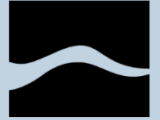


# SERMON NOTES

## FAITHFUL TO THE END

### 2 Timothy 4:6-8



**BIG IDEA:** Being faithful to the end requires the conviction to pour out our lives for Christ, commitment to never quit or compromise, and confidence in our eternal reward.

# APPLICATION GUIDE

NOVEMBER 10, 2024

## DISCUSS

What does Paul mean when he describes his life as being “poured out as a drink offering” (v. 6)? How does this OT imagery deepen our understanding of Paul’s attitude toward his life and ministry?

In verse 7, Paul uses three images—fighting the good fight, finishing the race, and keeping the faith. How do each of these images reflect different aspects of the Christian life?

Why is Paul confident in receiving the “crown of righteousness” (v. 8)? What does this reward represent, and how does it contrast with the condemnation he faced from Nero?

## APPLY

In what areas of your life are you feeling called to “pour out” yourself in service to Christ? Are there things you’re holding back that He may be asking you to surrender?

Paul was committed to staying the course even in hardship. What challenges make it hard for you to remain committed to following Christ, and what helps you stay strong in your faith?

Paul eagerly anticipated Christ’s return. Do you anticipate Christ’s appearance, and why or why not?

How does the promise of an eternal reward shape your perspective on temporary sacrifices and struggles in your faith journey?

## COMMIT

What’s one specific area of your life where you want to be more intentional about “finishing well” for Christ? How can you begin taking steps this week to strengthen your faithfulness in that area?

### Further Study

Read Hebrews 12:1-3. How does the imagery of a race in this passage compare to Paul’s language in 2 Timothy 4:7? How can both passages inspire perseverance in our Christian walk?

Explore Romans 5:1-5. How does the hope of future glory and reward give us strength to endure suffering? How does this passage reinforce Paul’s confidence in his eternal reward in 2 Timothy 4:8?
