President's Message

Rose Hill History Display at Franconia Museum Unveiled

A display depicting the history of Rose Hill will be one of the permanent displays at the Franconia Museum, housed in the Franconia Governmental Center. The display will be unveiled at the March 27th meeting of the Rose Hill Civic Association at 7pm in the community room of the John Marshall Library.

Jim Cox, a native Franconian and member of the Museum Board of Directors, developed the display using information from the Rose Hill website, myrosehill.com. Jim also added information and pictures. The display covers the front and back of three large panels. Jim and Phyllis Walker Ford, president of the Franconia Museum's Board of Directors, will provide RHCA members with information about the museum. Ms. Walker Ford also is involved in the restoration of the Laurel Grove church on Beulah Street that was destroyed by fire last year. Her family originally donated the land for the church.

Items covered on the Rose Hill display include the sign honoring the Rose Hill Originals, the first families to move into our subdivision in the 1950s

Senior Safety

Almost 50 members of the Rose Hill community heard a highly informative talk on Senior Safety at our February meeting by Master Police Officer James Nida of the Franconia Police Station. Perhaps the most important message was to always, always call the police if you think you're in trouble. Call 911 for immediate help or 703.691.2131 to report a crime or suspicious activity. Officer Nida cautioned seniors to keep their doors locked and never open the door unless it's for someone they will give a hug. He also asked seniors to purchase peepholes for their doors that allow them to see the visitor full length (there may be someone crouching below them). Always be aware of your surroundings when you return home from shopping. If a stranger approaches you, don't try to run in the house. Stand and shout to attract a neighbor. Better yet, travel in pairs or let your neighbor know when you plan to return so he or she can look out for you. The rest of us can assist our senior neighbors by being aware of their schedules. Check on them daily. And, seniors, please don't be

Remembering Corporal Ramsey

The end of an era was marked on March 2 in Portland, Oregon, with the funeral of Army Corporal Howard V. Ramsey, the last living combat veteran of World War 1. Cpl. Ramsey died on February 22, a little more than one month before reaching his 109th birthday. Ramsey had inherited the title two weeks earlier with the passing of Massachusetts veteran Antonio Pierro on February 8. There are seven known WW1 veterans still living, none of whom were shipped overseas. Ramsey's lifetime spanned three centuries and 19 presidents. He was born in Rico, Colorado, on April 2, 1898, when the US flag had 45 stars and President McKinley was preparing to declare war with Spain. We can honor Cpl. Ramsey and all of our veterans by displaying the flag here in Rose Hill. RHCA has ordered flag sets for only \$8.50 each. Several residents have already ordered them. If you want one, send \$8.50 to RHCA at P.O. Box 10891, Franconia, VA 22310. Each set comes with a three-piece steel pole, gold eagle ornament, mounting bracket and fasteners, and a 3' X 5' outdoor flag fully printed on lightweight polyester and finished with white header and brass grommets. The package also includes a flag etiquette booklet. Order yours today and we will deliver the flag sets as soon as they are received.

Neighborhood Deterioration

The General Assembly has passed two bills that will help in our fight to relieve overcrowding in our neighborhood. Delegate Mark Sickles reports he voted in favor of a Senate bill that allows local zoning administrators to see subpoenas from the Commonwealth's Attorney when landlords are suspected to be in violation of boarding house laws. Also, Delegate Tom Rust and Delegate Sickles sponsored a bi-partisan bill that substantially increases the fines for convictions related to overcrowding of residential buildings. Hopefully, the governor will sign both bills into law. The wheels have turned slowly, but the efforts of RHCA and other associations are beginning to pay off at the local and state levels. Fairfax County has instituted some new rules to combat neighborhood deterioration,

usually caused by overcrowding and large numbers of automobiles at one address. Unfortunately, there aren't enough zoning inspectors to make more than a dent in the problem. RHCA supports additional zoning inspectors with the funds necessary for them to come from added fines.

4612 Roundhill Road Update

We keep going around in circles with the County regarding this eyesore in our community. We had

We keep going around in circles with the County regarding this eyesore in our community. We had hoped that some new laws that went into effect on January 1 would be helpful. So far, they are not. Zoning Enforcement established a new position to check on buildings that are structurally

unsound. After an inspection, 4612 Roundhill was classified as vacant and secure. It was referred back to Blight Abatement. That's where we came in! We have been working with Blight Abatement for years, trying to get them to declare the property so badly rundown that it needs to either be repaired or demolished. We were trying to get the Health Department to classify the property as uninhabitable. No kidding! As of January 1, the ball was passed back to Zoning Enforcement, which sprang into action and passed it back to Blight Abatement. Zoning enforcement has done some good work in Rose Hill. However, 4612 Roundhill makes everyone look bad. We will continue to push the County staff and the Supervisor's office to help us get rid of this eyesore. It is going to take some drastic action by RHCA and the neighbors to get the County's attention. We're working on a plan.

Bye-Bye On Rock-A-By

Although we aren't having any luck with 4612 Roundhill Road, it's a different story on Rock-A-By Road. And it only took two years! On March 11, the Board of Supervisors authorized the demolition of the house on Rock-A-By at the end of Lark Lane that had been almost consumed by a fire two years ago. The owner had not moved to have the structure razed, so the County stepped in. The cost of taking down the structure and securing the site will be paid

by the County with a lien against the property to recover the cost. Also to be removed is the remnants of an unprotected swimming pool that had neighbors concerned. The site has become attractive for vandals, both human and animal. Thanks to Richard Ballard of Lark Lane who spearheaded the effort to force the County to take action. He and his five-year-old daughter, Lily ChanChan, testified at the Board hearing. Several other residents of the area also attended to support Ballard in his effort. Thanks to all of them. Ballard reminded the Board that RHCA had voted unanimously at its February meeting to support demolition of this nuisance and eyesore. It probably won't be too long before we are faced with a plan to develop a number of new houses on Rock-A-By. We'll keep you informed.

Couple Involved in Money Swindle

March 16, 2007: On Thursday, March 15, between 10am and 11:30am, two men were tricked out of their money. On the first occasion, a 49-year-old Arlington man was waiting for a bus near Columbia Pike and South George Mason Drive when he was approached by a woman and a man claiming they had just found a large sum of money. The woman showed the victim a bundle of what appeared to be dollar bills. The woman suggested the money be shared three ways. The woman was persistent in trying to share the money and the victim agreed to switch wallets with her. The victim then withdrew an undisclosed amount of money from his ATM and gave it to the suspect as part of their deal. The suspects fled with all the money.

Police are investigating whether a 22-year-old Annandale man was also swindled by the same suspects. In this instance, the victim was leaving a bank located near the 4200 block of Annandale Road when he was approached by a man and woman. They asked him to see his wallet and fled with his money.

The suspects were described as Hispanic. The woman was in her 40s. She was about 5 feet 3 inches tall, weighing about 160 pounds. She wore a white shirt and dark pants. The man was in his 50s, about 5 feet 2 inches tall and weighed about 180 pounds. He wore a black coat and black jeans.

Police advise all citizens of the following safety tips:

- * Be suspicious of people trying to give money away.
- * Be aware of your personal space at the ATMs.
- * Do not regularly keep large amounts of money on your person.
- * If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.
- * Trust your instincts.
- * Immediately report suspicious activity to police.



Alert Homeowners Prevent Larceny Scam

Rose Hill residents should be wary of anyone knocking on the door selling any service or product. —Ed.

March 16, 2007: Two residents of a home in the Lorton area were the victims of an attempted scam last night. Around 5:10pm on Thursday, March 15, two men knocked on the front door of a residence in the 9500 block of Fourth Street. The homeowners answered the door and the men explained they worked with a construction company. The men told the homeowners that they needed to discuss the removal of a tree in their backyard. The husband walked into the backyard with one of the men while the second man came into the home with the wife. As the two sat at the kitchen table talking, the woman heard a noise elsewhere in the home. She went to investigate and discovered a third man attempting to steal items from inside. All three suspects fled from the home and left the area in a silver truck, possibly a Chevrolet. No items were taken and no one was injured. The suspects were all described as Hispanic and in their 30s. The first suspect was 6 feet tall and weighed 160 pounds. The second suspect was about 5 feet 7 inches tall and weighed 190 pounds.
