

Pastor Roy's Study Questions on Luke 12:22-48 (February 15, 2026)

— *Below are questions to help further our understanding of Wednesday's Sermon.* —

1. In what areas of your life do you find yourself consumed by worry and anxiety rather than trusting in God's provision, and what practical steps can you take to surrender these concerns to Him?
2. Jesus emphasizes that worrying cannot add a single hour to our lives. How does understanding this truth change the way you approach daily challenges and uncertainties?
3. The sermon contrasts seeking the Kingdom of God versus seeking worldly possessions and security. Where does your heart's true treasure lie, and how is this reflected in your daily priorities and decisions?
4. Jesus warns that the master will come at an unexpected hour. Are you living with intentional anticipation of Christ's return, or have you become complacent in your spiritual walk?
5. The passage states that those who know their master's will but do not act according to it will receive severe punishment. How does this sobering truth motivate you to align your actions with God's revealed will?
6. God cares for even the ravens, which are considered unclean birds. What does this teach us about the depth and breadth of God's love and provision for His children?
7. The sermon mentions that worry and anxiety can actually make us physically ill and shorten our lives. How might releasing these burdens to God improve both your spiritual and physical health?
8. Jesus tells His disciples to sell their possessions and give to the needy, storing up treasures in heaven. What would it look like for you to practically live out this radical generosity in your current circumstances?
9. The faithful servant is found awake and ready when the master returns. What spiritual disciplines or practices help you maintain vigilance and readiness for Christ's coming?
10. The sermon emphasizes that to whom much is given, much is required. How does recognizing the knowledge and blessings God has entrusted to you increase your sense of responsibility and stewardship?
