May Boulevard Church Update

Just hours before a scheduled public hearing before the Fairfax County Planning Commission on March 13, the lawyer for the applicant asked the County for a 60-day deferral in order to evaluate how or whether to proceed. This action was the result of a close vote recommending denial at the March 10 Lee District Land Use Advisory Committee. Previously, the Rose Hill Civic Association had voted overwhelmingly to oppose the application, which seeks to add a 200-seat church to the already approved 200-pupil school at the site of the old community center. The site has been used as a private school for 40 years or more. In the opinion of RHCA, the addition of a church would overwhelm the neighborhood, increasing activity to seven days a week including evenings. The current school and child care operates only

during the work day and commute period. Thanks to all of you who allowed your names to be used in opposition, the Land Use Committee rejected the proposal, albeit by a very close vote. The applicant tried to assert that positive action would preserve the unique and historic silos on the property. However, RHCA countered that the silo issue didn't apply since they already were protected by a previous approval for the current school. Despite the uncomfortable position of opposing a church, RHCA felt this particular proposal at this particular location was a detriment rather than an asset. The church is question already operates in Arlington, so it would bring an influx of additional traffic to an area where four of the five surrounding streets end in cul de sacs. No doubt we will hear more on this issue and we will be prepared to respond. If you haven't allowed your name to be added to the list of those opposed to what we consider an intensification of the use of this property, please do so at the March 25 meeting of by e-mailing me at sellcarl@aol.com or calling 703-971-4716. Leave a message if I'm not available. As it stands, we think the proposal is clearly in conflict with Fairfax County's comprehensive plan and zoning ordinance. We have prevailed in that view so far even though the County staff disagrees. Stay Tuned!

Another Landslide

Just a few weeks back, there was another landslide involving marine clay in the new Rose Hill Reserve community. This one was in the area on the hillside near Basha Court above the storm water management pond. It can be seen from the corner of Haystack Road and the short section of Split Rock Drive and from the cul de sac at the end of Basha Court. The existing Rose Hill houses on May Boulevard and Silo Road are of immediate concern as well as the new homes at the end of Basha Court. This slide appears to be more widespread than the previous slide which was closer to the golf course end on the hillside. The hill was graded significantly in order to build the pond to County regulations for water retention. After the previous slide, piers filled with concrete were buried above the area in an effort to prevent a reoccurrence. For various reasons, no piers were added in the area of the new slide. There are piers

around most of the rest of the perimeter of Rose Hill Reserve. They are, designed to protect the existing and new homes. At this point, engineers for the developer, Stanley Martin, are evaluating the area of the slide in an effort to repair and prevent more damage. The County will have to approve any engineering plans before work can begin. Because part of the slide is in an easement area on private property, an agreement to allow the work is necessary. The only good news is the fact that the developer is still on bond and will have to pay for the repairs. After the previous slide, RHCA and Supervisor McKay's office demanded that the County not release the bonds until there was a reasonable expectation that both the new and old homes were adequately protected. Good thing we did! As soon as a plan for repairs is available, RHCA will make comments as to the likelihood that they will be effective. We hope to discuss the proposed repairs at a subsequent RHCA meeting. Hindsight is 20-20, but if we had been listened to, there would be less development in marine clay areas, especially where slopes are involved. Our goal in this case is to protect the existing homes that surround Rose Hill Reserve as assist our new neighbors as they cope with the consequences. Bring your questions to the March 25 RHCA meeting and we'll try to get answers.

The Five-Letter Word (TAXES)

Given the recent considerable increase in real estate assessments, taxes are projected to go up more than \$300 for the average homeowner in Fairfax County this year. Also, the Board of Supervisors has advertised a two-cent increase in the rate per hundred, adding another \$100 to the average bill. It no doubt will be higher in Rose Hill, given what I've heard about the increase in assessments. While the assessment cost won't change for most, the rate may be lowered. The County Executive's proposed budget projects the same rate as last year. As usual, schools account for more than half of the County Executive's proposed budget but the School Superintendent and School Board are asking for more. If the school request is fully funded, the rate would have to more than double what the Supervisors propose. All of this will play out over the next few weeks as all the special interest groups suggest even more increases

in the budget. The Board will adopt its budget and set the tax rate on April 29. Look for it to be somewhere between the carryover rate proposed by the County Executive and the two-cent increase suggested by the Board of Supervisors. Here in Rose Hill, the biggest problem I constantly hear is the lack of adequate police patrols. This year's budget proposes no increase in the number of officers on patrol. There is additional funding for policing at the new Tyson's Corner metropolis and the opening of Metro's Silver Line. In contrast, the proposed South County station that has been on the radar screen for a number of years isn't even mentioned. Since the Mount Vernon, Springfield and Franconia stations serve the South County area (Lorton), we would benefit from more coverage due to the shorter miles traveled on patrol. I have argued that there is enough slack in our \$3.7 Billion budget to fund the new station without a corresponding tax increase. I believe there is the opportunity to cut school administration and earmark unused funds, for example, to provide money for added police protection, especially when there already is \$65 million in the police budget that directly benefit the schools such as crossing guards and resource officers. No one, including me, wants to short change the classroom teachers and instruction, but I contend there are other savings that can be directed toward the police budget for added protection of our citizens. Especially since more than 70 percent of our residents don't have kids in school. The South County police station hasn't been built because the schools soak up most of the County's bonded indebtedness for new construction and rehabilitation. We need adequate patrol officers to protect our homes and our schools and I don't believe we have enough to do so.

Burglaries From Vehicles

In recent months, there have been a number of reports of overnight burglaries from vehicles in the street and driveways of homes in Rose Hill. Maybe the criminals think we have become complacent with the idea that our community is a safe place to live. Many of the burglaries have been from vans and trucks belonging to businesses, either located here or parked overnight by an

employee. Expensive tools are the preferred target. Residents are reminded to make sure their vehicle is securely locked when parked overnight. Even better, make sure your alarm system is working. If you don't have one on your vehicle, it might be a good idea to get one. Everyone is asked to keep an eye out for suspicious vehicles or people in the neighborhood. If you see or hear something, call the police. If you can, get a description of the person and/or tag number of the vehicle you suspect. Even if it's only a partial tag number, it may lead to an arrest because someone else recorded the other numbers. In one case, the same address has been hit three times, leading to speculation that the criminal either knows or lives in the neighborhood. It also is a good idea to leave the outside lights on at night. That will either deter a theft or help someone identify the criminal. If you get up for other reasons during the night, look out the window for suspicious activity nearby. Usually, a rash of these burglaries is finally traced to one person or a local gang. Whatever you see will help the police, so don't be afraid to call the non-emergency number at 703-691-2131. Of course, if you see a crime in progress, call 911.

Membership Dues DUE

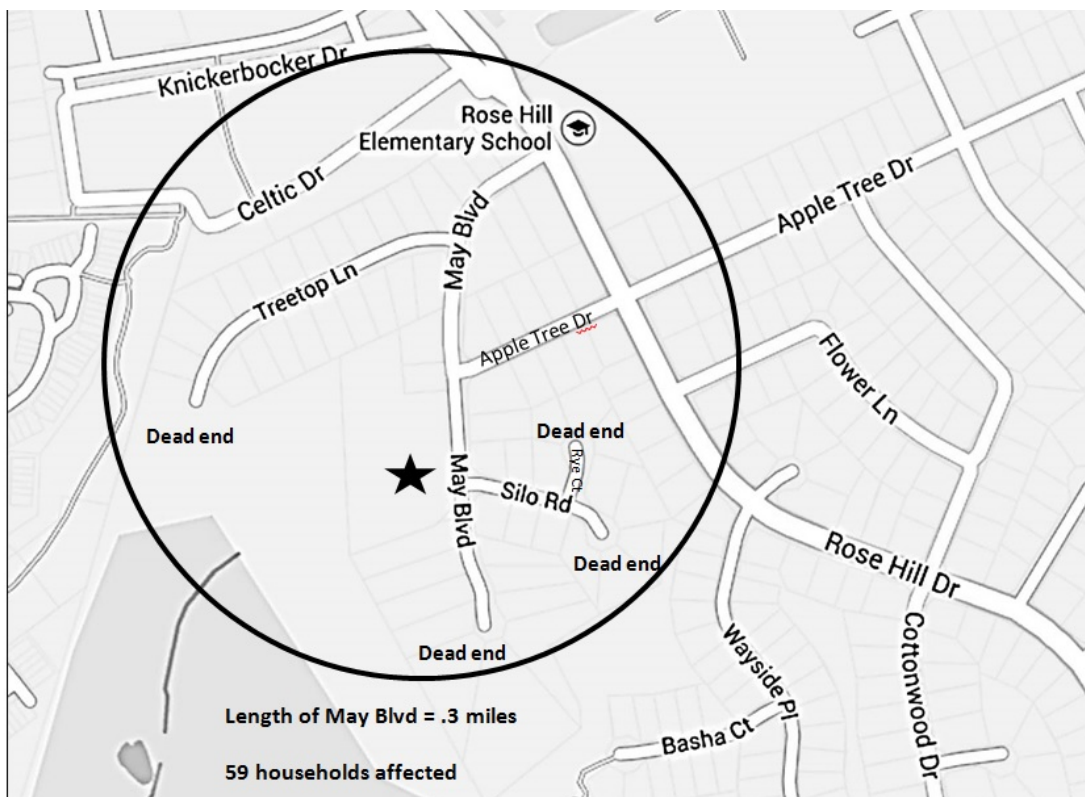

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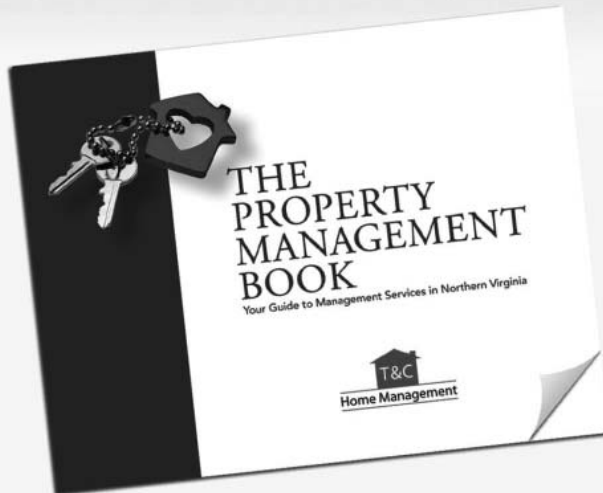
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SIX Common Misconceptions about Roofing and the Roofing Industry:

Misconception #1. You should wait as long as possible to re-roof your home.

No! Your roof takes a beating every day from sun, wind and rain. Your shingles become brittle and crack with age and have a tendency to blow off and fail at an alarming rate with age. This exposes the roof decking (the sub-structure that literally, "keeps you out of the rain") to moisture which slowly deteriorates and rots the wood beneath, leading to leaks and more extensive damage.

Further, the metal flashings around chimney areas and at adjoining exterior walls (or rooflines), the penetration collars (around plumbing and heat stacks) and all other vents become worn and prone to water infiltration.

Next time you're outside, take a close look at your roof (most people don't pay attention to it until there's a problem). How does it look? Is it rough and weathered? Are the shingles "curling" or cracking? Is one section very distinguishable from all other areas? Finally, are you proud of the way your roof helps "show" your home, or are you embarrassed by its appearance?

Remember: By the time you have waited "as long as possible," you have probably waited too long and will end up spending your hard earned money on interior and sub-structure repairs, as well as a much needed roof replacement.

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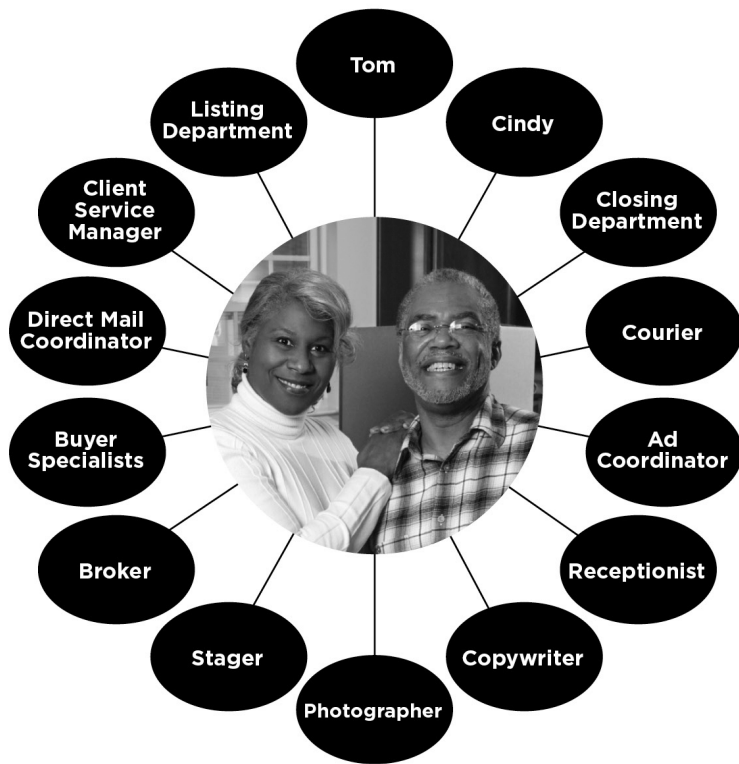
