- A freezer (approximately 12 to 15 or so cubic feet)


- One full-size mattress & box springs

# Barry and Lori Stoll serve our immigrants

*(Editor's Note: The City of Refuge is one of Columbia's most important and unique social service agencies. A recent story in the Columbia Missourian tabloid, "Boom Town" prompted the need for the story of two of our church members to be told to our Locust Leaves readers. Lori agreed to tell us the story.)*

I was the original Director in 2010 as we were a non-profit of one person to start. Barry became the Director in 2016 and from there we have 12 full-time staff and two part-time.

Barry and I are now care coordinators and meet one-on-one with the refugee/immigrants as they come to us for things such as help with life in general and adjusting to this life with language, cultural and other barriers. The obstacles they face are so disheartening without an advocate who knows and has connections in the community.

We help them with whatever they present to us, whether it is acquiring a job, enrolling kids in school, buying a car or a house, and who to trust when doing this. We help with transportation if they don't have a car, taking them to the doctor and navigating different health care problems. We counsel, instruct, read their mail, and warn them of scams. We celebrate graduations, new babies and birthdays.

We worship, eat and pray together. We receive their friendship and they have even walked with us through the death of a family member, to the birth of a grandchild. We have helped them find ways to enjoy this life, such as camps for their kids and family camping, scholarships to a gym, visiting Amish for fresh meat and produce, visiting the zoo in St. Louis, etc.

We have classes here for English, sewing and crafts, cooking, and others. We have a basic needs closet and a food pantry. We have an English buddy program where the volunteer meets weekly



for conversational English and some instruction. There are volunteers who also help kids who need pre-kindergarten readiness, as not all kids can get into preschool. We hope to alleviate some of that deficit by opening our own preschool in the fall.

We also educate and connect them to resources that will help their adjustment and present opportunities that will accelerate their adjustment. We have learned so much as we have listened to their plight and this is how we

know what they need and how to serve.

We have many who come to us from other states as City of Refuge is so unique. There are very few non-profits that serve refugees nationwide that are not resettlement agencies. Resettlement agencies are for the initial six months to a year of settling and becoming independent. We still help folks who have been here for 15 years as our world keeps changing and English is so hard to understand.

My own personal involvement started as a college student helping five Vietnamese refugee kids with their homework. I fell in love with the kids and it opened my eyes and heart to the plight of the refugee. Barry and I later started fostering a family of five siblings and then adopted them around the same time that I started helping the refugees I found here in Columbia.

I think the closeness of the relationships with our kids and the reality of adjustment that a brand new refugee from the jungles of Burma encounters motivated us along with the story of Adoniram Judson, our first American missionary who went to Burma. Barry grew up in Africa and came back to the states as a teen so God developed in him an understanding of different cultures and the feeling of loneliness and confusion that accompanies that adjustment to a new one.

# Fishing and Fun at Coyote Hill




A large contingent of volunteers answered the call to take the kids of Coyote Hill Children's Home fishing in the facility's lake May 13.

Caleb Isaacson, who some of you may know as a media specialist at Midway Elementary, leads the youth group at Midway Heights.

He is an amazing guy with a huge heart for children and youth. He shares my same desire and vision to see God revitalize the middle-schoolers and high-schoolers who live in the Midway community. Caleb and I will continue to collaborate with one another, creating opportunities for youth groups to meet and be in fellowship together. All in all, the worship night was an exciting first step in creating a unified community of Jesus-loving youth here in Midway.

Because of COVID, the Pine Ridge Lakota Reservation was closed to non-residents for almost three years. All volunteer activity ground to a halt, and none of our church family was able to work at Re-Member. It occurred to me that many of our newest families may not have even heard of the work there, or know anything about Pine Ridge. So I thought I would take the opportunity this month to share some of the things we know about this territory of the Lakota and the work Re-Member does.

The officially reported average life expectancy on Pine Ridge is 67 years, the lowest in the United States. Other statistics, attributed to the Pine Ridge hospital, cite an average life expectancy for men of just 47 years. Women fare slightly better, with an average life expectancy of 55 years. Appalling, isn't it?

Of the 3,143 counties in the United States, Oglala Lakota County, contained entirely within the boundaries of the Pine Ridge Reservation, has the lowest per capita income (\$8,768). The community of Allen, South Dakota, has been called the poorest town in the U.S. by a variety of sources.

The unemployment rate on Pine Ridge hovers between 70 and 90 percent. The poverty rate is estimated to exceed 80 percent. The high school dropout rate is over 70 percent. Infant mortality is 300 percent higher than the U.S. average, teen suicide 150 percent higher. Children as young as five years old have committed suicide, so disheartened by their living conditions they see no hope for the future, even at such a young age. Can you even imagine? Half of adults over 40 suffer from diabetes. Some 85 percent of families are affected by alcoholism. A large number are also affected by drug abuse.

Conditions exist here that should not exist in the middle of the wealthiest country on earth. Our volunteers and other visitors to Pine Ridge are often shocked by what they see.

Re-Member is an independent, non-profit organization working with the Oglala Lakota Nation on the Pine Ridge Reservation in South Da-

kota. We improve the quality of life for those who live here, and provide meaningful opportunities to serve and learn for those who volunteer and support our work. Re-Member's efforts are funded by private donations, and guided by the aspirations of tribal members who are generous with their wisdom as cultural speakers, community leaders, and builders of understanding.

At Re-Member, we are builders. We build beds for children who do not have one. We build outhouses for those without functional plumbing. We volunteers have commented, sadly, that this is probably one of the few places in America today where families are EXCITED at the prospect of being gifted with an outhouse! We build ramps and skirting around trailers. We build knowledge and support self-sufficiency in our community gardens. We build economy with our support of local native-owned business. We build hope for a better tomorrow, by focusing on the promise and possibility of what can be.

Founded in 1998, Re-Member is among the longest serving non-profit organizations on Pine Ridge and is not affiliated with any religious, political, or policy group.

Each year, from March through October, Re-Member brings as many as 1,200 volunteers of all ages and backgrounds from across the United States and around the globe to offer their hands and hearts to the people of the Pine Ridge Reservation during week-long service-learning trips with a strong emphasis on cultural immersion. Working with our staff, volunteers complete various projects across the reservation, while learning about the culture and history of the Lakota people.

On the reservation, volunteers live in bunkhouses at Re-Member headquarters and spend three days working to make daily life better for residents and two days learning about the Oglala Lakota people through presentations by Native speakers, site visits, interaction, music and community events. Through cultural immersion, we continue to develop a growing circle of advocates standing in solidarity with the people of Pine Ridge.

## Black Forest Cheesecake

- 1 chocolate cookie crust
- 1 8 oz cream cheese softened
- 1/3 c sugar
- 1 c sour cream
- 2 tsp vanilla
- 8 oz cool whip

Beat cream cheese and sugar till smooth. Mix sour cream and vanilla and add to cream cheese then fold in cool whip. Spread 1/2 of this into chocolate cookie crust.

- Next layer...mix
- 1/4 c cocoa
  - 1 Tbsp powdered sugar

Add cocoa and powdered sugar to remaining cream cheese mixture then carefully layer on top of cream cheese layer.

Refrigerate 4 hrs

Cut and serve with drizzle of cherry pie filling.



## **The Back Row** *By Gene Baumann*

By now you likely are tired of hearing me moan about coming up with a topic for each month's Back Row when something appears from an unexpected source. Well, it has happened again.

As I was leaving the Boone County History and Culture Center a while back, I picked up a copy of a tabloid magazine published by the Columbia Missourian. As I browsed through it I saw an article about the co-founder of a remarkable social service agency in Columbia, the City of Refuge, which has become the immigrants' best friend.

What was even more remarkable about the story was that I recognized the person it was about — Lori Stoll, a relatively new member of our church with her hus-

band, Barry. While this article focused on Lori, anything relating to the City of Refuge must include both of them.

Lori helped found the organization in 2010, after working with immigrants as a student at Mizzou. In 2016 Barry joined Lori and became director of refugee care. From the one employee in 2010, the agency has grown to 10 full-time, three part time, and over 150 volunteers.

When Lori became involved in the creation of the agency, she had been working as the volunteer coordinator for Rainbow House, a childhood emergency shelter, a fact that now reveals an unknown attraction to our church. Our own Kathy Hughes was the founder and longtime leader of Rainbow House.
