Title: Beyond Fire Insurance: The Development of True Salvation

Sermon Summary: This sermon challenges believers to move beyond viewing salvation as merely a one-time event or "fire insurance" and instead embrace it as an ongoing process of spiritual development. Using the metaphor of physical birth and growth, the pastor emphasizes that just as conception, birth, and development are all crucial stages in physical life, so too must believers experience conception (hearing the Word), birth (accepting Christ), and continuous spiritual maturity. The core message confronts comfortable Christianity, calling believers to examine whether their faith demonstrates genuine love for Christ through transformed lives and sacrificial devotion. The sermon culminates with the story of the sinful woman who anointed Jesus' feet, illustrating that those who recognize the magnitude of their forgiveness love Jesus most deeply and respond with radical devotion.

Key Points:

- Being "born again" requires complete transformation, not just intellectual acknowledgment of Christ
- Salvation is not a single moment but a developmental process requiring continuous growth and maturity
- Many people sit in churches having checked religious boxes without experiencing genuine conversion or brokenness over their sin
- The recognition that "we killed Jesus" is essential for authentic salvation
- True faith produces visible fruit and lifestyle changes; faith without development is dead faith
- The parable of the sower reveals that many who hear the Word fall away due to shallow roots, worries, riches, and pleasures
- American Christianity often prioritizes comfort, possessions, and convenience over Christ
- The question is not just "are you saved?" but "show me the evidence of your salvation through your life"
- Those who recognize they have been forgiven much love much; those who think they have little sin love little

- Genuine salvation involves continuous surrender, not a one-time decision followed by self-centered living

- The parable of two debtors (500 denarii vs 50 denarii) illustrating that those forgiven much love much
- Personal testimony about miscarriages and the process of physical development as a metaphor for spiritual growth
- References to the prodigal son's return as a picture of Jesus returning to the Father after the resurrection
