Together, let’s celebrate the beauty of His first coming and the promise of His glorious return. 

Getting to know you

With the recent and continuing growth of our congregation, it seemed a good idea to revive a feature from earlier years of Locust Leaves. We will feature someone in each month's issue, alternating new and longtime members. Thanks to LeeAnn Martin for co-ordinating the series.

Sheldon and Janet Toepke

When Sheldon and Janet retired in 2003, they had already determined where they would spend their retirement years. Over a period of 11 years, their three children had attended the University of Missouri in Columbia, which had the qualities they sought for their retirement, a college town with good medical services. Remembering their early life experiences they purchased a farm northwest of Columbia in 1998.

Sheldon was raised as a Lutheran, Janet grew up as a Baptist. They raised their family in the Lutheran Church, where they were active with the youth groups. As they settled into their retirement farm they needed to find a church nearby so they didn't have to drive into town as their vision became less dependable. After visiting several rural churches in the area, they settled in at Locust Grove, and formally became members on December 11, 2022.

Sheldon was an engineering manager for McDonnell-Douglas/Boeing in St. Louis. He worked on projects from fighter planes, Blue Angels and Thunderbirds, to Skylab, to the deaths of astronauts on Apollo. He also worked on flammability of fluids used. After retiring, he served on many boards and committees for University of Missouri Extension.

Janet was a stay-at-home Mom. While their three children were in school, she ran their church's child care program, which grew to more than 100 children. She chaired a Project Graduation program during their children's high school



years. Later she did some substitute teaching, including calculus which she had never studied.

In the middle of Sheldon's engineering career the couple spent 10 years farming in Illinois with his parents. The acreage was small so they raised 1,000 pigs a year, wanting their kids to grow up with farm experience.

The family consists of three children, Joseph a retired Major from the U.S. Army, Nicholas, a veterinarian, and Faye, a physical therapist in sports medicine. There are eight grandchildren, Shea, McKensie, Kelsey, Nathan, Katie, Zach, Grant, and Tyler. Of these, three are in college and two in high school. There is one great-grandson, Adrian.

A farm must have pets; this one has one dog, Libby (short for Liberty), and eight outside cats.

The Toepkes were married on August 31, 1968. One of their favorite memories is their 50th wedding anniversary, which they celebrated with a vow renewal service.

Nearly 100 people attended from all stages of their married life. Guests came from Texas, Illinois, Florida, and Minnesota. Among the guests were couples who were in the youth groups Sheldon and Janet worked with in their early church. Those couples are now grandparents too. Janet's comment on the event, "It was a huge blessing to have them with us on that special occasion."








volunteers at Midway Baptist for providing restrooms and waters at the turn!

The church mission trip to Pine Ridge Oglala Lakota Reservation in September was full of interesting events. Some of the details were learning experiences. Many were variances of life as we know it in Midway. However, when going on a mission trip you are taking a step into discomfort.

One of the first things we noticed after unpacking the vehicles was the sign posted on every paper towel dispenser: PLEASE TAKE ONLY ONE. THAT'S ENOUGH! We tried to comply.

Our sleeping rooms were in a building separate from the main building. Which also had bunk beds. Each room had 4 bunk beds. Only one outlet. I had taken a power strip. All four women had several electronics that needed recharging. A fan in the window was on all night for cooling. It was turned off during the day and the window closed to keep the cool in. It was 90 degrees most days.

Every morning coffee was ready at 7 am. Just in time for those of us who greeted the rising sun at 6:30. Ask us about that experience!

The fellowship building, named Shelam was set up for efficiency. Metal picnic tables were for sitting while listening to talks or entertainment by Lakota. Try sitting on them for an hour or two! We talked about sending cushions for future groups.

Our first tour was to the Sanctuary. Another long bus ride. We saw miles of bad lands. Raw, eroded buttes and pinnacles. Beautiful but the history is unpleasant at best. Once we reached the sanctuary we were instructed to be silent. Don't take anything or leave anything. Sit with distance between each other. Meditate. When I found a place to sit down I looked down and found a pile of broken turquoise glass. I took a picture to bring back. Lots of souls and mystery in this rugged spot.

Daily we listened to Wisdom of the Elders. Philosophy and teachings of the native People.

A quote from Rachel Naomi included this: We are either fixing or helping which can be draining. Or we Serve, which is renewing.

All participants were assigned to a crew of four. Eight crew teams names were posted. Each day two crews worked together. That changed daily. Every crew had a turn in the dining room/kitchen, setting up or cleaning after the meal. Simple tasks like putting food on the shelf or washing dishes.

These crews also went out on the reservation to build ramps, bunk beds, sand and paint beds and water plants in the garden. On our first assignment I helped build a ramp. As we were finishing two young kids brought their trucks out and started playing on it. A clean safe place. The bathroom for us was at least a 20 minute drive to a place with public restrooms. During lunch time.

The shop was down the drive from the bunk-house. Sawing. Power drills. Sanding. Painting. All happened here. Interesting conversations and friendships formed.

The Garden was about 45 minutes away. A good place to visit. The restrooms were inside a building with AC. We lingered here!

Transportation to worksites was usually on a school bus or van. A water cooler to fill our water bottles and a cooler held lunch. Deli meat, cheese, bread, cut up apples or oranges and carrots. Only ONE each. Rationed closely. Same every lunch.

After five days of cereal or PBJ for breakfast and soup for dinner we were looking forward to the trip home. Almost in unison we all voted for STEAK as our first meal off the Rez!!! Elk. Bison. Beef. Fried potatoes. Then a stop at the Pie and Purple Ice Cream Shop. What's next? We mentioned fudge. But didn't find any.

As Kathy Hughes wrote in the October newsletter, the trip our family of volunteers took was a life changing mission trip. Truly Family. We are all related. I invite you to join our family next year to see and work at Pine Ridge Reservation.

This cake is great for breakfast with a hot cup of coffee. Serve warm. The spices will fill your kitchen with the smells of Christmas. Enjoy, *Hope Burkart*

Southern Sweet Apple Cake

1 cup sugar
1 cup light brown sugar
4 large eggs
1 cup vegetable oil
1 1/2 cup **self-rising flour**
1 tsp cinnamon
1 Granny Smith apple (peeled and diced)
1 tsp vanilla
2 cups chopped pecans
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Beat sugar and eggs, add oil, flour and cinnamon. Beat until well combined. Fold in diced apples and pecans. Pour into greased 9x13 pan. Bake 30-35 minutes. Serve warm.
