How would your faith hold up if you lost everything like Job did, and would you still trust God's goodness even in devastation?

In what ways might American Christians be unprepared for suffering because we have only known God in prosperity rather than in hardship?

What would change in your prayer life if you started asking God what He thinks about you and what He would like to change in your life?

How does praising God in difficult circumstances act as spiritual warfare against the enemy's attempts to make us blame God?

Do you think Job's problem was that he focused more on being righteous and making sacrifices than on actually seeking to know God personally?

What does it mean to be blessed by simply reading, hearing, and taking to heart God's Word, even passages like Job that seem confusing or difficult?

How can we avoid becoming like Job's friends who thought they had God figured out and spent their time accusing others rather than seeking God themselves?

What would it look like for the modern church to have the same radical faith as early Christians who considered nothing their own and faced persecution with joy?

Are we willing to ask, seek, and knock persistently not for what we want from God, but to understand His perspective and become the bride worthy of Christ's return?
