¹Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, and Timothy our brother, ²to the saints and faithful brothers in Christ at Colossae: Grace to you and peace from God our Father.

Introduction

As in other cities of first century Rome, Colossae's religious climate would have been a mixture of the classic Greek gods with their temples and shrines, newer mystery cults focused on personal spiritual experiences, various stoic and skeptic philosophies, and the influence of Judaism.

One danger for the church at Colossae would have been syncretism, the merging of other religious dogma, practice, and philosophy with the gospel of Christ Jesus. The danger could have come in the desire to fit in with the culture, to avoid conflict with family, friends, or coworkers, or to escape governmental or religious pressure to conform. Regardless, the result of syncretism would have been the watering down of the gospel and diminishing of the person of Christ Jesus.

Paul's answer to the danger for the church at Colossae was to exalt and exult in Jesus. The single paragraph encompassing verses 1:14-20 is dense with doctrine of and delight in the deity and preeminence of Jesus. And verses 21-23 that follow resonate with the reconciling work of Jesus "in his body by his death" to not only reclaim us but remake us for eternity with Him.

Paul's opening sentence itself was a reminder of who he was as an apostle of Christ Jesus and who they were as a church in Christ Jesus.
