Following Our Call as Fishers of Men: Feeding His Sheep

Our Gospel reading for the first Sunday in May is John Chapter 21. This passage describes an encounter between the disciples and Jesus after His resurrection. Prior to being called by Christ, many of the disciples were fishermen. After His resurrection, Jesus told the men to meet Him in their home region of Galilee. Seven men are in a group, including Peter, who once again takes charge and plans to resume fishing. Whether he's lost hope about Jesus and their calling, or simply looking to earn money, or catch food, or stave off boredom, Scripture does not say.




They have an unsuccessful night fishing. Nighttime fishing was not unusual, and it's not abnormal for experienced fishermen to come up without much of a catch on some trips. In this case, however, the lack of fish serves to make a useful point. This is possibly a sign that their calling is to be evangelists, not fishermen. A figure on the beach tells them to cast their net to the other side of the boat, resulting in a massive catch. Then John realizes the man is Jesus, and Peter puts on his regular clothes over his fishing work clothes and dives overboard to swim to shore. There, the other disciples arrive to find a breakfast of bread and fish waiting for them, along with Jesus. As the disciples eat a meal with Christ, He presses Peter to reaffirm His faith and ministry. Three times He asks, "Do you love Me?" Peter proclaims "Yes Lord, you know I love You" and then three times Jesus reminds him of his mission: to feed or take care of His sheep.

Jesus had called these followers to be fishers of men (Matthew 4:19). That is, their purpose is now to evangelize others. When Christ appears on the shore, and miraculously directs their net (John 21:4), it's not to bless their hard work or profits - It's proof that He can provide for their needs. He is showing them that unless their efforts are aligned with His purpose (being fishers of men), they won't succeed.

Missionary Anna Rosteck Called to Glory

Anna Rosteck had a love for God, a thirst for knowledge, and a deep compassion for people. She was a Licensed Clinical Social Worker, an ordained minister with the Assemblies of God, and a missionary to East Africa. Anna used her training and skills to minister to pastors and other church workers as they recovered from violence against Christians in East Africa. She had worked in mental health since 2004, and had a passion for showing God's love to others. Our First Lutheran family helped to financially support Anna in her missionary work in Burundi.

Anna was diagnosed and treated for cancer in Africa, returned to the US, underwent treatment here and then returned to Africa. Later the cancer came back and she returned to her family's home in Montana. She passed into the arms of Jesus on April 14. Anna was the niece of Pat Grabowski and Connie Kean, and the whole family gathered on April 26 in Great Falls, MT to celebrate her life. We were blessed by her visits and the opportunity to support her ministry. How to Tune in and Build Faith with The Lutheran Hour Broadcast

Many Christians and Lutherans from around the world listen to "The Lutheran Hour." Oscar Tschopp, as a child, listened with his family in Iowa. Oscar's oldest brother Ted built an Oatmeal Box radio. Unbelievable as it sounds, you can find the directions on the internet. Oscar says Ted dug a quartz crystal from the hills, purchased earphones, ran a wire, and put the earphones in a

crockery bowl, which became an amplifier so that the entire family of nine could listen. Oscar says it was a big day when the family was able to purchase a real radio. All this took place before WWII. The first Lutheran Hour broadcast was in 1930.

Today the Lutheran Hour is available in more ways than traditional radio. Oscar and Jo now listen using their phone or computer. These are some of the more modern ways to be nourished by The Lutheran Hour: American Forces Network, Sirius XM satellite radio, Amazon Alexa, Spotify, iHeartRadio, YouTube, and more. Listeners can hear the weekly sermons whenever and wherever they are. Also available are the daily devotions which come in a daily email to read or listen to.



John Chapter 21 holds several important lessons for Christians today, emphasizing restoration, purpose, and following Christ's call.

Restoration and Second Chances:

John 21 portrays Jesus' willingness to restore Peter's leadership after his denial, demonstrating God's grace and forgiveness. This passage offers a message of hope to those who have stumbled in their faith, showing that Jesus is always ready to welcome back those who repent and seek forgiveness.



Following Christ and God's Call:

Jesus' instructions to Peter to "feed my sheep" and "follow me" are calls to leadership and ministry, highlighting the importance of actively serving God and others. This passage encourages Christians to embrace their unique gifts and callings to participate in God's mission in the world.

The Importance of Focus:

The chapter emphasizes the need to focus on Christ and resist the urge to compare ourselves to others. Jesus' focus on Peter's ministry and his own future, rather than speculation about John's fate, encourages followers to concentrate on their own calling and God's plan for their lives.

Jesus' Provision and Sustaining Presence:

The miraculous catch of fish and the meal prepared by Jesus symbolize his ongoing provision and care for the church, both past and present. This passage reassures Christians that God will always provide for them and be with them, even in challenging times.

The Cost of Discipleship:

John 21 also highlights the cost of discipleship, with Jesus predicting Peter's death by crucifixion. This passage serves as a reminder that following Christ may involve sacrifice and challenges, but ultimately leads to a life of purpose and meaning.

Up Close and Personal: Rev. Frank Matthews



Joining us to lead worship a few Sundays this month and next is Rev. Frank Matthews. He was born in Los Angeles and when he was five years old, his father passed away. When his mom remarried, the family moved to Pasadena. He graduated from Knoxville College in Knoxville, TN and has a master's degree from National University. Rev. Matthews was a licensed deacon at St. Paul Lutheran Church in Los Angeles and began serving Concordia Lutheran Church of Inglewood about 15 years ago when the Synod ended the licensed deacon

program. He was ordained as a Special Ministries Pastor and served at Concordia until it closed earlier this year. After working as a mechanic for the City of Pasadena for 31 years, he feels he is where he belongs with people, doing what God has called him to do. He and his wife Kim Jackson-Matthews have three sons and two grandchildren.

A Cross in My Pocket

From Jo Tschopp: Decades ago, Keith White, a sainted member, passed out pocket crosses with the words, “Take more than one to give to others.” Oscar Tschopp still has his cross which got a lot of exposure when he was going through security as he worked at the Burbank Airport. Today he has trained his caregivers to nightly take the cross from his shirt pocket and place it on the bureau ready for putting it back into his pocket the next morning. Our Mission Development Team will soon mail you your own pocket cross so you can remind yourself, “That Jesus Christ is the Lord of your life.”
