THE JERUSALEM COUNCIL

Acts 15:1-35

INTRODUCTION

The Jerusalem Council addresses a theological dispute between the ultra-conservative Jewish Christians of the early church and the apostles. This disagreement centers around the specific requirements Gentiles need to meet to be saved. The council's decision, affirming salvation by grace through faith alone, not only resolved a pressing theological dispute but also set the stage for the expansion of Christianity beyond its Jewish roots, shaping the future of the faith.

THIS WEEK:

This week, discover from Acts 15:1-35 how the Jerusalem Council officially codifies its doctrine of salvation for the Church by affirming that the gospel is by grace alone through faith in Christ alone.

OBSERVATION *What does it SAY?*

Discover key details of the passage by reading Acts 15:1-35 and then answering the following questions:

1. What specific issue sparked the controversy in Antioch that led to the Jerusalem Council (Acts 15:1, 5)?
2. What proof(s) did Peter, Barnabas, Paul, and James present in the Council to support their conviction that observing the Mosaic law was unnecessary for Gentile Christians (Acts 15:7-18)?

3. What four restrictions did the Council place on the believing Gentiles, and what was the rationale for such restrictions? (vv. 20-21)

4. What steps did the Church take to communicate its decision to the Gentiles (vv. 22-23)?

HERESY IN N.T.

The Greek word from which "heresy" derives (ἀἵρεσις, hairesis) originally meant "choice" or "opinion."

The word appears nine times in the New Testament, often referring to a religious sect characterized by its distinct opinions or practices (Acts 5:17; 15:5; 24:5; 26:5).

"Heresy" eventually came to mean a belief deviating from established doctrine in major areas like the Trinity, Christology, and soteriology. Those who embrace error in such cardinal doctrines are known as heretics. The term seems to be used this way in 2 Pet 2:1 to describe how false teachers had taken a dangerous departure from sound doctrine by denying Jesus.
