## Who He Is

**E**. S. Jones once said, "God will not reveal himself through that which is contrary to his nature." A. W. Tozer wrote, "What comes into our mind when we think about God is the most important thing about us."

I was talking to a young man several years ago, and we came around to the topic of God: who or what God is. The young man pointed to the sky and said, "There is my god." I tried to explain to him that the heavens are not god, but a reflection of who God is. I was speaking to a lady one day about the Bible, and she said, "The Bible is a collection of myths." She had no idea who God is.

Every year in Montana, during the fall, skunks are getting run over on our highways. I don't know why, but they are. Well, there lays the dead skunk, and the odor that goes with it. Why doesn't the skunk get out of the way?

Well, I think I've figured it out. He thinks that if he sprays this big thing that will take care of it. I've concluded that he is having wrong thoughts about methodology (and reality). His method didn't work!

The psalmist wrote, "These things you have done, and I kept silent; you thought that I was altogether like you...". Just think, God is addressing the nation of Israel, not a pagan nation.

Having pastored now for over 55 years, most of the conflicts I have experienced in the church resulted from low thoughts about God. Ignorance about Him is darkness; at times there can be darkness in the church. A.W. Tozer wrote, "The essence of idolatry is the entertainment of thoughts about God that are unworthy of Him."

The church needs her Bible, because without it she will believe almost anything. It seems to me, we should spend more time looking into God's attributes rather than thinking about ourselves.

The Puritans talked about "the science of the study of God". I encourage each of us to spend more time thinking about who He is.
