
Pastor Connie's Corner

I sometimes wonder if we really understand the season of Lent. We often hear people talking about what they might give up for Lent and it seems that the point is to let go of something we take great pleasure in as a way of denying ourselves. Certainly, self-denial can be a worthy discipline during Lent as well as any other time in our faith journey, but I believe that self-denial is meant to be a means to an end rather than an end in itself, and while it has a place in the Lenten journey it is only a part of what Lent is about. One of my worship planning books says it this way:

"Lent is a time for evangelism and for true conversion—a time for growing through repentance, fellowship, prayer, fasting, and concentration upon our baptismal covenant. We are to be signs of God's kingdom in this world"(The Handbook of the Christian Year)

What does it mean to "be signs of God's Kingdom in this world"? We pray, "Thy kingdom come; Thy will be done", maybe being signs of the kingdom means that we are doing what God asks of us. Surly you have heard the saying contributed to Michelangelo, describing how the statue is already in the marble and he must only cut away what isn't part of the statue. Perhaps this is what we do during Lent. God is already at work in us and continually creating us in God's own image and self-denial is the process of letting go of everything that does not belong. Let's pray for ourselves and one another. Let's pray that the all that is not of God will be carefully removed and the God's Kingdom is revealed.

Outreach Report

February Mission of the Month to Support CASA

The Missions Committee mission of the month for **February is CASA of the 8th Judicial District**. CASA stands for Court Appointed Special Advocate whose concept is based on the belief that every child has the right to a safe, permanent home. A CASA volunteer speaks exclusively for the child's best interest while that child is in the court system. These frightened and confused children often become victims of a swamped child welfare system, which is a complex legal network of lawyers, social workers, and judges who frequently are too overburdened to give thorough, detailed attention to each child who comes before them. Once a CASA volunteer is assigned to a child, that volunteer will stay with the case until it is closed and the child is placed in a safe, permanent home.

CASA of the 8th Judicial District covers the counties of Dickinson, Geary, Marion, and Morris. All CASA volunteers are unpaid, giving of their time and talents to help the children of our area. All volunteers are required to attend classes to be trained in their responsibilities. CASA is not supported by the government; its money comes through grants, some allocations by each county, and individual donations. By supporting CASA we will be helping the program continue their good work for the benefit of the children in our communities.

If you would wish to make a contribution to CASA of the 8th Judicial District during the month of February you may do so at the Missions Committee table in the Narthex. Our mission of the month for January was Kids in Crisis. With the loving generosity of the congregation (and a \$100 donation from the missions fund) CUMC made a donation to Kids in Crisis in the amount of \$565.00. Thank you!
