Associate Pastor's Report

An In-Between Place

When I think back on 2025, it feels like so much of what was happening in the life and ministry of this church existed in an in-between space, a place somewhere between what was and what will be. The main headline of the year was, of course, the renovations to the building. That, in and of itself, was a huge undertaking as we held meetings to think about everything from floor plans to furniture, storage units to paint samples. I was personally part of some of the planning meetings with the architects, helped with the clean-out and storage of the old spaces, and worked with Kirby Smith on communication about the Capital Campaign.

As a staff and congregation, we had to rethink how to do almost every ministry and mission of the church, like how to run a VBS with half a building, how to host meals without a kitchen, how to hold two styles of worship in the same space, and so on. Through it all, I have seen such a team effort to not just “make it work,” but to make it beautiful, meaningful, and sacred. We didn’t just survive this in-between moment; I believe we answered the call of this moment with deep love and a dedication to walk alongside our community through worship, mission, and ministry.

Personal Growth

This past year, I was part of a Clergy Cohort run by the Presbytery of Philadelphia and made possible through a Lilly Endowment Grant. My cohort is made up of five clergy and ministry leaders from the region. We meet monthly to pray, learn, and grow together. We are invited to retreats and learning opportunities, and we are given the chance to have monthly professional coaching free of charge. All of these opportunities have given me space to grow personally and professionally over the past year. They have been an especially helpful resource as I have navigated a change in my role here at Thompson this past year. With Zena joining the staff and leading children and youth ministry, I have stepped away from my work with Sunday School, Kids Club, and VBS and stepped into some new roles.

New Beginnings

God is always up to something new here at Thompson, and I was able to be part of two new ministry areas this past year.

First, as a congregation, we have been looking across the river to Lambertville and noticing that many of the churches there were closing. For a decade, the Methodist church hosted a weekly community meal, and when the church closed its doors, the meal ended. We saw an opportunity to bring that meal back in a new location and serve neighbors who need a good meal.

In October, we held our first meal in Lambertville at Lambertville Presbyterian Church. Members of our congregation, folks who had been part of the previous meal, and members of the community came together to make this monthly meal such a success that, starting in March 2026, we will have the capacity to host the meal twice a month. When we first had the idea to try to bring this meal back, we were not sure how it would work, where it would be hosted, or who would come—but God had a plan and opened doors for us. So much so, in fact, that for the first few months, I was turning away volunteers (an unheard-of problem for a pastor). What a gift it has been to be part of this new mission.

New Beginnings

Another exciting new ministry that has taken shape over the past year is the opportunity to open a preschool here at Thompson. The Methodist church down the road in Solebury closed, and that church had a preschool meeting in its building. The director reached out to us to see if she might bring her school here. Of course, we were in the midst of renovations, so the timing was not ideal. However, we stayed in touch, kept praying about what to do, and together saw an opportunity to begin something new here at Thompson with a veteran director who could help make it a reality—New Hope Preschool. I have been working with Stephanie, Rick Schaub, and Colleen Reedy, the director, to help launch this new ministry, and I am excited for us to open our doors in fall 2026.

Looking Ahead

For much of the year, I found myself looking toward the completion of the building renovation and thinking of it as an ending. But really, it is just the start of the next chapter. Each year we turn the calendar page and begin again—listening for God's leading and continuing to show up and serve the people of God in this place. Our work is not about arriving somewhere, but about faithfully putting one foot in front of the other.

I am drawn to this quote from Martin Luther and invite you to carry its sentiment with you into the new year:

"This life, therefore, is not righteousness, but growth in righteousness; not health but healing; not being but becoming; not rest but exercise. We are not yet what we shall be, but we are growing toward it; the process is not finished but it is going on. This is not the end, but it is the road; all does not yet gleam in glory, but all is being purified."

What we accomplished this year

The property committee has an amazing group of volunteers that have given time, talent and resources to work through three tiers of items through 2025. We discuss all levels of repairs and maintenance through the year and work with the Head of Facilities at TMPC and the Business Admin for any associated combined works that are on the docket. Listed below is a brief highlight of things we worked through in 2025 and will continue with in 2026. Short Term Work - This consisted of septic repairs, roof issues, tree work and removals, storm water discussions and planning, elevator repairs, masonry repairs, lighting repairs, and any last minute assistance needed from the BWM team. Long term Project Work - We are pushing through ideas and evaluating costs for work on exterior lighting (along with work on this that has been completed in 2025), working with a team on additional parking on the property, future roofing needs and quotes, existing parking lot repairs (sealcoating when BWM is done) and evaluating stucco issues. The 2026 Stewardship Campaign was carried out by Pastor Stephanie and the Finance Committee.

What we accomplished this year

In the fall of 2025, Thompson ran the Leverage stewardship campaign. We challenged the Thompson community to devote our resources to God so that he could multiply them into something far greater and, through them, impact the world. We sought to trust God with what we have - time, money and talents - believing that through us God will do something amazing, something bigger than we could have ever imagined. As in recent years, the people of Thompson met the challenge, demonstrating a continuing willingness to grow in faith and commitment to God's work in our lives and community. The campaign resulted in 19 first-time pledges, easily exceeding the goal of 15. Similarly, the depth of individual commitment grew. The campaign set a goal of a 5% average giving increase per pledging unit. At the conclusion of the campaign, the average increase among repeat pledgers was 6.71%, exceeding the goal by 34.2%. Finally, the campaign set a goal of pledged dollars sufficient to support a 2026 church budget of \$1.06 million. The \$932,069 pledged, when taken in conjunction with projected non-pledge income, will support a total budget well in excess of \$1.1 million! The Leverage campaign resulted in new record highs for Thompson in both the number of pledges received and the total dollars pledged. We must now leverage those gifts, through Christ's work in our lives, to do the amazing and impact the world.

Personnel Committee

Staff Life and Leadership Culture

The staff at TMPC continue to be a blessing to our congregation. With two dedicated pastors and a team of faithful lay staff, there is a strong sense of unity and shared purpose in our leadership. The staff meet every Wednesday morning for a time of deep devotion and prayer, led in turn by each staff member. This is followed by a review of the calendar, congregational needs, and preparation of the weekly bulletin and other church concerns.

Personnel Changes and Transitions

At the beginning of the year, Tom Barford served as Personnel Chair. Midyear, Tom stepped away from the position. During the interim, Pastor Stephanie handled staff concerns. In early 2026, Rick Schaub assumed the role of Personnel Chairperson. During this transition, Rick Schaub, Tracey Jefferson, and Dave Callans volunteered to serve on an ad hoc committee to conduct annual reviews for the pastors. In 2025, TMPC hired Faith Macwana as Director of Children and Youth Ministry. During her probationary period, Faith resigned from her role. The Personnel Committee reopened the search and, in August, hired Dr. Zena Trednick-Kirby.

Bill Stauffer, our beloved Contemporary Music Director, also announced that he and his wife will be moving to Texas, effective June 2026. His leadership, creativity, and friendship will be greatly missed.

Reviews and Compensation

All staff members participate in an annual review that highlights strengths and areas for growth. Each staff member also works with the Head of Staff to set goals and discern how best to lead and serve the church in the coming year.

You will notice a financial increase in Pastor Bailey's salary in the proposed budget. The PC(USA) has made significant changes to clergy benefit costs and will continue increasing those costs over the next three years. The Personnel Committee will continue to monitor these changes and make appropriate recommendations to the Finance Committee.

You will also see an increase in the salary for the organist position. When Ariana DuPont joined us, she was an accomplished pianist with no prior organ experience and was hired at the lower end of the range. She has since pursued organ lessons and grown tremendously in skill and confidence. Her salary has been adjusted to reflect her dedication and professional growth.

Pastoral Care and Sabbath Practices

Because our pastors work on Sundays and do not enjoy a traditional weekend, they are each afforded one day off during the week. Pastor Stephanie observes a Sabbath on Mondays, and Pastor Bailey on Fridays. We encourage the congregation to honor these days and help protect this time for rest and family.

What we accomplished this year

Overall, the cemetery committee had a very busy and blessed year. We are blessed with an active and talented committee. Because of this, we have had the opportunity to complete a number of services and projects in 2025.

Below is a list of some of this work:

1. We supported 14 burials, eight (8) full burials and six (6) burials of cremains.
2. We supported four (4) church members that in total purchased eight (8) individual graves.
3. We supported the installation of eight (8) grave monuments.
4. New signs have been created and placed throughout the cemetery. This includes a history sign, multiple welcome signs with cemetery regulations, and cemetery section signs.
5. A \$20,000 cemetery restoration project is contracted and ready to begin in the summer of 2026. The oldest sections of the cemetery have many (over 200) fallen and broken gravestones. These gravestones will be repaired and restored. To assist with the funding of this project, we have applied for a grant of \$10,000 from the DAR (Daughters of the American Revolution).
6. The cemetery's financial reporting process has been greatly improved. We now have accurate monthly income statements, monthly statements of balances (reporting of investment and operating accounts), job control reporting (to ensure the accuracy of income and expenses for each cemetery "job").
7. We have realigned the cemetery's financial investments with the financial goals, both short-term and long-term, of the cemetery. This has been successful and has delivered a significant improvement in our return on investment.
8. We sponsored a local Boy Scout whose work in the cemetery allowed him to earn the rank of Eagle Scout. His Eagle Scout project included learning how to properly clean gravestones, the creation of an education video on that subject, and the leading of a group of scouts in the cleaning of some of the oldest gravestones in the cemetery. He was a very nice young man and did excellent work.
9. With the help of the committee and a few additional volunteers, we designed and created a new Reflection Garden in the cemetery. There are benches, local plants, and a river stone patio for visitors of the cemetery to enjoy.
10. A Kawaski Mule (a golf cart-type vehicle with seating and a small dumping truck bed) was purchased to assist with cemetery maintenance and general transportation in the cemetery. It is a used vehicle, but so far it has worked nicely. In fact, it has become a useful tool for the church, as James, our church facility manager, uses it frequently.
11. The church/cemetery property line in the far back of the cemetery has been clearly marked. When working on this project, it was discovered that a neighbor had placed significant debris from tree removal onto church property. When this was brought to our neighbor's attention, the debris was cleaned up and removed. It is nice to have good neighbors.
12. Multiple Cemetery Clean-up Days were held throughout the year. Thanks to church volunteers and the committee, they were successful events.
13. Dead trees were taken down and removed from the cemetery.
14. New wall racking and shelving were installed in the cemetery garage.

In 2026, we will continue to serve our Lord, the cemetery, and our church family. We are blessed to have this opportunity.

What we accomplished this year

2025 was a year of busy mission activity at TMPC providing financial support and volunteer time to our partners in the community and to the Philadelphia Presbytery. Our committee, congregation members, and friends of TMPC joyfully stepped up and out during 2025 to help others and share the love of Jesus with our time, money, and talents. It is our joyful desire to help those in need as we are called to do. At TMPC, our mission is to financially give away about 12% of our general income each year to our "Missions Partners" that include local, nearby, and international organizations. Each organization is vetted for accountability before checks are sent. In 2025, a total of \$130,000 was given to the organizations listed below. Much food, and clothing was also provided. The Building What Matters construction prevented some of the normally scheduled, on-site activities such as the Fall Rummage Sale and some of the Fall Serve Weekend projects. We look forward to resuming these activities in 2026 in the new and improved facilities!

2025 Activities:

- Rummage Sale-- The Spring sale was held at TMPC bringing in \$5,200. Organizers, helpers, and shoppers all had a fun time. TMPC decided in 2023 to start a scholarship fund for Urban Promise Trenton contributing \$5,000 annually from the rummage sale proceeds.
- Serve Weekend-- During one weekend in May and one in November, TMPC members and friends donated many service hours to the community. For TASK, we prepared 475 hygiene kits, 200 cold and flu kits, 275 first aid kits, 700 sandwiches, and 10,000 sets of utensils. Other events included roadside litter cleanup of Route 32 from Bowman's to Odette's, helping Rolling Harvest at Gravity Hill farm, preparing 275 burritos for the Welcome Church in Philadelphia, making 450 breakfast bags for Fisherman's Mark in Lambertville, assembling 40 Thanksgiving food bags for the Bucks County Opportunity Council, preparing 10,000 meal kits for Rise Against Hunger, assembling goodie bags for the Pride Parade, and making 300 breakfast bags for Fisherman's Mark.
- Trenton Area Soup Kitchen (TASK-- In 2025, under the leadership of Chuck Green, we volunteered to assist with meal service and other initiatives at TASK. Twice a month, members of the congregation went to serve meals. Each day, TASK distributes between 400-650 lunches. In December, the church provided and helped distribute 300 new hoodie jackets at TASK's annual holiday event. This was the 25th year that TMPC has sponsored this event.
- Fisherman's Mark August Backpack Project --TMPC partnered with Fisherman's Mark to provide 32 new backpacks and school supplies for middle and high school students from participant families. The students were able to have a "shopping" experience at Fisherman's Mark where they picked out their own backpack and supplies under FM guidance and school recommendations. What a great experience this was them!
- Monthly Food Drive-- Led by Susan Achenbach, every month our congregation donates to local food pantries through our food drive held on the third Wednesday of every month. Donations can be dropped off between 10 and 10:30 on those days or dropped off ahead of time on our food pantry shelves. Volunteer drivers then deliver the food to four local food pantries that include Fisherman's Mark, Delaware Valley Food Pantry, Morrisville Presbyterian Food Pantry and TASK.
- Meals for Fisherman's Mark-- Each month TMPC prepared 100 meals that were provided to homebound seniors through Fisherman's Mark. Volunteers from the church meet on the first Tuesday of the month to assemble the meals. We ask for food donations from the congregation beforehand. This effort is led by Susan Achenbach and Cheryl Boyle.
- In addition to the aforementioned projects coordinated by the Missions Committee, the Monday Morning Women's Group, led by Sue Wert, generously provided food, clothing, and money to local organizations caring for our neighbors in need. Fisherman's Mark was provided about 7,000 personal hygiene items, Beauty on the Block (Trenton) received \$2,000 for their programs, and 50 prayer shawls were handmade and presented to shut-ins.

Building What Matters

A Message from Mike Wert

After two years of study and developing concepts, Building What Matters began in earnest in January. Our partners—Mann Hughes Architecture, Kirby Smith Associates, and Fickler Construction—started to ply their trades.

During the first five months of the year, Mann Hughes prepared detailed plans for our project. Staff and member teams worked with the architects on various aspects of the project, such as the kitchen, youth and children’s spaces, offices, and state-of-the-art audiovisual, network, and security systems.

Kirby Smith completed a feasibility study and launched the capital campaign with a target of \$4 million, receiving a resounding response. Fickler Construction conducted a comprehensive study of our building and prepared a cost estimate. Together with our architect, they secured permits from the township for all aspects of the project, including plumbing, electrical and HVAC.

Alongside staff, we prepared a budget that included construction costs, furniture, lighting fixtures, AV and network, kitchen appliances, design elements, and signage. When all estimated costs were in, we developed a budget for the project totaling \$3.96 million, which included a contingency of \$350,000 for unforeseen items associated with an extensive renovation. To date, we have spent \$2.6 million and expect the project will be completed within our budget.

Finally, on June 2, 2025, demolition on phase one began. Staff adapted to working in half the building. Offices became classrooms. Our mission continued uninterrupted despite the inconvenience. In September, phase one was complete. Staff had just three days to make the transition to the lower level and the new classrooms. After three long days, demolition began on phase two.

Today, we can see the transformation. Phase two is almost complete. When we have our inaugural service on March 22nd, we’ll all worship together in the new Gathering Hall—a completely transformed space for worship and events. We will celebrate the conclusion of a three-year labor of love.

Financial support for Building What Matters has been overwhelming. To date, our congregation has pledged \$3.69 million toward our \$4 million goal, with two years still remaining in the campaign. \$2.76 million has been received.

We thank our partners—Mann Hughes, Fickler, and Kirby Smith—for their professionalism and commitment to the success of our project. We thank staff for accommodating the inconvenience and extra hours of work. We thank our fellow worshipers for their prayers, as well as their financial and moral support. We are truly a faithful family of Christians.

What we accomplished this year

The Lambertville Ministry Team had a busy and exciting year in 2025. At the dawn of the year, we were focused on information gathering and planning. At the time of this report, we have 4 active ministry initiatives and are gaining significant name recognition and traction within Lambertville. In the winter of 2025, The Bridge partnered with Fisherman's Mark to create an Emergency Utility Assistance Fund to assist resource-challenged local residents with emergency aid for utility bills. During 2025, Thompson contributed \$5,000 to the fund. During the first nine months of 2025, the fund, which is administered by Fisherman's Mark, paid 26 utility bills totaling over \$9,500. In March 2025, Session authorized The Bridge Lambertville to initiate a coffeehouse in Lambertville called The Bridge, which would present a "soft" Christian message to currently unchurched people in a non-threatening environment and thereby serve as a vehicle to develop community and relationships with those who are not now comfortable exploring a traditional church experience. From May 2025 through January 2026, The Bridge hosted three coffeehouses with total attendance of 98. Additional coffeehouses are scheduled for the third Friday night of each month from February through June 2026. In August 2025, Session authorized The Bridge Lambertville to initiate a Lambertville Community Meal to replace a similar community meal that had been hosted by Centenary United Methodist Church until August 2024. Under the leadership of Pastor Bailey, The Bridge has hosted such a luncheon at Lambertville Presbyterian Church on the second Wednesday of each month from October 2025 through January 2026. Luncheon attendance has increased each month and other community organizations, including The Kalmia Club, Lambertville Historical Society, and Fisherman's Mark, have expressed interest in taking responsibility for providing the food and volunteers for additional luncheons. Therefore, beginning in March 2026, The Bridge Lambertville Community Meal will occur on both the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month. In September 2026, Session approved the hiring of a part-time ministry leader dedicated to advancing the mission of The Bridge Lambertville. The position will be funded from donations designated specifically to support Thompson's Lambertville ministry. Although a number of applications have been received, the position has not yet been filled. In December 2025, The Bridge launched an intercessory prayer group, led by Bill Stauffer, to support Thompson's Lambertville ministry. Members of the group include Jim Alpaugh, Melissa Callans, Jeff Campbell, Tim Stanford, Bill Stauffer and Pastor Stephanie. The group meets on the first Tuesday evening of each month.

We have seen God's presence in each of our ministry initiatives.

- The outpouring of support for the Lambertville Community Meal, both from individuals and other local organizations, has demonstrated both the need and community-building opportunities inherent in that ministry.
- Similarly, the confluence of high utility costs and increasingly extreme weather evidences the critical need for a well-funded and promoted Emergency Utility Assistance Fund. The need for utility assistance from Fisherman's Mark increased by more than 100% from 2024 to 2025.
- The Bridge Coffeehouse has increased the awareness of Thompson and its ministries to many unchurched Lambertvillians. A number of the attendees at the January 2026 coffeehouse commented that they want to visit or "check-out" Thompson.
- The intercessory prayer group is deepening participants' reliance on the power of God and of awareness of the importance of prayer in advancing our ministries.

Throughout 2025, God has blessed our efforts and reinforced both the need and opportunities for a vibrant Christian ministry in Lambertville.

Act 2 Ministry Overview

ACT 2 is a welcoming mission designed primarily to serve the 55+ community, while remaining open and inclusive to people of all ages. This ministry exists in response to a common reality of aging: as social circles often grow smaller, losses of friends, spouses, and independence tend to grow greater. ACT 2 seeks to counter this isolation by fostering connection, enrichment, and shared experiences.

Over the past two years, 80 TMPC members have attended at least one ACT 2 event, with many members of the broader local community also participating and benefiting from this mission. In 2025 alone, the ACT 2 committee hosted 23 events, offering a wide variety of opportunities for engagement. These included Bible studies, guest speakers, bingo, Broadway shows, and trips.

The highlight event of the year was a group trip to Sight & Sound Theatre to experience the production Noah, which was enthusiastically received by participants. Throughout 2025, a total of 554 event spots were filled, reflecting both the strong interest in and the meaningful impact of the ACT 2 ministry.

A message from Jeffrey Berry

The TMPC deacons had another fine year of dedicated service and sacrifice to the congregation of TMPC as well as to visitors and guests. We began the year with 15 dedicated Deacons. Going into 2026, we are at 14. Cathy Sanford and I served as Co-moderators and alternated moderating our monthly meetings. Cathy has concluded her current term as a Deacon; Kate Kay and I will now serve as the Co-moderators.

The Deacons generously gave their time, talents, and love of service to our congregation and friends of TMPC throughout 2025. Responsibilities continued being divided into sub-committees, which primarily included: ushering/greeting, communion preparation, congregational care, and funeral luncheons. We now have 16 dedicated deacons to take on 2026 and the years ahead. The Deacons continued to meet monthly on the second Saturday of each month. The Deacons also hosted three funeral luncheons throughout the year, with varying numbers of guests in attendance.

The detailed care list helped to provide either cards, calls, at-home communion, visits, or rides each month to members who were in need. The goal moving forward with the care list in 2026 is to pair each deacon with 2-4 care list congregants and to have at least one touch point for each person on the list each month. There were several families and members in need of meals during the year. These needs were met by the Deacons, with help from other members of the congregation. Additionally, during the year, we contributed funds to members of our congregation with extenuating circumstances. It is a great privilege and honor to serve as Co-moderator of Deacons during these challenging days. We are blessed yet again with an amazing group of selfless and service-oriented volunteers.
