## Carolyn Doyle to review book at Tuesday Lunch January 9

Carolyn Doyle will review a book she edited from old family letters. We asked her for a preview. She responded:

In the early 2000's, my cousin Art Draper, and his wife Dorie, rediscovered letters written in 1885-86, by our great-grandmother, Fanny McClurg Draper, to her husband Charles Clinton Draper. They were living in Lebanon, MO, where CC was cashier in a bank, and made the decision to homestead in the Dakota Territory, now South Dakota. CC was to stay in Lebanon for a couple of months, earning money to fund the enterprise, while Fanny, their six children, (ages 13 years to 18 months), her father JW McClurg and her brother Joe went on ahead and started homesteading. That winter was far more severe than the past few seasons had been, CC was delayed in joining them, and her letters to him tell of their life that hard winter, and how she missed him.


We started transcribing those letters, just for ourselves and to share with family, when we had a chance to have them published. The book, "My Ever Dear Charlie" came out in 2006, and is now out of print, although I think used copies may be available thru Amazon. At the time, I made a 1" to 1ft. scale model of the soddy they spent that winter in and will bring it to the lunch in January.

A mission which a number of our church family have participated in, Re-Member, has sent out its end of the year report. It gives an encapsulated picture of the work done on the Pine Ridge reservation with members of the Oglala Lakota tribe, and the connections and relationships made.

The projects volunteers work on are intended to improve living conditions

for families on the reservation, mainly by helping meet the basic need for adequate shelter. Here, many homes are so overcrowded that children must share beds or sleep on the floor. Others lack

running water and functional bathrooms. Wood is frequently the only source of heat. Unstable stacks of cinderblocks serve in place of stairs to reach the doors of mobile homes.

To meet such immediate, pressing needs, Re-Member volunteers build bunk beds for kids, sturdy outhouses, wooden access stairs and wheelchair ramps. They also install skirting to keep mobile homes warmer in winter and cooler in summer and, in the fall, cut, split, and deliver firewood. Some of the work is done in Re-Member's workshop, but much of it is performed on-site at homes across the Reservation.

# ON THE REZ

The volunteers who visit Re-Member to learn about the Oglala Lakota and make life better on the Pine Ridge Reservation come from a diversity of backgrounds. Most come as part of groups affiliated with high schools, colleges, churches, or other organizations, but some come by themselves or with a few friends or family members.

In 2023: 560 volunteers participated in the 30 weeks between March and October, when weather makes it possible to travel to the site and around the reservation. There were more than 150 events involving cultural immersion, a key

element of the success of the Re-Member experience. The majority of the tribe live in trailers. 190 beds were built, delivered and assembled for families usually sleeping on the floor. 28 trailers were skirted. 32 ramps were





built, usually for families with a member in a wheelchair, greatly enhancing their mobility and eliminating the need for family members to carry them in order to leave home. 73 decks and steps were built. 42 outhouses were built, holes dug and installed.

Where else in America would a family be excited to receive an outhouse in this day and age? More than 1,000 pounds of fresh produce were grown and distributed to families. 785 loads of firewood were distributed during the winter, and specified donations were used to provide emergency

electric assistance and propane assistance, paid directly to utility companies.

“Every year is a wonderful and heart-wrenching experience. Re-Member doesn’t just put a band-aid on the issues, it actually works to empower the Oglala Lakota living on the Rez and the volunteers get to see that firsthand.”

Re-Member is now taking applications for volunteers for the 2024 season. The staff are amazing, the tribe is committed to Re-



Member as a long-term commitment on the Rez and are grateful for the work done. Re-Member hires tribal members as speakers/teachers and work crews whenever possible.



### **The Back Row** **By Gene Baumann**

By now you surely are aware of my interest in history, especially local history, and even more specifically, the long history of our church.

With the annual turn of the calendar page to a new year, I like to check to see if there are any anniversaries coming up. In 2024, while they may not warrant public celebrations, I did find a couple of two-century anniversaries coming up related to our church.

The first actually relates to our founder, Reuben Hatton personally rather than to his connection as founder of the church. On August 24, 1824, President James Monroe signed the land grant deed which was to become Hatton's farm just north of

where the church is located.

Hatton had lived in the neighborhood since arriving in 1817, when he founded the Methodist Society in his home. The congregation met in his home from that time until it outgrew the space. It then moved to the larger home of William Douglas, coincidentally in the year 1824.

The Douglas home served until 1830, when the Brick Chapel was built on the site of our present sanctuary. It served the community which adopted the name The Brick Chapel Community until the present sanctuary was built.

The Chapel needed replacing in the late 1850s, but the Civil War delayed its replacement until 1870. That new sanctuary, named Locust Grove in honor of the trees gracing its lawn, continues to serve us well, now with a brand new floor.
