing in order and will help guide the conversations throughout the evening. The apprentice is the person who will intentionally watch and learn in preparation for the time when the small group is no longer small and births another group.

The plan is to have the 4 hosts, 4 leaders, and 4 apprentices become a small group in and of themselves for this Fall semester. I will lead this group of volunteers through the structured process of what their meetings will be like. The goal will be for the volunteers to become highly comfortable launching their groups next Spring semester. This way, no one is left to "wing it," and we can be sure that each small group is on the same page, allowing us all to move forward in the same direction.

If you are interested in hosting, leading, or apprenticing a small group, please get in touch with me in the next few days. If you are not interested in volunteering to serve in these roles, please begin to consider committing to a small group next Spring. One of the most important things to think through is which day of the week and what time of the day would best fit your schedule regarding availability to meet. Finally, let's all begin to pray over our small group ministry. Pray we are found faithful in obedience to God's leading, that new relationships are formed within our congregation, and that we all continue to grow in knowledge, wisdom, and understanding of God and God's ways.

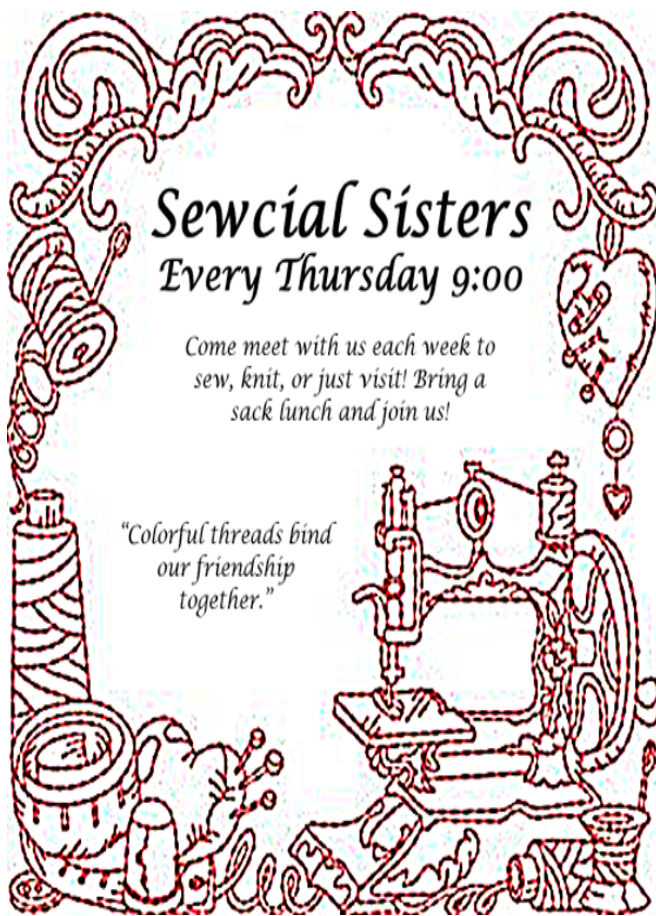
About the Gorgeous Girls!

Now we regularly have anywhere from 10 to 12 people from our church to prepare meals and visit with the 30 to 50 Hotel residents that join us each Wednesday. We are so blessed to be a part of each other's lives. The relationship is a partnership of people that deeply care for each other. We feel free to pray over the meals and those of us in need... sometimes it's a resident and other times it is a Locust Grove Church member.

We have celebrated Thanksgiving, Christmas, Easter, and now we are planning together our first year anniversary of shared Friendship Meals on August 10th.

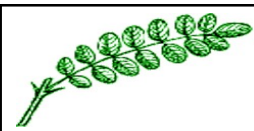

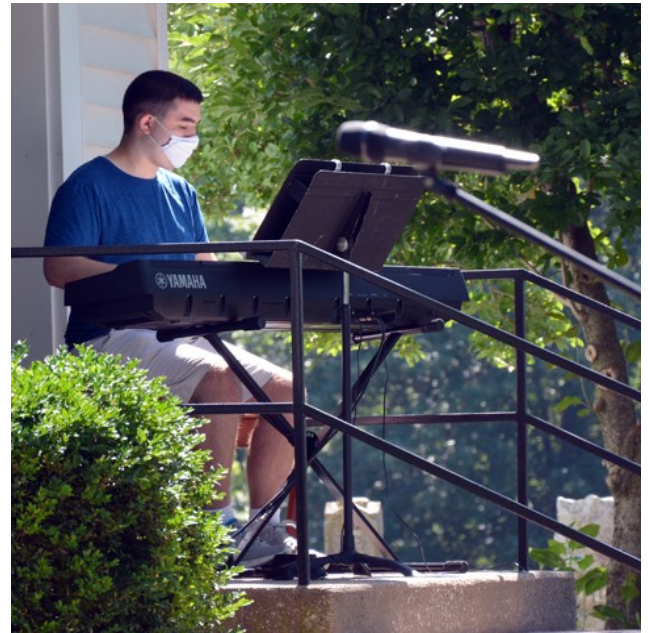

Cathey Gayle Caruthers Clark.

Editor's note: With the recent interment of Cathy's ashes in the Village of Locust Grove, we asked her mother, Mariea, to share Cathy's story with us.

My Cathey Girl.

Dates: June 11, 1973 to August 3, 2018.

The Dash.

Cathey was a hugger. She taught us how. Reminding us often.

She was always a teacher.

Cathey loved kids. One of her first jobs was taking care of them in the church nursery. Those kids now have kids of their own. Leutjen. Frink. Burkart. Others. She earned a double major at Stephens College—pre-school and early elementary. She taught at a private school in Lee's Summit, and decided that although she loved the kids the parents were just too much to handle.

She then nannied for a family. After she moved back to Columbia she nannied for the White family for several years while Pascale (Pascale's Pals) was having treatment.

She loved coloring with her nephews. Telling them about good books. One is an artist. One is an actor.

She was very interested in rescuing animals. She fostered several for Second Chance and organized their holiday picture days and delivery of photos. She also adopted several—Great Dane and two Newfoundland, six cats. Etc. A hunting dog she gave to her brother. He learned some wrestling moves from her. That red headed girl in red rubber boots.

Cathey learned to knit in 4-H. She was a 4-H camp craft director during her college years. About the time she got married a neighbor had sheep, so the next step was learning how to spin. She was an expert. Then weaving; an expert because she started with a difficult pattern and wouldn't leave mistakes in anything.

She relished crocheting hats without a pattern. The former fashion designer for the playhouse at Stephens College has several of her colorful hats.

Color—Cathey could pick up three different, random colors and she made them work together.

We demonstrated our craft at the Boone County Heritage Festival at least ten years. She loved teaching others about how cloth was made. Natural fibers—wool, silk, alpaca, etc. She loved it when the boys ran across the lawn to see what that spinning machine she used was.

I inherited her spinning wheels, weaving looms, knitting needles. Stash of fiber. Trying hard to keep them warm.

She went deer hunting with her dad. Once. She'd rather read than fish. Reading—she didn't hear anything once she started. A former pastor gave us a hint. He said find a key word that gets her attention. We did and it worked. Into adulthood. Ice Cream. Every time!

After being diagnosed with brain cancer in 2006 she started a new battle. She tried everything the doctors told her about. She fought for 12 years. She never complained. Just figured out how to function using her non-dominant hand. And loved her therapists. She never gave up.

We miss that girl/woman who is still giving us lessons. Thank God we got to raise this challenging human.

Drain beans. Mix dressing and pour over beans. Refrigerate overnight before serving.

The Back Row By Gene Baumann

Without getting political about it, I think we can agree that most of the news we hear about the various aspects of our government is negative.

Imagine my glee when I read the story below that brought a smile to my face and a warm glow to my heart.

Surely you are aware of the construction of new highway bridge over the Missouri River near Rocheport. My cynical side presumed it would be named for some influential politician from the area; then I ran across this story that MODOT had announced the naming of the bridge "The Lance Corporal Leon Deraps Interstate 70 Missouri River Bridge."

Leon was born November 13, 1986, near Jamestown, the son of a veteran mom

and a veteran Marine father. He grew up running in the soft hills and creek bottoms of the Missouri River Valley. Always obedient, he was a good student, anyone's friend, and loved by all.

He went from Cub Scout to Eagle Scout with numerous achievements along the way. He participated in many sports in school at Jamestown, was a member of FFA, and was prom king his senior year.

He pre-enlisted in the Marines while a senior in high school. Upon graduation in 2005, he left for his Marine training, which he completed in February 2006 and was deployed with members of his unit to Iraq.

He was killed Saturday, May 6, 2006, in the Al Anbar Province of Iraq, and is buried in Cedron Catholic Church Cemetery near Jamestown.

I will think of Leon and all other veterans known and unknown every time I cross the bridge in the years ahead. Thanks, MODOT.
