Title: From Impossible to I'm Possible: The Power of Self-Determination in Christ

Sermon Summary: This powerful message challenges us to move from 'impossible' to 'I'm possible' through the principle of self-determination rooted in Christ. Drawing from Philippians 4:13, we're reminded that our strength doesn't come from our own abilities, education, or circumstances—it comes from Christ who infuses us with inner power. This sermon explores the second principle of Kwanzaa, Kujichagulia (self-determination), through a Christian lens, emphasizing that true self-determination comes not from self-confidence but from Christ-confidence. Pastor Canady challenges the congregation to reject the world's labels and limitations, instead embracing their identity as defined by God. Using the Apostle Paul's declaration in Philippians 4:13, the message demonstrates how believers can move from viewing situations as "impossible" to declaring "I'm possible" through Christ's empowerment.

The sermon addresses racial injustice, the importance of legacy-building in the Black community, and the necessity of faith-filled perseverance in fulfilling God-given assignments. Throughout history, our ancestors faced impossible odds—building schools without resources, fighting for freedom without protection, raising families in hostile environments—yet they persevered because they understood that God supplies strength for every assigned task. This isn't about self-confidence; it's about Christ-

confidence, about refusing to let statistics, setbacks, or systems define our identity. When we embrace our God-given calling, we discover three profound truths: we receive strength for every God-assigned task, success in every God-ordained endeavor, and supply for every God-recognized need. The message beautifully illustrates this through the seven-year journey of establishing LIFE Male STEAM Academy, proving that what looks impossible to the world becomes possible when we walk in obedience to God's assignment for our lives.

Chapters

Chapter 1: Introduction to Self-Determination and Kwanzaa Principles

We explore the principle of Kujichagulia (self-determination) from Kwanzaa, understanding how it aligns with biblical faith and empowers us to define ourselves through God's truth rather than the world's labels.

Chapter 2: Strength for Every God-Assigned Task

We discover that God provides supernatural strength for every task He assigns, not based on our own abilities but through Christ who infuses us with inner power to accomplish His purposes.

Chapter 3: Success in Every God-Ordained Endeavor

We understand that victory in God's Kingdom is measured not by comfort but by faithful completion, as we persist in obedience even when outcomes are uncertain and progress seems slow.

Chapter 4: Supply for Every God-Recognized Need

We learn that God faithfully supplies all our needs according to His riches, not our desires, when we walk in obedience to His purpose and calling.

Chapter 5: Invitation to Personal Relationship with Christ

We are invited to establish or renew our personal relationship with Jesus Christ, recognizing that He is the source of our identity, strength, and provision.

Key Points:

- Self-determination (Kujichagulia) means defining yourself through God's truth rather than the world's labels
- True strength comes from Christ-infusion, not self-generation
- Black people were historically told they were impossible, but faith declares "I am who God says I am"
- God never assigns a task without providing the strength needed to complete it
- Victory is measured by faithful completion, not comfort or convenience
- Success often comes to those who persevere even when results are slow or uncertain
- God supplies needs connected to His purpose, not every desire we invent
- Our ancestors survived not because they had power, but because they had principles
- The LIFE Male STEAM Academy stands as testimony to God's faithfulness in impossible situations
- Faith and family must work together for generational victory
- Obedience precedes provision in God's economy
- We must reject racist systems that attempt to define and limit us

- Nafis Hill's promotion to VP of Finance at Emory University Hospitals after UPMC failed to recognize his value
- The pastor's daughter Essence wisdom during the pandemic, comparing postponing the school opening to the Olympics delay

- Personal story about the pastor's grandmother having credit at the Jewish store where family could get supplies by saying "Ma sent me"
- Ancestors who built schools they never attended, founded churches they never pastored, and fought for rights they never fully enjoyed

QUOTES:

It always seems impossible until it's done. Historically, Black people were told that you are impossible, you are incapable, you are unqualified, and you are inferior. But Kujichagulia arose as a response and said, we will name ourselves.

This message is not about self-confidence. It's about Christ-confidence or God-fidence. It's not just me believing in me. It's me believing what God has said about me.

I define myself through Christ and not through limitation. I define myself through Christ and not my race. I define myself through Christ and not my gender. I define myself through Christ and not my education.

God doesn't call what He won't empower. God doesn't assign what He won't strengthen. And God doesn't send you out without giving you the supplies that you need.

Victory in God's Kingdom is not measured by comfort. It is measured by completion. Many of us start out good, but we get tired and quit. Self-determination says, I decide to remain faithful even when the outcome is uncertain.

God supplies needs that He recognizes, not desires we invent. God never ignores a need that is connected to His purpose. If God assigned the task, He recognizes the need.

Where God guides, He provides. If it is God's will, it is God's bill. If it is God's choice, it is God's invoice.

They said it was impossible, but Christ made me possible. I have strength for the task. I have victory in my journey. And I have supply for my need because I am possible.

5-Day Devotional: From Impossible to I'm Possible

Day 1: Strength for Every Assignment

Reading: Philippians 4:10-13

Devotional: Paul writes from prison, yet declares, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." This isn't self-confidence—it's Christ-confidence. God never assigns a task without supplying the

strength to complete it. Our ancestors understood this truth, moving forward with assignments before they had resources, building schools they'd never attend, fighting for rights they'd never fully enjoy. They had strength for the task because God infused them with inner power.

Today, what assignment has God placed before you? Don't wait for perfect conditions. God has already accounted for the strength you'll need. The fuel injection into your spiritual engine comes not from your education, connections, or comfort—it comes from Christ living within you. If God assigned it, you are equipped for it.

Reflection: What impossible task is God calling you to attempt today with His strength?

Day 2: Defining Yourself Through God's Truth

Reading: Psalm 139:13-18

Devotional: Kujichagulia—self-determination—means refusing to let others define you. You are fearfully and wonderfully made in God's image. The world may label you by your past, your pain, your statistics, or your setbacks, but God calls you His beloved child. Self-determination under God means choosing to believe what God says about you over what circumstances, history, or people declare.

You didn't begin in chains or on a ship—you began as royalty in God's Kingdom. When the world whispers "impossible," faith responds "I'm possible through Christ." This isn't arrogance; it's accepting your God-given identity. You define yourself through Christ, not through limitations, race, gender, education, or economic status.

Reflection: What false labels have you accepted about yourself that contradict God's truth? Write down three things God says about you.

Day 3: Victory Through Faithful Perseverance

Reading: Hebrews 12:1-3

Devotional: Victory in God's Kingdom isn't measured by comfort—it's measured by completion. Success looks different when faith and family are involved. Parents don't quit because children are watching. Churches don't retreat because communities are relying on them. Many of our ancestors never lived to see the fruit they planted, yet they kept going because they understood that victory is sometimes just planting the seed.

Paul's endurance wasn't just for himself—it was for the church and the next generation. Your faithfulness today creates a legacy for generations to come. Victory isn't quitting when it gets hard; it's staying faithful even when progress feels slow. When faith keeps you grounded and family keeps you growing, breakthrough becomes inevitable, not accidental.

Reflection: What are you tempted to quit that God is calling you to complete? Who is depending on your faithfulness?

Day 4: God's Supply for God's Purpose

Reading: Philippians 4:19, Matthew 6:25-34

Devotional: "My God shall supply all your need according to His riches in glory." Notice Paul doesn't discuss supply before obedience—he talks about supply after demonstrating faithfulness. God supplies needs He recognizes; not desires we invent. If God assigned the task, He recognizes the need. Where God guides, He provides. If it's God's will, it's God's bill.

Our ancestors didn't always have access, but they always had enough—enough food to share, enough faith to pray, enough strength to keep going,

enough hope to pass down. Provision doesn't always look like overflow; sometimes it looks like survival with dignity. God never ignores a need connected to His purpose. Keep moving in obedience, trusting God to provide.

Reflection: What need are you anxious about? How can you shift from worry to worship, trusting God's provision?

Day 5: The Power of Jesus' Name

Reading: Acts 4:8-12, Philippians 2:9-11

Devotional: There is power in the name of Jesus—power to heal, deliver, provide, and transform. When you're hungry, He is bread. When you're lonely, He is your comforter. When you're anxious, He gives peace. When you're weak, He gives strength. When you're afraid, He gives confidence. When you're empty, He keeps supplying. In that name, you shift from impossible to I'm possible.

Jesus is the one who woke you this morning, started you on your way, put shoes on your feet and food in your cupboards. You are who He says you are. You can do what He says you can do. He has promises for your life—confess them! You are victorious. You are a winner in Jesus' name. You're not second-class anything—you're a child of the King.

Reflection: Spend time today simply speaking the name of Jesus over every area of your life that feels impossible.

Closing Prayer: Father, help me move from impossible to I'm possible. Give me strength for every assignment, success in every endeavor, and supply for every need. I am who You say I am. I can do what You say I can do. I am victorious in Jesus' name. Amen.

Small Group Guide: From Impossible to I'm Possible

Sermon Series: The Seven Principles of Kwanzaa

Principle: Kujichagulia (Self-Determination)

Text: Philippians 4:13

Opening Prayer

Begin your group time asking God to open hearts and minds to His truth, and to help each person understand their identity in Christ rather than the world's labels.

Ice Breaker (10 minutes)

Share a time when someone told you something was "impossible," but you accomplished it anyway. What gave you the strength to push through?

Key Scripture

Philippians 4:13 (Amplified)

"I have strength for all things in Christ who empowers me. I am ready for anything and equal to anything through Him who infuses inner strength into me. I am self-sufficient in Christ's sufficiency."

Sermon Summary

Pastor Canady explored **Kujichagulia** (self-determination), the second principle of Kwanzaa, through a Christian lens. True self-determination isn't self-confidence, but **Christ-confidence**—defining ourselves by God's truth rather than the world's labels. The sermon emphasized three key points:

1. **Strength for Every God-Assigned Task**

Discussion Questions

Section 1: Understanding Self-Determination (15 minutes)

1. **What is the difference between self-confidence and Christ-confidence?** How does this distinction change the way we approach challenges?
2. Pastor Canady stated, "**I am who God says I am, not what history, statistics, or circumstances say about me.**" What are some labels the world has tried to place on you? How does God's Word counter those labels?
3. How does the principle of Kujichagulia (self-determination) align with biblical teachings about identity in Christ?

Section 2: Strength for God-Assigned Tasks (20 minutes)

4. Read Philippians 4:13 together. What does it mean that Christ "**infuses inner strength**" into us?

5. Pastor Canady shared the story of LIFE Male STEAM Academy—how they moved forward with God's assignment before they had resources. **Have you ever felt God calling you to do something before you felt ready?** How did you respond?
6. The sermon emphasized: "**God never assigns something without supplying the strength you need to endure it.**" Can you share a testimony of when God gave you strength for a difficult task?
7. What is a God-assigned task in your life right now that feels impossible? How can this group pray for and support you?

Section 3: Success Through Faithfulness (20 minutes)

8. Pastor Canady said, "**Victory in God's Kingdom is not measured by comfort. It is measured by completion.**" How does this challenge our culture's definition of success?
9. The sermon highlighted how our ancestors planted seeds they never saw harvested. **What are you planting now that may benefit the next generation?** How does this long-term perspective change your motivation?
10. "**Victory is not quitting when it gets hard. Victory is staying faithful even when it's slow.**" Where in your life do you need to apply this truth right now?

Section 4: God's Provision (15 minutes)

11. Philippians 4:19 promises: "**My God shall supply all your need according to His riches in glory.**" How is a "need" different from a "want"? Why does this distinction matter?
12. Pastor Canady shared stories of his grandmothers who didn't have much but always had enough. **What lessons about God's provision have been passed down in your family?**

13. The sermon stated: "**God never ignores a need that is connected to His purpose.**" How does knowing this change the way you pray and trust God?

9. In what ways can you set a spiritual tone for your family by example, ensuring that faith and values are passed down to the next generation?
10. The sermon emphasizes that faithfulness matters more than instant results. Where in your life do you need to remain faithful even when progress feels slow or invisible?
