Matthew 17: 14-18: “When they came to the crowd, a man approached Jesus and knelt before him. “Lord, have mercy on my son”, he said. “He has seizures and is suffering greatly. He often falls into the fire or into the water. I brought him to your disciples, but they could not heal him. “You unbelieving and perverse generation”, Jesus replied, “how long shall I stay with you? ...bring the boy here to me.” Jesus rebuked the demon, and it came out of the boy, and he was healed at that moment.”

“Tis Grace hath brought me safe thus far, and Grace will lead me home.” (from the hymn “Amazing Grace”).

The powerful story of Jesus’ healing power has really resonated with me this month. As most of you know, my daughter Diana and I have now spent almost a month at the Cleveland Clinic seeking a precise diagnosis on the path to healing of her severe epilepsy. It has been a journey fraught with pain, fear, and many unknowns for both of us. But, throughout this whole ordeal, I can say with assurance that I have felt the presence of God and his healing grace. I have felt the incredible power of prayer to bring answers and relief, and I have felt the embrace of the people of this church and the uplifting power of their prayers.

One of the worst days was the first Tuesday, when after the withdrawal of her epilepsy medication to study her seizures, the seizures were too severe to be studied and it was difficult to stop them. That night, I returned to the hotel and prayed more fervently than usual to bring a less-

ening of these seizures that were necessary for diagnosis. Then I tuned in, via zoom, to women’s bible study. I can’t begin to describe how grateful I was to be able to absorb the comfort and prayers that these wonderful women provided me. I had read the lesson in advance and even wrote down my answers, but I could not recall any of them! But the memory of the solace these women provided to me will never be forgotten.

Ben has been an unfailing prayer warrior, always responding within minutes to my desperate texts when things seemed to be getting worse. I know that his constant, faithful prayer, combined with our church prayer group, women’s bible study prayers, and my own prayers were knocking on the door of heaven.

Another very difficult day was the night Diana returned from neurosurgery, in severe pain. She rated her pain as a “15” out of 1-10, with 10 being “the worst pain you can imagine”. In desperation, I pleaded with the doctors to increase her pain medication, which barely touched it. As all parents know, when your child suffers and you witness it, you suffer almost as badly. I returned to my hotel, texted Ben again, and prayed hard again, as Ben was simultaneously praying. I felt then a lifting of my spirits, and a thought came into my head that I’m sure was provided by the Holy Spirit. “Mary had to witness the terrible suffering of her son on the cross, and she was able to endure this with God’s help. You will endure, and the pain will be lessened”.

Sure enough, the next day an improvement came in the loosening of her head bandage. It had been placing undue pressure on one of her ears, cutting down the circulation. Some pain relief was provided. As the pain gradually lessened over days, I prayed for the onset of mild to moderate seizures, again needed for precise mapping

If you are interested in putting a backpack or two together, please label it as a man's or woman's and bring it to church. Kathy and I will be collecting them.

Have you too heard the call of the Lord in the night to help some of the poorest people in North America? If so, I hope that you will prayerfully consider lending your help to this effort. Thank you!

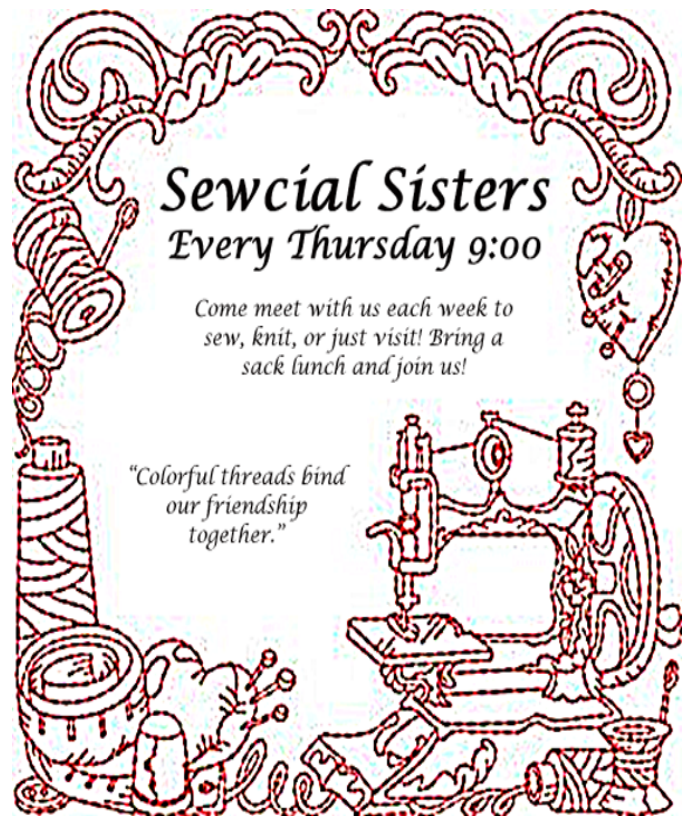

of the location of her seizures, to be picked up, hopefully, by the tiny electrodes that had been temporarily placed inside her skull. Ben once again was asked to pray specifically for the return of small seizures. Sure enough, when I returned yesterday morning, I was told that she had had 2 seizures during the night. That morning, she had one more. Then the neurologist came in and said that he thought that he had received enough data from the electrodes to pinpoint the origin of the seizures in the brain! This is the result we have been hoping and praying for. We are told that now we are on the downward slope, toward scheduling the final surgery to remove the electrodes, re-vamping up the seizure medication, and preparing for discharge and the journey home.

I cannot thank Ben, the prayer team, and women's bible study enough for the impact of their faithful prayers. I am praying that my next "view from a pew" column will not have to be written from a hospital room in Cleveland, Ohio. I am praying that at the next women's bible session, I will be zooming in from Columbia rather than the Cleveland Clinic Holiday Inn. I am praying that the data will now point to a possible procedure that will lessen these seizures once and for all. I am praying that my next column will be on a different faith topic. And, above all, I am praying that God will lead us safely back home to Columbia. I know that "it's grace that brought me safe thus far, and grace will lead us home". And, as a believer, I am blessed with the "sure and certain knowledge" that God will safely bring us back to Columbia, Missouri, and Midway Locust Grove Church.

March into Spring...

This is a little switch to green bean casserole replacing green beans with asparagus. It is a fresh take on a classic recipe. Enjoy, *Hope Burkart*

Asparagus Casserole

- 1 - 15 oz can asparagus (drained - save juice)
- 1 - 15 oz can sweet peas (drained)
- 1 - 10.25 oz can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 1/2 cup sharp cheddar cheese (grated)

Topping:

- 1 sleeve Ritz crackers, crushed
- 1/2 stick melted butter

Directions:

Preheat oven 400 degrees
Layer asparagus and peas in 1 qt. casserole dish
Mix soup with 1/4 cup asparagus juice and cheese
Pour on top of asparagus and peas
Crush crackers and add butter to make topping for casserole
Bake 25 minutes or until hot and bubbly

1 C. Colman's Dry Mustard

1 C. Tarragon vinegar

Mix in the top of a double boiler and let sit overnight. Then add:

3 eggs, beaten

1 C. sugar

Cook in a double boiler, stirring often, scraping the sides and bottom, until thick - about 30 minutes or longer. Let cool, then refrigerate.

The Back Row **By Gene Baumann**

Now that I no longer am required to study it in school, I have become fascinated with history, particularly local history. I have discovered a number of resources which tell me the stories of long ago right here in the neighborhood.

One of my favorite sources is a website called Chronicling America, provided by the Library of Congress. Type in any subject and you'll find many related stories

You'll find it on the internet at www.chroniclingamerica.loc.gov. The only local newspaper on the site is the Missourian, but it includes a lot of our history from the early 1800s to the early 1960s. It is a great source of obituaries for the residents of our Village Of Locust Grove.

I found the following news report involv-

ing our church amusing despite the serious nature of the story. It is from the August 23, 1915, Columbia Missourian.

CHURCH GOT 'EM IN TROUBLE One is Charged With Disturbing a Social; Other, Services

Clarence Miller, who lives in the country near Midway, was arrested Saturday on information filed with the circuit clerk by W. M. Dinwiddie, prosecuting attorney of Boone County. Miller is charged with disturbing the peace at an ice-cream social held at the Locust Grove Church at Midway in July. He gave bond for his appearance during the October term of Circuit Court.

Sterling Hudnell also was arrested on information filed by the prosecuting attorney. He is charged with being intoxicated in a public assembly. It is alleged that he disturbed services at the Locust Grove Church. Hudnell gave bond.
