The passages from Revelation bookend this study beautifully, reminding us that God's Word is living and active, blessing those who read, hear, and take it to heart. The challenge before us is profound: do we truly know God, or do we just know about Him? Are we prepared to worship Him not just when life is good, but when our world crumbles? The call to 'ask and keep asking, seek and keep seeking, knock and keep knocking' isn't about persistence in getting what we want—it's about relentlessly pursuing intimacy with the One who is worth knowing regardless of our circumstances.
