Last month, we shared about the team that came from Grace Community Church of Spofford, New Hampshire. While they were here, our native brothers were able to learn how to lay bricks side by side for our walls, along with a number of other techniques and lessons on construction. After the team left, we realized how important the training was, and we developed a whole discipleship plan to equip four native brothers in construction.

As we see in the verse, even Paul had need of working his trade at times, just to sustain himself or to make inroads with those around him. Likewise, our Pañ friends are in the same boat; their churches are in such poverty, and there is little hope of them supporting their own outreach for the foreseeable future. The answer to the problem at this time seems to be "tentmaking". In other words, they need a trade to support themselves and their families if they have any hope of reaching the other 50 plus Pañ communities in our region. Everywhere we go, people are begging to have someone build a small home or a shed.

With these skills, these men will be able to support their families or even work and give to another's needs so that they can go in their place and take the gospel to their people in another unreached community. We were excited to hear this testimony from one of the men being trained. "I have attempted to do this kind of work in the past, but without experience, the other workers don't want us to do any of the work. Two examples are laying brick or squaring the house; they fear we will mess things up and make their work take longer. We are so thankful for the chance you have given us here, to not only watch and learn but to do hands-on practice. Thank you for this opportunity."

Praise the Lord, we are excited to see how the Lord will use this training in the future to further His kingdom.
