Both groups received a tour of the brand new home that just opened in June of this year and is located at the corner of College and Stadium. The house has 24 rooms plus a day-pass room. It has several family room areas, a large kitchen, and common facilities like laundry room, office,



outside seating and more to accommodate families who have children receiving care at many of the local hospitals in Columbia. We look forward to serving this organization again soon!



**August** is usually too hot to cook so lets make a sheet pan dinner with pork chops and veggies!

## Pork Chop Sheet Pan Dinner

1/2 lb small red potatoes, washed and cut into quarters

8 oz petite carrots

3 T olive oil, divided

1 package dry ranch dressing and seasoning mix, divided

4 bone-in center cut pork chops about 1/2 inch thick

Heat oven to 375 degrees. Coat a baking sheet with cooking spray.

In a bowl, combine potatoes, carrots and 2 T of olive oil. Add 2 T of ranch dressing mix and toss till evenly coated. Place on baking sheet.

Brush pork chops with remaining 1 T olive oil and sprinkle with remaining ranch seasoning mix. Arrange pork chops between potatoes and carrots on baking sheet.

Bake 25 minutes or until pork is no longer pink and veggies are tender.

\*Turn chops over about halfway through cooking time.

\*May substitute chicken thighs for pork chops but may need to increase baking time.

\*May also add additional veggies such as quartered onions, asparagus, etc.

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## The Back Row

### ***The Uncommon Mullein***

***One person's weed is another person's flower.***

While doing some spring weeding a dozen or so years ago, I spared one intruder whose velvet leaves reminded me of lamb's ear. Although it was just outside our front door, I thought it was nice enough to keep.. I've had one every year since, and this year's may be my best.

This simple act of mercy launched me into a search that almost became an obsession. As I described the weed to my friends with some expertise in such things, I got a variety of suggestions as to the name of this plant. None was certain enough to satisfy me, which led me to the internet, where I found a lot of information about the Common Mullein.

The plant was too impressive to be common and too pretty to be a weed, I thought, so I let it continue to grow. It reached six feet tall with a stalk of yellow blossoms. The weed has become easy to spot along Mid-Missouri roadways now that we know one intimately.

In its formative days, the weed resembles the popular lamb's ear plant's soft velvety silver-green leaves. Presumably a bird deposits the seed as no other mullein resides in the area.

Much of the mullein's beauty requires a closer look. From the center of the rosette, a stalk emerges to display yellow blossoms. As the stalk grows more blossoms form, creating a continuous display all summer into fall.

Technically known as *Verbascum thapsus* of the family *Scrophulariaceae*, the plant was brought to America by the Puritans as a medicinal herb, a use which continues today. One website offered bottles of Mullein Leaf in 30, 60 or 350 capsules ranging in price from \$6.10 to \$42.24.

The puritans made tea and ointments from the leaves as a cure for lung diseases, rheumatism, burns, rashes, and ear-aches. Today it is classified in herbal literature as an expectorant, promoting the discharge of mucus, and demulcent, soothing irritated mucous membranes.

The value of the plant goes beyond its medicinal use. The leaves once were worn in the shoes to improve circulation and as a buffer to thin soles. The soft leaves have been used by children as doll blankets, and the tall stalks were dipped in tallow and used as torches.

These uses have led to many nicknames, many more colorful than Common Mullein. It is known by the names Miner's Candle, Velvet Dock, Flannel Flower, Beggar's Blanket, Candlewick, Grandmother's Flannel, and a long list of colorful names.

I hold to my philosophy that the simpler things in life are often the best. My encounter with the Common Mullein convinces me of the validity of that outlook.
