Summer In the Psalms

The Psalms are a collection of worship songs used by believers for thousands of years. Psalms is one of the longest books of the Bible, consisting of 150 songs or poems. The songs and poems are of several main types: lament, praise, thanksgiving, royal, and wisdom. Some were likely used in public worship; others seem to be private prayers reflecting struggles with sin, requests for help, and praises for God. This month, we will launch a six-week series that looks at several Psalms of Ascent to learn what they can teach us about God and community.

The Psalms of Ascent is the name given to 15 Psalms (120–134) associated collectively with “going up.” Four songs are attributed to David, one to Solomon, and the rest are unattributed. Two theories regarding the original setting of these songs are:

1. A parallel between the 15 Songs of Ascents and the 15 steps leading from the court of women to the court of Israel in the temple, specifically during the Feast of Tabernacles. While historical writing does not state whether the songs were sung on the steps during temple worship, this connection is made relatively easily.

2. The Psalms of Ascent may have been used in the context of pilgrimage to Jerusalem. The verb “go up” is used specifically in Psalm 122:4. This sense of ascending to Jerusalem is the most probable view of the name in that the hymns were sung by pilgrim bands on their way to the three great festivals of the Jewish year. The journey to Jerusalem was called a “going up,” whether the worshipper came from north or south, east or west. All of the songs are suitable for use on such occasions.

Summer is upon us, and with so many people coming and going on vacations and traveling throughout the season, we thought it a good idea to kick things off with a series you can pick right up on the Sundays you are in town and worshipping with us. Summer In the Psalms will allow you to do just that!

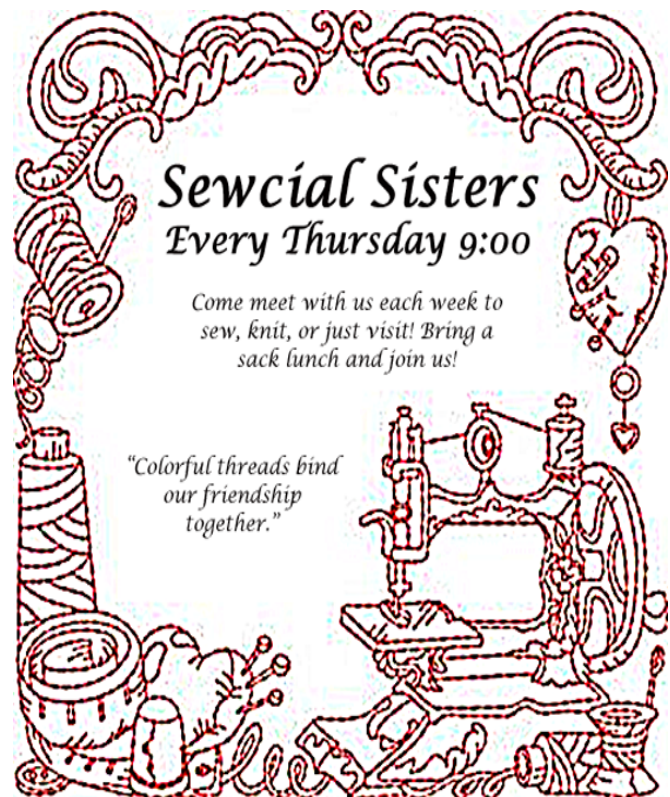
Total contributions for the month were around \$24,000. This is a little behind our average for the first 4 months of 2024, but our cash is in a great spot and overall things are going well in 2024.

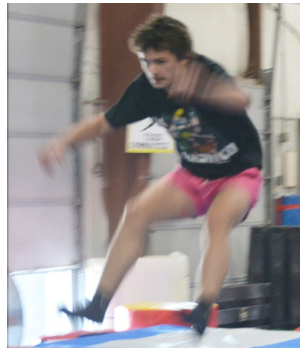


Midway Kids enjoy a day of gymnastics, water fights

Our mission group has been meeting monthly for a shared meal, fellowship to get to know each other even better, and a movie relating to the customs, stories and culture of the area we will encounter, with great discussions afterward.

In addition, this year we are taking a large number of heavy winter coats and a few blankets, children's snow pants and boots to help our Lakota relatives in the brutal winter they will experience after we leave. We met on Memorial Day to sort, label and vacuum pack what we have collected.

So far we've packed up 186 coats and heavy hoodies and 7 pairs of snow pants to take with us. We still have a few coats needing washing and minor mending and buttons replaced.

June gets busy with your family activities. These easy egg noodles can be added to a can of tuna or left over chicken and gravy. Be creative!

Egg Noodles:

- 1 1/4 c all-purpose flour
- 2 t poultry seasoning
- 1/2 t salt
- 2 T room temperature butter
- 1/4 c milk
- 1 beaten egg

In a medium bowl, combine flour, poultry seasoning and salt. Cut the butter in with a fork until crumbly.

Stir in milk and egg. Lightly work the dough with your hands until it forms a soft ball. You may need to add a little more milk or flour to get desired consistency.

Cover bowl and let sit for 5 minutes.

Turn the dough out onto a floured surface. Roll out to about 1/8". Cut the noodles into strips. Separate and let rest for about 15 minutes to allow the noodles to dry out.

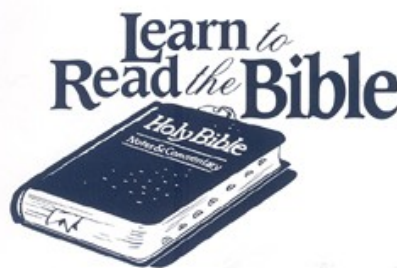

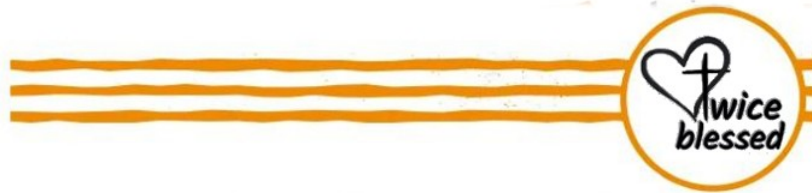

The Back Row By Gene Baumann

Back in 1973, Nedra and Daryle Moreau led "Key '93," a plan to distribute copies of the Book of Luke and Acts to every home in the county. Ten members of Locust Grove distributed 400 books in the Midway area. Nedra was quoted, "The most effective evangelism is carried out through personal witnessing. . .not what we say, but how we live. The membership vow includes a promise to 'uphold the Church by our presence. . .' in the world as well as in the pew on Sunday morning. See you in Church next Sunday.

Nedra wasn't just telling others what to do; she was telling them what she was going to do. And she did it!

Now, as she announced in last month's Locust Leaves, it is time for her to do

something new. For the past eight years she has served as our finance officer, a position she assumed because of her career in the banking business. It was a temporary assignment, she hoped, but now says it was one she has enjoyed doing.

As Rev. Ben commented Sunday in observance of her retirement, Nedra's name is scattered throughout our church history. Just a few examples: She was president of UMW in 1974 -'76; led an Advent study, and was Long Range Planning chair and lay delegate to the annual conference in 1977; was Ministry Council Chair in 1981-84, and a long-time member of the choir.

In addition to all her support throughout the church, perhaps her most important contribution has been setting the standard for her 1973 admonition, "It's not what we say, but how we live." Thank you, Nedra.
