### **To the Saints at Christ Lutheran**

February is Lent month and my relationship with Lent has been interesting. When I was 9 or 10, we went to Wednesday night Lenten services, and it's still a mystery to me, but that's point when I decided to participate in worship: sang the hymns, prayer the prayers, and ignored the sermon. I was all in. As I became a teenager and knew everything, declared Lent as unnecessary and made up by the church. During Seminary I changed. I became curious about spiritual practices and even tried a five-day fast during Lent (full-disclosure, I dreamt about pizza and Chinese food every night though). After seminary, and let loose on the world as a pastor, I reframed Lent again. This time wondering if Lent is better observed not as gloomy self-denial, but as positive, a chance to add something good, something that helps us grow, reading the Bible or eating better. What does Lent mean to me now?

When we observe Lent together, we pause to reflect on life and what matters. As Christians, we use our time and resources with intention, and Jesus shows us the intelligent and resilient way to live; one rooted in hope and shaped by love for others. This Lent, we will see this in John's Gospel. John emphasizes the divinity of Jesus through signs and "I Am" statements; claims a rabbi would never make, but the Son of God would. Jesus' promises of Eternal Life refer to both life after death but also to a transformed way of living now. When we admit our powerlessness over sin and use Lent as a time to seek forgiveness, we experience grace. Jesus does what no one else can; forgiving our sin, reshaping our lives, and restoring us to live in the eternal life already at work within us. Lent is a time of reflection, forgiveness, and renewal.

To help us, beginning on the first Sunday of Lent, we will journey together with a daily devotional like I wrote for November; a short Scripture and prayer for each day leading up to Easter. This shared practice connects to our Lenten focus on prayer, reflection, and renewed life in Christ. To deepen that journey, we will gather for a mini retreat on a Saturday in March, at a cozy spot in Yakima (details to come). This retreat builds on last fall's prayer retreat and invites us to explore the heart of prayer: why we pray, how we pray, and what God does with our prayers. If you are hoping that this will be a planning meeting, it won't. It is space to slow down, worship, talk, laugh, eat good food, and pray together. If you are new to retreating this is also a wonderful way to spend the day with your friends. This time is for encouragement, restoration, and drawing us deeper into God's presence. Which is the true meaning of Lent.

Over the past four years, I have seen a “New Awakening” in our church community. We experience God's grace and love throughout the year and express that in so many ways. We still are a very active church, reaching out to so many people outside our doors. We open our doors and our hearts to children through some of our programs and for the older people in our community. I think Christ Lutheran is a comfortable place for those of us who are no longer spring chickens and need a place for fellowship, for worship, and belonging.

As we go forward into this new year, let us rejoice for the way the Lord has blessed us as a congregation and as His beloved children. Let us continue to be kind and generous to both those who come inside our doors and to those who we serve near and far. Let us continue planting the seeds, allowing those seeds to grow wherever they are planted. We are a mighty, little church with much more love to give. God isn't finished with us yet!

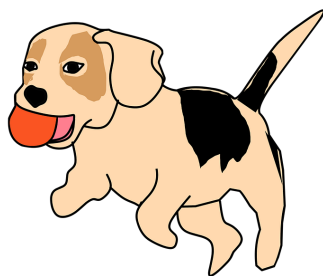
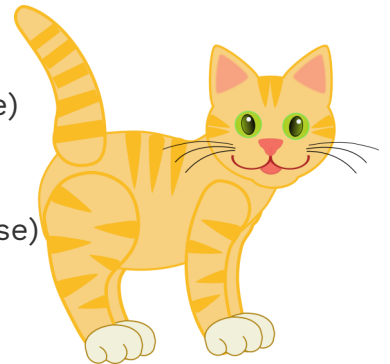

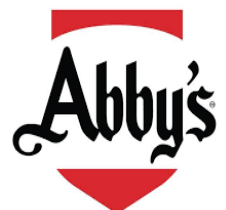

Meals on Wheels was created after the Older Americans Act of 1965 was signed into law on July 14, 1965; created to address a serious health issue of America's senior citizens: poor or inadequate nutrition. One of the many programs created under the act was the Nutrition Program which included: congregate (dining rooms) and home delivered meals. Both programs intended to increase the health, quality of life and extend the time in which a senior can remain independent and in their own home. People For People took over the program on July 1, 2011. Prior to that date Yakima County was in charge of the Meals On Wheels program.

Follow-up studies on the effectiveness of the nutrition programs has shown that Meals On Wheels intervention extends the time a senior can stay in their home instead of being placed into a nursing home by at least 3 months. The health of the senior receiving meals through either program is better, they have fewer doctor visits and the cost of the program is offset by the savings to the system.

Meals on Wheels is currently using three community centers to cook over 178,000 meals a year for seniors. The extra expense of additional staff at each location and the constant back and forth between the different kitchens has made it very inefficient to feed seniors in our community. Their goal is to raise \$2.785 million to build a new commercial kitchen which will combine all three locations into one location. Currently, they have reached 70% of their goal. The Social Ministry Committee would like to thank everyone who contributed to our Advent offering. We are excited to tell you that the total offering was \$1,694.00!!! With that amount, Christ Lutheran donated one Abundant community, 2 Vegetable gardens plus bees; 3 Goats plus a flock of chicks; and 3 roosters. The Abundant Community consists of a goat, rooster, cow, three chicks, seeds and gardening tools, honeybees, three fruit-tree seedlings, farmers' field school and a community garden. These gifts will help families living in poverty to enrich their lives with food to eat and to sell plus the tools and training to increase their productivity. Thank you once again.
