A Message from Pastor Leslie

This month we get to celebrate welcoming new members into our congregation. It means I've been thinking a lot about what it means to be a member in the UMC.

While most people are members of a particular church, like Washougal, clergy are members of the denomination – specifically their conference. I am not a member of WUMC, I am a member of the PNW Annual Conference. What that means is that while I am deeply committed to you as my church right now, I am a member of the larger church denomination. If and when the Bishop decides another local church needs me more, or you need someone else, my vow is to go. You are part of the Annual Conference as well! Each year we join in financially, called apportionments. These funds pay the Bishop and other conference staff, and provide funding for the various ministries of our conference. WUMC is also represented by a member who can vote on all matters brought to the floor at the meeting of the Annual Conference (the yearly “business” meeting of the churches). If you wanted, as a member of a local church, you can be nominated for larger roles within the conference, such as sitting on a board or committee.

We, both myself as a pastor and us a church, belong to a conference because in Methodism, we believe in what is called “connectionalism.” We believe that God’s best is for us to be together. Yes, we are lots of singular churches standing on our own, but we are also connected in a district (Crest to Coast), and a conference (PNW), and a Jurisdiction (Western), and a Global community of people united in our mission to “make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.” Furthermore, we are connected to other denominations that also share our mission, we call this our “ecumenical commitment.” We aren’t better together because it’s the easiest way, there are deep cultural divisions even on a small level, but because God tells us that only together are we the full expression of the Body of Christ.



You don't have to be an official member to be an official part of our church. But as the circle around our church grows, both literally and figuratively, I thought this month might be a good one to remind ourselves of what it means to be a member of our church, the United Methodist Church, and the Church.

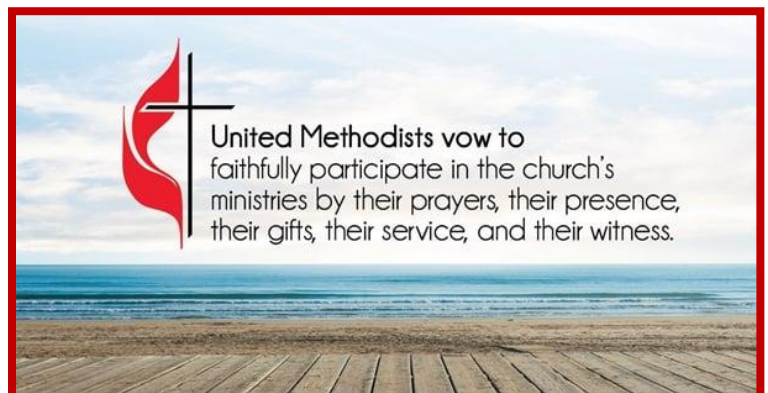

I would like to share the following note from last year's February Newsletter:

"As I'm sure you have noticed, our congregation is growing! One of our goals for 2023-24 was to increase our average Sunday attendance to 40 souls by Easter 2024. We now often have as many as 50 joining us for worship on Sunday mornings—an increase of about 13.5%"

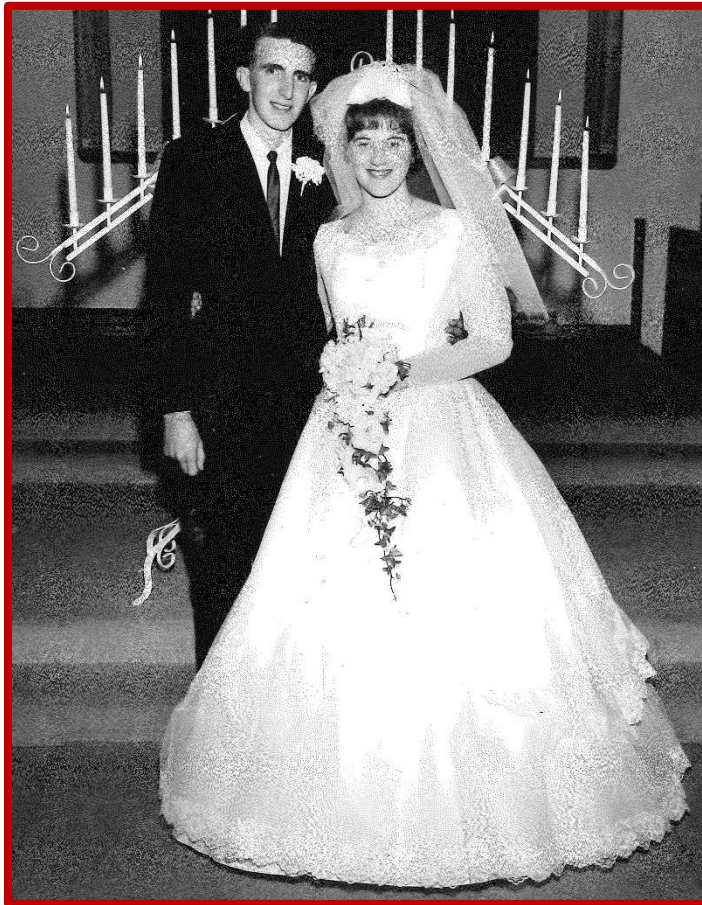

Black History Month is an annual celebration of achievements by African Americans and a time for recognizing their central role in U.S. history. Also known as African American History Month, the event grew out of “Negro History Week,” the brainchild of noted historian Dr. Carter G. Woodson (1875-1950) and other prominent African Americans. Since 1976, every U.S. president has officially designated the month of February as Black History Month. Other countries around the world, including Canada and the United Kingdom, also devote a month to celebrating Black history.

Here are a few interesting facts about Black History Month:

Black History Month Wasn't Always A Month.

When it was first founded, Black History Month was only a week and was called Negro History Week. In the '60s, various colleges and universities expanded the recognition of African American history to the full month of February. Per the magazine 'People', President Gerald Ford officially recognized it as the month-long celebration that it is now.

Black History Month Was Founded in 1915.

Harvard historian Dr. Carter G. Woodson and minister Jesse E. Moorland founded the Association for the Study of African American Life and History to bring awareness to the African American people who had made contributions to society, but had been forgotten or left out of the narrative. That turned into Negro History Week, and later into Black History Month. Dr. Carter Woodson helped to create Black History month. He also did many more things in his life for African Americans, including establishing the Journal of Negro History in 1916 and the Negro History Bulletin in 1937. He did this as a way of giving Black scholars a place to publish their research and findings.

There Is A Reason We Celebrate BHM in February.

History states that February wasn't just randomly chosen for Black History Month. Back when it was Negro History Week, the second week of February was chosen to coincide with the birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass.

Black History Month Has Different Themes.

History also explains that every president decides on a specific theme for Black History Month. This has been done since 1976. The official theme for 2021: “Black Family: Representation, Identity, and Diversity.”



American Heart Month

February is American Heart Month, a national observance to raise awareness about cardiovascular disease, the leading cause of death in the United States, encouraging Americans to learn about heart health, risk factors like high blood pressure and cholesterol, and adopt heart-healthy lifestyles, with key events including National Wear Red Day to support women's heart health. It's a time for education, promoting CPR awareness, and supporting the American Heart Association's efforts to prevent heart disease and stroke.



Key Focuses

- **Awareness:**
Highlighting that heart disease affects people of all ages and backgrounds.
- **Prevention:**
Promoting lifestyle changes such as healthy eating, regular physical activity, and avoiding smoking to manage risks.
- **Education:**
Sharing resources on controlling blood pressure, cholesterol, diabetes, and recognizing heart disease symptoms.
- **Action:**
Encouraging people to learn CPR and get involved in community health initiatives.

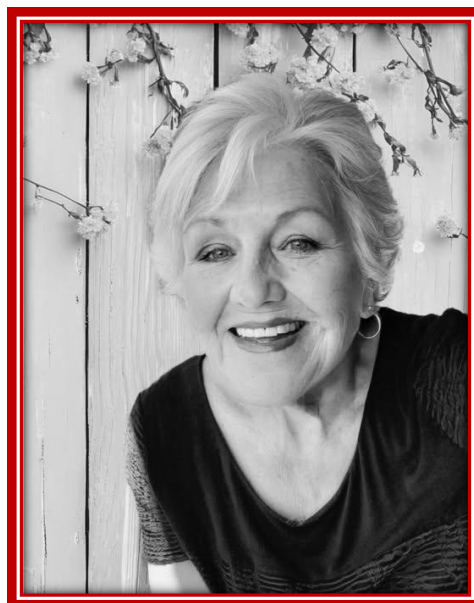

Valentine's Day



Valentine's Day is a time to celebrate romance and love and kissy face. But the origins of this festival of candy and cupids are actually dark, bloody — and a bit muddled. Though no one has pinpointed the exact origin of the holiday, one place to start is ancient Rome. But we're not going there. We're going to ignore the gore and carry on with love in our hearts.

Some say it originated as a Christian feast day honoring one or two early Christian martyrs named Saint Valentine and, through later folk traditions, has become a significant cultural, religious, and commercial celebration of romance and love in many regions of the world.

As the years went on, the holiday grew sweeter. Chaucer and Shakespeare romanticized it in their work, and it gained popularity throughout Britain and the rest of Europe. Handmade paper cards became the tokens du jour in the Middle Ages.

Eventually, the tradition made its way to the New World. The Industrial Revolution ushered in factory-made cards in the 19th century. And in 1913, Hallmark Cards of Kansas City, Mo., began mass-producing valentines. February has not been the same since.

Fun fact about St. Valentine who died in 3rd century Rome on feast day February 14. He was named of one or two legendary Christian martyrs whose lives seem to be historically based. Although the Roman Catholic Church continues to recognize St. Valentine as a saint of the church. He is the patron saint of lovers, epileptics, and beekeepers.
