More Than a Negative

Even if you've never had to testify in court, a thousand TV shows have made you familiar with the question, "Do you swear to tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth?" Why not just make people swear to tell the truth? Or make them promise not to lie?

Any parent who has ever had to interrogate a child about a broken cookie jar or a scuffle over a toy knows the answer. There are plenty of ways to try to get out of trouble without *technically* lying. You tell *just enough* of the truth to skate on by.

We often play the game of seeing *how close* we can get to sinning without *technically* going over the line.

But in our heart of hearts we know that this is not what God intended when He gave us the commandments. He's not giving us a merely negative rule and challenging us to just barely stay away from this or that. There is much more to each commandment than a prohibition. We shouldn't just avoid murdering people — we should be of service to our neighbor.

For each negative prohibition in the commandments there is a positive good that we are to cherish and protect. In the Eighth Commandment, that gift is the reputation of our neighbor and our relationship with him:

You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor.

What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not tell lies about our neighbor, betray him, slander him, or hurt his reputation, but defend him, speak well of him, and explain everything in the kindest way.

Your relationship with your family members (who are your nearest neighbors), the other members of your congregation, your coworkers and your friends is one of the most precious gifts you have been given. You need to exercise good stewardship with this gift just as much as you need to exercise good stewardship with your life, resources, time and income. This is an especially fragile gift because it's easy to ruin a relationship with slander and talking behind someone's back.

But speaking well of your neighbor in Christian love is absolutely free; it costs you nothing, yet it pays you great dividends. If you find this challenging at times, if you are tempted to speak ill of others, just remember that this other person is also a beloved child of God for whom your Lord Jesus suffered and died. Your Lord Jesus loves you both.

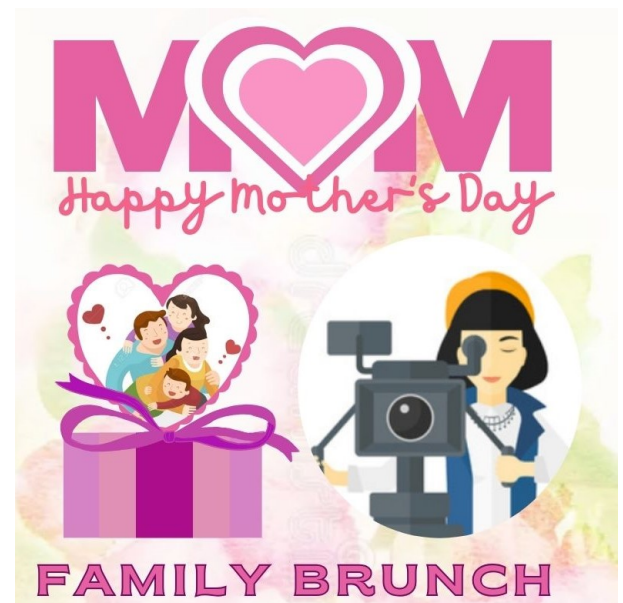

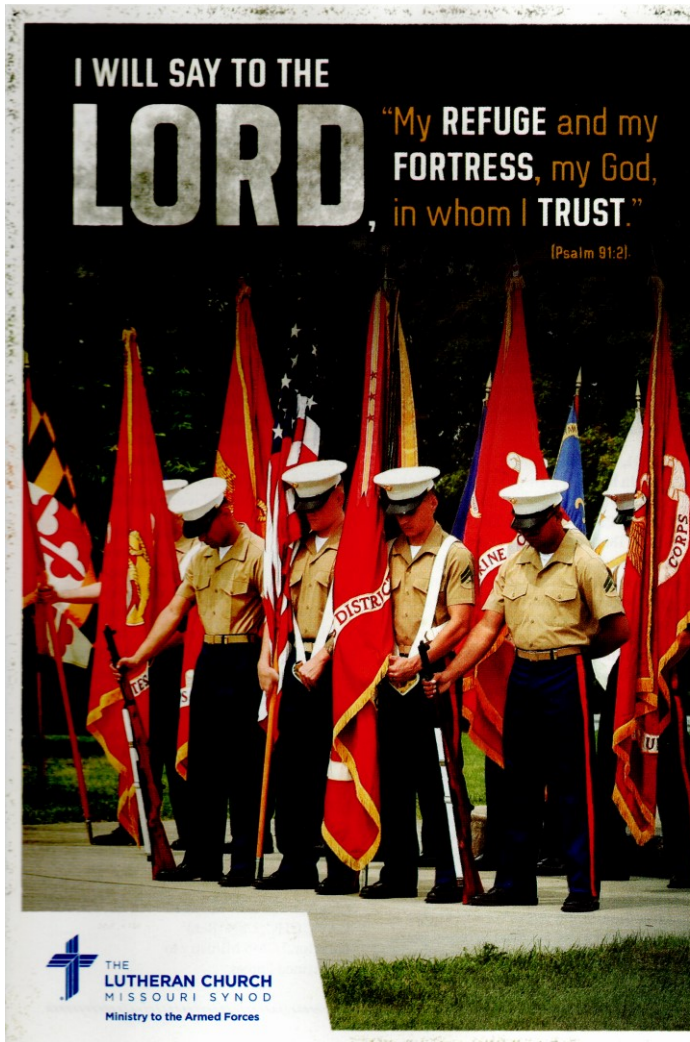


Missionary News – Anna Rostek

ARMED FORCES SUNDAY 2024



Military deployments can be austere, with no running water and few of the creature comforts we have become accustomed to in America. Sometimes, they have many of the creature comforts we want. But in all cases, it's always a combat zone, and life is never certain.

The thing that is certain during a combat deployment is the danger we face. And yet, after a few weeks or months in a combat zone, complacency often sets in. Human beings have a great ability to adapt to even the most difficult circumstances. The death or injury of those we serve often opens our eyes, helping us to realize our situation. But we can't dwell in that fear. We must find a way to find peace and security in any and every situation. Psalm 91 gives us this peace and security.

The same thing happens for those of us who are not in the military. Life is a combat zone. We are confronted daily with attacks from the evil one and by the attacks of those who have become tools of the evil one, who inflicts pain and misery wherever he prowls.

RESPONSIVE PRAYER

L: Lord God, You have sustained our nation in the past and continue to bless us. We recall how so many have given their lives for the cause of freedom. Men and women continue to sacrifice and serve in the armed forces. Today, we pause to reflect and honor those who gave or who continue to sacrifice so much in the defense of our freedom to be faithful.

R: We remember the great courage and selfless service of so many throughout history who have answered the call to serve. We remember their honorable sacrifice for the freedom of others. Comfort the families who mourn the loss of loved ones. Comfort also those who suffer permanent injuries as a result of serving our nation in the military.

L: We remember with thankfulness the millions of Americans who give so generously of their life and labor in times of national conflict, particularly the family members of our soldiers, sailors, airmen, Marines and Coast Guardsmen.

R: We are grateful for the devotion and sacrifices of military families. Grant us the resources and willing hearts to support them.

L: Lord, You prayed earnestly for Your disciples, that they would be kept in Your name, filled with joy and sanctified in Your Word of truth.

R: Keep our chaplains in Your name. Fill them with the joy that comes from knowing You have defeated sin and death. Sanctify their ministry in Your Word of truth.

L: Gracious Lord, we ask for Your strength for our chaplains who serve in the wounded-warrior wards and in our military hospitals as they provide pastoral care to hurting and wounded veterans and their families.

R: Lord, mend the wounds of all who suffer in body, mind or spirit. Grant their physicians knowledge and wisdom as they seek the best treatments for patients' suffering.

L: God of mercy, grant patience and insight to our chaplains who serve in all branches of our armed forces. Only through Your sustaining love can they move out daily with confidence and joy. These and all things we ask through Your Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and rules with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.
Amen.

Regardless of our station in life, we all seek protection from the evil that surrounds us. Psalm 91 is one of the tools God uses to open our eyes to the protection He provides to His children. Psalm 91 is popular among members of the military, and some carry it around with them as a standalone edition. During my deployment to Afghanistan, I saw as many copies of Psalm 91 as the entire Bible. I didn't pay much attention to Psalm 91 prior to joining the military, but then I noticed it everywhere and found comfort in these words that our gracious and merciful Father provides.

Psalm 91 speaks about thousands falling at our side, and yet being unapproachable to the enemy. It speaks about the protection God offers His children in spite of the terrors at night as they dwell in the shelter of the Most High. Throughout the psalm, we hear echoes of comfort and protection, despite the terrors that surround us. For those who have served in a combat zone, this is especially comforting.

The psalm is God's Word to a world that is at war — with the adversary who prowls around searching for someone to destroy, with a world that not only wars with others but that is at war with itself. On our own, we are doomed to destruction. The most courageous and highly trained member of the military is no match for this terrible, prowling lion — or against the terrors that strike within us.

But we have a Savior who overcame all our fears and adversaries. He overcame the devil when He suffered in our stead, died for our sins and rose to a new life given to us. Let's look to the psalm and find confidence in His promises.

Psalm 91

¹ **He who dwells in the shelter of the Most High
will abide in the shadow of the Almighty.**

² **I will say to the LORD, "My refuge and my fortress,
my God, in whom I trust."**

I was told prior to deploying to Afghanistan that the only person you can trust is the person on your right and the person on your left. At that moment, I felt a sense of pride in the organization and the soldiers I deployed with. But as time went on, and I got to know the individuals on my right and left, I realized they were just like me ... afraid of the dangers we faced together. Yes, there was a sense of camaraderie because we all faced the same dangers, but there was also a sense of uncertainty, that death was a possibility every day.

~~I realized that protection comes not from a highly trained member of the military or the courage of an ordinary Soldier, Sailor, Airman or Marine, but from the presence of the Almighty, the Most High.~~

Holiness or protection from the adversary is about location. When we are where God promises to be, we find ourselves enveloped in His protection and guiding hand. We must find ourselves where He promises to be.

Though God is certainly present everywhere, He is present with His gifts for us in the Divine Service, where we receive His sacred Word and life-giving Sacraments. When we hear the Word of God preached, read or sung, we hear from God Himself as He often whispers words of encouragement and hope to a soul filled with fear and hopelessness.

We recall our Baptism each time we wash our face, as Martin Luther reminds us. At our Baptism, we received the gift of the Holy Spirit who is an ever-present constant in our lives, reminding us of the deeds of our Savior and advocating for us as we pray almost helplessly in the midst of the war zone in our mind.

He becomes our refuge and our strength, in whom we place all our trust. The men and women we serve with, whether it be in the military or in our church community, are individuals God has placed in our lives to remind us we aren't alone and that we don't suffer alone. But He never asks us to place our trust in one another. He asks us to place our trust in Him. Verse 3 reveals both the danger and the protection God provides.

³ **For he will deliver you from the snare of the fowler
and from the deadly pestilence.**

Notice how the psalmist identifies the one who saves and protects us, using His angels to guard and protect us as God's instruments. As we cannot by our own reason or strength come to Him or believe in Him, it is God's doing to protect us and keep us from harm and danger.

He is the one who saves us when we are distracted by the cares of this world, whether it be in combat or in everyday life. Don't be deceived: Even in combat, men and women can become complacent, unaware of the dangers they face. A fowler's snare is a trap set by bird hunters to catch the bird unaware, while it is feeding. It's a net or box that traps the bird.

The randomness of the enemy in a combat zone is like the randomness of our enemy: sin, death and the power of the devil. In the context of the military, the injury or death of a fellow service member clears the fog of invincibility, focusing us on our own mortality. Life is going on when suddenly the serious illness or death of a loved one shakes us to our foundation.

If Satan were obvious, we wouldn't fall so easily for his tricks. He is subtle, almost hidden. He reveals himself when the people or things we place our trust in fail us. He sets traps for us to drive us away from God. Verse 3 gives a vivid picture of the dangers we face every day in a world at war with God.

⁴ **He will cover you with his pinions,
and under his wings you will find refuge;
his faithfulness is a shield and buckler.**

⁵ **You will not fear the terror of the night,
nor the arrow that flies by day,**

⁶ **nor the pestilence that stalks in darkness,
nor the destruction that wastes at noonday.**

Notice that it's the faithfulness of God that brings the protection of a shield and wall. It's not our faithfulness to Him. We build complacency and a false sense of security when we believe our good deeds make us worthy of His protection and love. Or when we look around at others and think we aren't as bad as they are. Both open us to sudden attacks by the invisible enemy we all face.

And yet, we will not fear. Second Timothy 1:7 reminds us that we were not given a spirit of fear, but of power and of love. No matter the dangers we face, whether we are at rest in the middle of the night and our thoughts drift away from God and to our troubles, or whether we face enemies with weapons who intend to kill us, the quiet confidence we have in our God's protection and guidance removes those doubts and fears.

The psalm ends with the comforting promises of God to His people. They are not given to us because of our faithfulness or worthiness. Confessing that we are sinful and unclean rejects that notion. God's promises rest on His faithfulness to us: "I will rescue him. I will protect him. I will answer him. I will be with him in trouble. I will deliver him and honor him. I will satisfy him." All are promises of our loving and gracious God, who revealed Himself in the person of Christ, our Savior. And He does so not because of our worthiness, but because of His faithfulness. May God bless those who serve in the U.S. military and keep them strong in the faith. Amen.

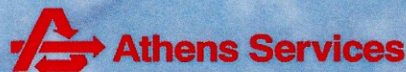
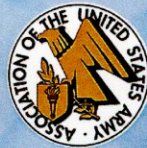

Sunday Worship at Home

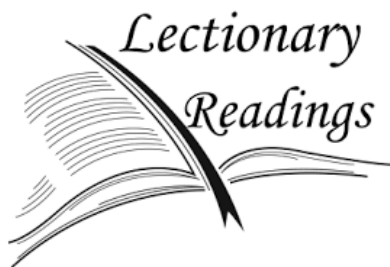
If you are unable to attend worship, you can listen to the Lutheran Hour sermon at 8:00 a.m. on station KBRT AM 740 each Sunday.

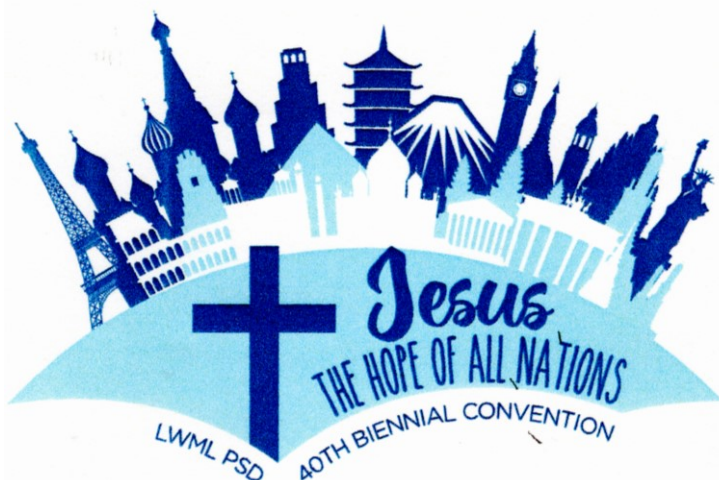

Rev. Dr. John Mehl became the second Executive Director of Mission of Christ Network on January 1, 2017.

Dr. Mehl began his ministry at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Lincoln, Kansas where he served eight years as a parish pastor, before being called by LCMS Board for Mission Services as a church planter

in Moscow, Russia, in 1993. He served as the pastor of two different congregations in Moscow and supervised the "Moscow Seminars," an ongoing theological education program for Russian Lutheran pastors. In 2004 he and his family moved from Moscow to Frankfurt, Germany, while serving with LCMS World Missions as the Regional Director for Eurasia. In 2006, the family moved to Hong Kong, where Dr. Mehl served as the Regional Director for Asia until 2013. While in Asia he was a member of the leadership team that started Concordia International School, Hanoi. From 2014 to 2016 he served as the Director of Mission Partnerships and Church Relations at Concordia University, Nebraska.

John is married to Susan and they have three grown children, Katrina, Louisa and Theodore.
