WHY THIS APPROACH TO CONFIRMATION?

4 Reasons Why

Traditional confirmation classes were previously structured akin to school-like settings, emphasizing passive absorption of information through lectures and memorization. However, this approach, though effective in the past, may not be the best strategy for engaging today's youth with the vibrant essence of the Gospel.

Reason #1: The goal of confirmation is to create disciples.

The upcoming Confirmation Class at our church will deviate from this standard approach for a few compelling reasons. Firstly, our primary aim is to cultivate disciples, not just individuals knowledgeable about Christianity. We aspire to guide them toward a personal relationship with Christ and active participation in the church, providing them with the tools needed to lead a life of discipleship.

Reason #2: Learning is best done through experience.

Moreover, we believe that learning best occurs through practical involvement. As youth transition into full church membership, we intend to immerse them holistically into the church community, encouraging a personal experience in the disciple's way of life. Our goal is to make Confirmation the beginning of an ongoing, deeper spiritual journey rather than a conclusion.

Reason #3: Faith is communal.

Recognizing that faith thrives in community, we understand the importance of mentorship. While educational resources have their place in discipleship training, nothing surpasses the guidance and example provided by mature Christian mentors.

Reason #4: Faith isn't about certainty, but the questions.

Lastly, faith isn't solely about certainty, but about exploring questions and doubts. In our Confirmation process, students are encouraged to delve into their queries about faith and life, as we believe there's room for both belief and uncertainty in the church, echoing the sentiments in Matthew 28:17. Confirmation serves as a secure space for students to explore the depths of their faith journey.

1. Many Christians differ on how they understand the creation story in Genesis 1-3. Do you believe that this story is:

In what ways do you see God's love playing out in the stories of war and slavery and murder that are part of the Old Testament?

Learning About the New Testament

1. Working on your own, or by dividing up the questions, see if you and your partner can each come up with answers to the following quiz:
 - a. What does the word "Gospel" mean?
 - b. How many gospels are there?
 - c. Which book was written to a man named Theophilus?
 - d. Which book is the hardest for you to pronounce?
 - e. Which book begins with the words: "In the beginning was the Word..."
 - f. Who wrote the book of Revelation?

2. Although it is all contained within one cover, the New Testament is actually a collection of many books. Each of these books is one of 5 kinds of literature:
 - a. *Biography (Gospels)* - the story of someone's life.
 - b. *Church History* - the story of the growth of the church.
 - c. *General Letters* - an open letter to the people of a certain town.
 - d. *Paul's Epistles* - a personal letter to the people of a certain town or church.
 - e. *Apocalyptic/Prophecy Material* - figurative or poetic descriptions of truths about the final days of the world.

DISCIPLESHIP-ACTIVITY

Learning About Church Government (Polity) (Encouragement Meeting 2)

Attend at least one full hour of a “Session” meeting together during the next few months. The Session is the governing body that oversees all the ministries of our church. See the Course Calendar to find out when the Session is scheduled to meet. Here are some things to know before you attend the Session meeting.

- Our church is governed by 12 elders.
- Each of these elders is elected by the members of the church.
- Each elder serves on the Session for 3 years.
- All of the pastors are permanent members of the Session.

1. Slip out of the meeting after an hour or so. Spend some time together afterwards talking about your impressions of what you saw there.
 - a. What was interesting to you?
 - b. What sorts of decisions was the Session trying to make?
 - c. Were you surprised by anything you saw or heard?
 - d. What other thoughts or questions did the meeting raise for you about the way our church is governed?
2. Once you are a member of the church, you will be entitled to serve on almost any committee or commission you like. In most cases, all you need to do is tell one of the pastors you'd like to volunteer. To become an elder or a deacon, then you must also be elected by the congregation. If you could be a part of any mission or ministry at New Hope which one would it be? Write down your answer below:

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Do a quick Google search for churches in your area. Once you find a church you would like to attend a worship service find their worship service times on their website.

Make a date with your partner to attend the worship service of one of the following religious groups:

- a. Assembly of God (or Pentecostal- The Rock church qualifies)
- b. Jewish (Synagogue)
- c. Greek or Russian Orthodox
- d. Roman Catholic

Attend the service, dressed nicely, and showing respect for the religious traditions of someone else. If asked what you are doing there, don't be embarrassed to say that you are Presbyterian and going through confirmation, one of the exercises is to gain an appreciation for someone else's tradition.

 - b. What parts were hardest to follow or understand?
 - c. How was the service similar and different to what our church does in worship?

 - g. How tuned in was the service to visitors/strangers?
 - h. What sorts of ideas about God were advanced through the service?

Set a time and date to attend together a funeral or memorial service held in a church building (not a funeral home). If the pastors of our church can't tell you when a service is to be held in our church, then go to one at another church. You can find out when one of these is going to be held by looking in the newspaper under the "Obituary" listings. These announcements will usually tell you where and when a service is to be held.

When you attend this service, be sure to dress in dark clothes, sit quietly towards the back of the sanctuary, and demonstrate by your attitude that you have real respect for the seriousness of this occasion and the pain of the people who have lost a loved one.

1. After the service is over, spend some time talking together about what you saw.

 - b. What message did this service give about God's nature, power, and purpose?
 - c. What message did it give about how Christian's view life?

<p style="text-align: center;">DISCIPLESHIP-ACTIVITY Learning About Mission</p>

1. Mission means literally “sent”. Before he left earth, Jesus said to his disciples: “*As the Father has sent me, so I send you!*” (John 17:18) Because of this, Christians since the first century A. D. have always made the mission of offering forgiveness, hope, and love to the needy a very high priority of its life. When was the last time you were a “mission-ary”?

Consult the Course Calendar in this guidebook or the church office to get information about mission activities of our church, or of a local mission or volunteer opportunity within our community, in which you might get involved. Spend at least 2 hours volunteering with your partner at a local service-oriented ministry or event. Hours spent in youth-sponsored Mission events may be counted towards this goal.

 - a. Why is the church/community involved here?
 - b. What is it accomplishing?
 - c. What does it have to do with Jesus Christ and his teachings?

Learning About The Life of Faith in Jesus

Watch “Mark Scandrette Life of Faith in Jesus” on our website – Youth - Confirmation.

Jesus said: “I came that you might have life and have it more abundantly” (John 10:10). It was this vision for an abundant life that drew the original disciples and helped to form the early church. For this reason, we continually seek to model our lives as Christians and as a Church, after the example set by Christ and his early band of followers.

1. Jesus said and did plenty of strange things in his life. Which stories stick with you? What was at stake for Jesus when he did those things?

Key Point: All of us have personal needs. The need for intellectual stimulation, understanding, and insight lead us to seek **education**. The need for close, intimate relationships, support, fun and encouragement leads us to seek **fellowship**. The need for a relationship with our Creator, inspiration for daily living, and a chance to express our deepest longings, joys, and hurts leads us to **worship**. And the need to use our resources (time, talents, and treasure) in a way that gives our life satisfaction, significance, and a legacy beyond our days lead us to **ministry & evangelism**.

Writing Your Personal Statement of Faith

Introduction

Although an active Christian life will involve regular participation in worship, education, fellowship, and service, the only real requirement of membership in the Church of Jesus Christ is a willingness to publicly confess him as your Lord and Savior. You will be given the opportunity to do this soon before the church elders, at which time you will read a Statement of Faith you have prepared in advance. A Statement of Faith is:

- a personal statement of religious belief
- a summary of ideas about God and the church that are important to you
- a document by which you declare your loyalty to Christ and to his family, the Church.

Step One

Using the first side of the attached form, write out a page of personal reflections on the phrase *"To me, Jesus Christ is..."* Some of the sorts of thoughts you may wish to include are:

- who Jesus is to you
- how you've seen him at work already in your life
- what qualities or actions you admire in him
- what role you want him to play in your life from now on
- how significant he is to the world and to the problems the world faces.
- how Jesus moves you to put your faith in action (give an example)

Step Two

Using the second side of the attached form, write out a page of personal reflections on the phrase *"To me, the Church of Jesus Christ and membership in it means..."* Some of the sorts of thoughts you may wish to include in this essay are:

- how it feels to you to be becoming a full member of Christ's family
- what role you hope the church will play in your life from now on
- what you hope *you'll* be able to contribute to the church
- how important the church is to the problems and challenges of our world.

Step Three

When you have finished both essays, sign your name and date the document in the spaces provided. Then put a check mark next to the statement that indicates whether you wish to join the church right now or not. Once you have done this, turn the document in to the class teacher.
