We're excited to share that we're kicking off an 8-week series on the book of Ephesians! This letter from the apostle Paul to the early church in Ephesus may have been written centuries ago, but its message is just as relevant today. It's packed with life-changing truths that help us see God's incredible salvation plan, which He put in place long before the world was even created. Paul reminds us that we're richly blessed in Christ, not just with material things but with every spiritual blessing available in the heavenly realms, all because of what Jesus did for us through his death and resurrection.

Throughout this series, we'll dive deep into the heart of Paul's message: we are saved by faith in Christ alone. Salvation isn't something we can earn; it's a gift from God that's freely given to anyone who believes. Paul also shares that through Christ's sacrifice, God has created a brand-new community, a family of believers united by faith and love. It's a community that tears down every dividing wall, inviting us to experience absolute unity in Christ.

We also uncover the incredible truth that prayer gives every believer direct access to God. It's not just reserved for a select few. This access is for all of us, giving us an intimate connection with our Heavenly Father. As our faith grows, we'll see how it starts to change every part of our lives. Paul encourages us to live in a way that reflects our calling, maturing in our walk with Christ. He challenges us to let go of attitudes and behaviors that no longer fit our new identity in Christ and instead embraces qualities like kindness, humility, and forgiveness.

Paul's letter to the Ephesians shows us how even our closest relationships, whether in marriage, family, or friendships are transformed by Jesus. As we follow Christ's example, His love and grace begin to shape everything we do. And finally, Paul reminds us that there's a spiritual reality that's just as true as the physical world we see every day. We're in the middle of a spiritual battle, and Paul encourages us to put on the whole armor of God so we can stand firm in our faith.

The series on Ephesians will be a time of reflection, growth, and encouragement as we unpack the rich truths of God's Word together. Each week, we'll explore a new part of Paul's teachings, helping us live out the fullness of the gospel in our everyday lives. We'd love for you to join us on this journey as we grow together, and encourage you to invite family, friends and neighbors to come along with you.

In Memoriam



Nedra Moreau

May 5, 1942—September 10, 2024

It is with great sadness that we share the passing of Nedra Carlene (Holt) Moreau, September 10 at the age of 82.

Nedra was born May 5, 1942, in Columbia, to the late Carl and Lorraine (Phillippe) Holt and step mother Dorothy Holt. She graduated from Hickman High School in 1960, attended UMC and graduated with a BA in Management from William Woods University. She married Daryle Moreau on Dec. 7, 1963.

Nedra worked 20 years at First National Bank and Trust Company (now Simmons Bank) in the trust and investment services. She finished the last eight years of her career as Vice President for Central Trust & Investment Company, which was affiliated with Boone County National Bank (now Central Bank of Boone County.)

In retirement, Nedra combined her financial skills with her strong faith by volunteering at Locust Grove, where she was a member for more than 50 years. She guided the church through its most challenging and fruitful seasons. Every decision she made was thoughtfully considered, grounded in sound logic, sensitive to relationships, and covered in prayer. She managed charitable gifts, bill payments, endowments, investments, and the church budget, leaving a lasting legacy of wise stewardship and unwavering commitment.

Moreau led "Key '93," a plan to distribute copies of the Book of Luke and Acts to every home in the county. Ten members of Locust Grove distributed 400 books in the Midway area. Nedra was quoted, "The most effective evangelism is carried out through personal witnessing. . .not what we say, but how we live. She wasn't telling others what to do; she was telling them what she was going to do. And she did it!

For the past eight years she served as finance officer, using her banking experience. Her name appears throughout our church history. Just a few examples: She was president of Ladies Aid/Women's Society of Christian Service/United Methodist Women 1974-76; was Ministry Council Chair in 1982-84, led an Advent study and was Long Range Planning chair and lay delegate to annual conference in 1997; and a longtime member of the choir.

Nedra will be lovingly remembered by her husband of 60 years, Daryle; children Jody Patrick and Michelle and Charles Henley, grandchildren Ashley Williams, Caleb Patrick, Noah Patrick, Tyler Henley, Connor Henley, and Parker Henley; great grandchildren Ayden Secundino, Beau Patrick and Oliver Henley. In addition, she is survived by her siblings Patricia Atteberry, Bert Holt, Katherine Quinn, and Bill and Jill Cook.

More than four decades later, their name is synonymous with many of the good things the church has to offer, the most visible being a landmark music program for worship.

Glenna plays the piano and Jim plays the organ and directs the choir for worship and a variety of other programs. Both extend their activity to other area of the church.

Jim presently serves as chair of the Worship Committee and will be seen helping with practically every activity of the church.

Glenna created Wee Care, a day-care center at the church in 1986, which cared for children from the community for nearly three decades until the market needs diminished.

Glenna helped create the major mission, Twice Blessed, and works several days a week with Jill Cook to keep the thrift store open for the needy twice a month.

They say, "This church family has been an integral part of our married lives for over 40 years. We've been through highs and lows and are ecstatic to be a part of this



current season of MLG. Our church family means so much to us and we wouldn't trade it for anything! We are truly blessed that we are able to call LG our church home!"

Outside her church schedule, Glenna focuses much of her time playing viola with her string quartet "Heartstrings" and the Columbia Civic Orchestra. She also is the proprietor, with their daughter, Kate, of an antique shop, "Buygones," in Boonville. She also teaches piano and strings three days a week.

Jim says his basic pastime is "totin' and fetchin'" for Glenna; although he does manage to continue to compose music for band and solo/ensemble instrumental music.

The couple met on a blind date at Mizzou where they were students. As Jim tells the story, "two weeks later, Glenna asked me to marry her, (it happened June 9, 1973) and here we are some 51 years later. I guess when you know, you know."

They chose to make their family the unconventional way, adopting all three of their children. Kate was a baby and we traveled to Korea to get her. Our son, Josh, came two years later from Korea at the age of five, and five years later, Tony came to them at the age of 13. Tony is a retired police detective, Josh is Personnel Director for the Columbia Public Schools, and Kate is manager of Buygones in Boonville.

Glenna is a retired teacher; Jim is a retired band director for Columbia schools. The couple has six grandchildren.

They are well-known for their love of animals, and had an animal sanctuary, Happy Tails, for many years.

Not as well known is that years ago they served as undercover agents for ASCAP, which provided several interesting and exciting experiences until their cover was blown and they had to quit.




Work team provides new playhouse/swing set complex

Fourteen hundred and sixty round trip miles and a life-changing experience away is Re-Member, on the Pine Ridge Oglala Lakota reservation in South Dakota. That is where six of our Midway Locust Grove Oyate (Lakota for family) spent a week in September. Our experiences were amazing and varied.

See if Jerry can tell you about Yankton, SD and finding MOJO's for a late dinner without laughing! Belinda got to play the guitar and sing with Native American Music Award winner Will Peters, who also sang a special healing song in Lakota, and a beautiful tribute song to his friend, brother and repeat volunteer Gary Hughes.

Mariea got to build a ramp for a grateful Lakota elder with a broken hip and his wheelchair-bound wife, and watch several excited grandchildren use it as an Indy 500 track for their Hot Wheels! Jana got to deliver and assemble bunk beds for grateful families sleeping on the floor. Kathy got to admire a beautiful and healthy 4 week old little girl and talk with her father about the open heart surgery her three year old sister had when she was only days old. Her proud dad whipped out pictures to show of his two older kids, to share. He started off showing some embarrassment about being a stay-at-home dad, but ended up glowing in the compliments about his tender and excellent care of his newborn daughter, realizing no one was judging him at all. Jerry made a special connection with Rick, one of the volunteer team leaders who happens to be from Columbia! Rick was busy encouraging Jerry to use his building expertise to lead a team next year as a volunteer. Keith used his carpentry skills to help build, sand and paint pieces of bunk beds for future delivery and assembly.

Re-Member's mission of 25 years on the rez is to not only walk alongside the Lakota and serve them in specific ways, but to educate the volunteers and help them make connections among the Lakota

living on the rez. On this trip we were taught a traditional hand game of "bones" by Emmett, the great grandson of Black Elk, and his wife Stephanie, the great granddaughter of Chief Red Cloud. Emmett was a work crew leader, and several got to spend time talking with Stephanie on work days at the garden. Nyla Red Cloud was our cook, and we were able to see her amazing porcupine quill work and bead work. A stop at the site of the Massacre of Wounded Knee and the mass burial grave was heart-wrenching. Several commented that they could feel the spirits of the slaughtered elderly and children crying out. God in his mercy offers forgiveness, but it remains a shameful and painful stain in our history of trying to eradicate the Lakota. And it serves as a great reminder of their resilience and determination to survive and thrive, despite all odds.

The five able-bodied members of our team were privileged to hike into the Sanctuary, a sacred part of the Badlands, to meditate. The day was scorching hot, and it was not a comfortable experience. But it was a life-changing one.

Perhaps the most significant experience for our team was sunrise. Behind the main dorm there is a hill, the top of which overlooks the entire area in a 360 degree vista. In native tradition, Belinda sang the Cherokee morning song and prayed as the sun rose each a.m. Two mornings she put on her regalia, which was a special blessing. Our last morning we were joined by a number of the other volunteers. It was such an emotional start to the day and end to our week of work and friendships that there was hardly a dry eye on the hill. We all agreed it should be made mandatory at least one morning of the volunteer week.

The trip home was full of stories and impressions, and plans for a return next year. Re-Member seems to either be an interesting mission trip, or a life-changing experience that puts a piece of the Lakota culture deep in the heart, forever. Perhaps YOU are meant to experience the Pine Ridge Reservation with us next fall. As the Lakota say, Mitakuye Oyasin. We are all relatives.



The mission to the reservation was for more than building ramps, stairs and bunk beds for the REZidents. Of equal value for both the visiting teams of volunteers and the residents was the personal interaction between the two. Our team delivered a large quantity of wearables and other useful items for the members of the reservation, and shared time and conversation with them.





Spaghetti Dinner And Fundraiser



What an incredible night of food, fellowship and fun with a fantastic crew of guests and volunteers. That's what our maiden voyage of the Youth Group Spaghetti Dinner and Silent Auction was all about. Our fellowship hall was transformed into an Italian restaurant with red and white checkered tablecloths and centerpieces of carnation bouquets atop accents of red and green napkins created by our behind the scenes church mice; Beth Luetjen, Louise Stanley and Catherine Shanahan.

The menu was simple. Delicious homemade spaghetti with a dinner salad and breadsticks. Dan Mieves was at the helm as the head cook of all things spaghetti with volunteers from the women's Bible study plus spouses and parents of youth, including Pastor Ben pitching in to help fill dinner plates. Our youth were decked out in their finest, ready to serve our guests after a briefing on the ins and outs on waiting tables. They were quick learners and took to the task with smiling faces and introductions to their table of guests. Our guests were most gracious as they waited for their dinners amongst 120+ attendees! This allowed time for true fellowship of unrushed conversations, getting to know their student server and time to bid at the silent auction.

We had over 130 bakers answer the call to prepare some of Midway's finest desserts. It was a wonderful assortment of pies, cakes, cookies, muffins and a special entry of Mary Kaye Baumann's collection of food ministry recipes. We had several items that brought friendly bidding wars between guests, driving up some items to go for \$50, \$75 and even \$175! All the dessert contributions and bidding helped bring our silent auction total to \$1500. Adding in ticket sales and generous tip donations brought our total raised for the evening to \$4000! It all supports our student ministries.

The evening commenced with a program featuring several of our youth as well as Bill Roop and Lauren Steinhoff sharing their personal highlights of the mission trip to Kentucky. These brave students stood up and shared their hearts with a sanctuary full of smiling and attentive faces. I don't know if they knew how loved and supported they were prior to that night but I am sure they do now. I know that I felt the genuine love that our church family has for these kids. Our prayers continue to be answered in BIG ways as we see our youth grow in their faith as well as in their numbers! Enjoy your achievements as well as your plans. Keep interested in your own career, however humble. It is a real possession in the changing fortunes of time.



The Kitchen Cabinet

Remembering
Mary Kaye's
Food Ministry

This recipe first appeared in the February 2019 issue of *Locust Leaves*. Louise Stanley sent me her saved copy, suggesting we might print it again as a tribute to Nedra. Beth Luetjen used the recipe as her contribution to the youth ministry's spaghetti dinner auction September 22. We repeat it here as a memorial to Nedra. *Hope Burkart*

Chocolate Pecan Pie

Pastry for single-crust 9 inch pie

1 cup coarsely chopped pecans

1 cup semisweet chocolate chips

3 eggs

¾ cup light corn syrup

½ cup packed brown sugar

¼ cup butter, melted

1 tsp. vanilla extract

Press pastry into a 9-inch pie plate.

Trim edges.

Sprinkle pecans and chocolate chips into crust. In a small bowl, combine the eggs, corn syrup, brown sugar, butter, and vanilla. Pour into crust.

Bake at 350 degrees for 45-55 minutes or until top is bubbly and crust is golden brown.

Refrigerate leftovers. *Nedra Moreau*



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The Back Row By Gene Baumann

Most of you longtime members of Locust Grove are aware of my fascination with God Winks, the topic of a book written in 2001 by Squire Rushnell. In it he introduces us to the God Wink with this opening comment.

“This book will validate your feelings that there’s more to coincidence than meets the eye. It also fosters hope for the dreams of your future by unveiling the wondrous map that has quietly guided you along the paths of your past. God has been winking at you.”
