God's LOVE



In Luke 15 Jesus weaves three simple but poignant scenes into one parable of "lost things." In each instance He depicts the incalculable value of that which is lost.

The last of the trilogy of parables deals with a lost son. The story of the prodigal son has been called "the paragon of the parables." It is the story of a common, heartbreaking experience - a beloved child chooses to leave home and go his own way, refusing to incorporate into his decisions the faithful and consistent teachings he received in childhood.

The beautiful part of the story, of course, is that the young man did "come to his senses," and in a very touching soliloquy, he "talked to himself" with both shame and realism. He took full responsibility for his sins, resolved to make a full confession of them, and returned to his father's house as a hired servant.

More compelling than the story of the repenting son is that of the waiting father, who never forgot his wandering son while


he was away. It was undignified for the old man to break his stride and run, but this father forgot himself and ran all the way to meet his returning son!

Immediately the father set plans in motion to celebrate his son's return.

His actions parallel those of the rejoicing shepherd and woman in the two previous stories. But there is an added dimension of God's love in this third parable: we see how sensitive God's love is, especially when we need it most.

St. Luke's, Saint Augustine expressed the love of God by saying, "God loves each one of us as if there were only one of us to love." May we carry this statement in our hearts throughout the coming year and beyond.




Carotid Artery Disease

an ultrasound is performed to screen the carotid arteries (a pair of blood vessels in the neck that deliver blood to your brain) for buildup of fatty plaque. This buildup, called atherosclerosis, is one of the leading causes of stroke.



Atrial Fibrillation (AFib)

a 6-lead electrocardiogram (EKG) is performed by placing sensors on the arms and legs to screen for Atrial Fibrillation. AFib can lead to blood clots, stroke, and heart failure, and other heart-related complications.²



Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm (AAA)

an ultrasound is performed to screen the abdominal aorta for the presence of an enlargement or aneurysm. AAA can lead to a ruptured aortic artery, which is a life-threatening medical emergency.



Peripheral Arterial Disease (PAD)

an Ankle-Brachial Index (ABI) test is performed using blood pressure cuffs on the arms and legs. It is important to screen for PAD because it increases the risk of coronary artery disease, heart attack, or stroke.³
