

Our first sermon series this year, "Citizens of Heaven," will center on the Kingdom of Heaven, which Jesus inaugurated while he appeared here on Earth. We will observe Jesus' connection with Moses and how he came to fulfill the law. And we will learn how Jesus is the ultimate authority on ethics and morality, how he is our redemption, and how the road to future glory first passes through suffering.

This Epiphany season is very timely in the overall life of our church. I expect God to be found faithful in our worship services through song, scripture, and teaching. I anticipate the Holy Spirit to illuminate and connect Spiritual dots within us. And I am prayerful that God will become ever more real to us, through Jesus, by the Holy Spirit, and in our encounters with him, we will truly experience an Epiphany to remember!





Perhaps I need to use alerts on my phone as a reminder to keep the candle on and stay “online” with God!

## Dirty Rice

1 (10.5 oz) can French onion soup  
1 (10.5 oz) can beef consommé  
1 cup white rice  
1 (6 oz) jar sliced mushrooms - drained  
1/2 stick salted butter - melted

Preheat oven 400 degrees.

Combine all ingredients together in a 2 qt. casserole dish.

Cover with foil and bake for 45 minutes.

Reduce oven temperature to 350 degrees, uncover and bake for 15 minutes more

## **The Back Row** By Gene Baumann

I was browsing my Locust Leaves files to see what the January issues included in years past. I ran across this history item from the 2013 issue and thought it would be of interest to our many newer members.

A quick and general view of our church history can be summarized with a timeline. It covers many of the highlights, but leaves details to further research. Here's a timeline to give you a glimpse of our history.

1817 — "Methodist Society" organized, meeting in neighborhood homes.

1830 — Brick Chapel built.

1835 — First use of cemetery

1870 — Brick Chapel demolished and present sanctuary built. First use of Locust Grove name.

1909-1915 — Bell tower and stained glass windows installed. This included vestibule and a small classroom on each side (now AV control room and prayer room).

1915 — Hanging gasoline lamps replaced

1926 — 12 x 15 addition on north side of church for store room.

1938 — Electric lights installed.

1945 — Bell purchased for steeple.

1948 — Gas stove in kitchen.

1952 — Fellowship Hall built.

1955 — First church refrigerator.

1956 — Cistern well dug and piped to kitchen. Board walk built to outdoor toilets in rear of the sanctuary.

1963 — Midway parsonage built.

1966 — Education wing built, six classrooms.

1967 — First telephone, water heater, public water line, modern restrooms.

1976 — Two acres purchased on west side of Locust Grove Church Road across from sanctuary..

1982 — New roof, ramp built to the entrance to Fellowship Hall.

1990 — Addition to 1966 Education Wing, 8 classrooms, 3 restrooms.

1993 Computer purchased for office.

1997 Locust Grove Church Road leveled, widened and paved. Parking and cemetery road paved.
