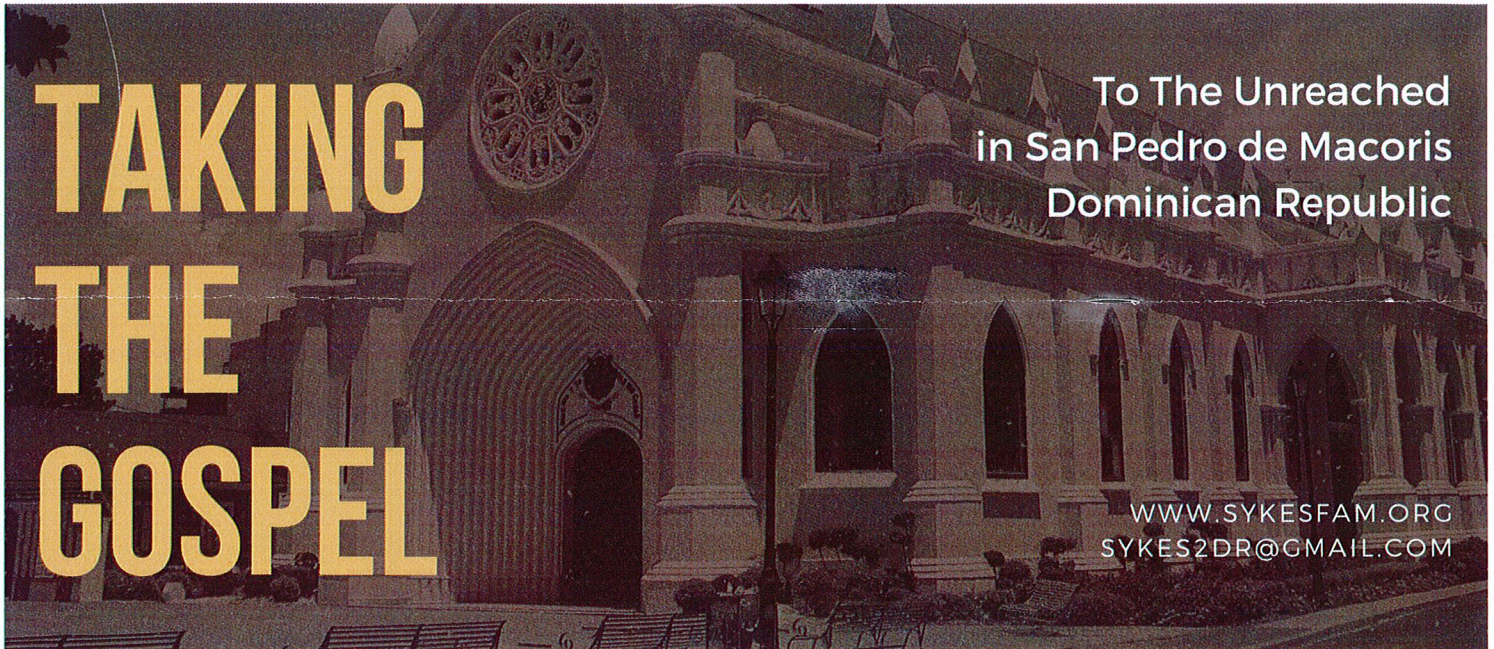

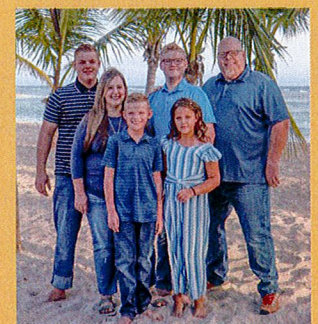

SOLEMN GOODBYE'S

The end of December and beginning of January had a bit of a more solemn tone to them. My mom purchased tickets for us to return to the United States for Christmas.

My dad has a severe case of Alzheimers and he continues to decline in his health. We returned to the US for 2 and a half weeks in December. I had the opportunity to see my dad a couple of times. Just a couple of weeks before our arrival he was still at home, he was mobile, and he was still preparing his beloved peanut butter sandwiches.

He fell several times in a row, and mom took him to the emergency room. After that they sent him to a rehabilitation facility and in just a few short weeks his health has deteriorated even more. He is nearly completely incontinent and now requires 24 hour care. He went from being completely mobile at home to spending nearly all of his time in a wheel chair or in bed. On many days he is close to non-verbal and on the days that he does speak, he makes no sense.

It is hard to see what is happening physically to my dad. It breaks my heart to see my mom struggle emotionally every day as she goes to visit him and watch his continued decline. It tore my heart out to see my children with tears streaming down their cheeks knowing that this might be the last time they get to say goodbye to their grandpa.

Dementia is a tricky disease. It takes some quickly while others struggle for years. We don't know how long dad has left. We are not 100% sure that he is a believer. Dad was never much for church, but there were times we saw him laying in bed reading the Bible. Unfortunately, his childhood was difficult and he had a life-long struggle with insecurity and bitterness.

I don't know how much dad really understands what is going on around him. Sometimes he talks about Jesus. Sometimes he folds his hands like he is praying and just speaks gibberish. Only God truly knows what is going on inside his mind. Please pray with us for dad as well as the others we are spiritually investing in here in the Dominican. We just keep pointing people to Jesus!
