Pure Happiness?

"Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God."

Matthew 5:8

It's a sad commentary on the human condition that living in purity of heart often strikes us as a bleak, boring, joyless existence. It makes us think of goody-two-shoes and the holier-than-thou people who are so heavenly minded they're no earthly good.

It's almost axiomatic that any kind of genuine excitement, especially for grown-up people, has a darker element to it. Take, for instance, the terms, "Adult entertainment" and "child-friendly." Simple, innocent pleasures may satisfy the kids, but it takes some measure of sophistication and at least a little debauchery to make adult blood flow. There's just something exciting about flirting with evil.

Side note: Don't forget, we're under assault by a concerted, orchestrated effort of sexual revolutionaries and activists to destroy our kids' innocence even earlier by exposing them to the most grotesque of sexual deviance (think Drag Queen Story Hour in public libraries and even liberal churches). Children of five and six years old are openly being groomed for sexual exploitation, and the groomers are celebrated as heroes. Satan loves destroying children. Keep your eyes wide open, parents. Your wee ones have powerful, bloodthirsty enemies. End note.

It shouldn't surprise us that most people, especially young adults, don't think Christianity is very fun. Christian morality frowns on many of the things they look to for enjoyment and satisfaction in life (sex before/ outside marriage, drunkenness, gambling, chasing the almighty dollar, to name a few), and encourages things people don't find very interesting (biblical morality, church membership, sacrificial giving, devoting one entire day out of seven to God, loyalty to Christ at any cost). They can't imagine Christianity would be anything but a drag, and small wonder.

When Jesus says, "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God," remember that "blessed" means



"happy." There's a happiness that attends a purity of heart. And what is that happiness? The pure in heart are blessed, they are happy, *for* or *because* they shall see God.

The Pure Heart

In common parlance, the 'mind' is where boring things like thinking and logical reasoning take place, and the 'heart' is where exciting things like feeling and dreaming happen. The head thinks according to the rules, the heart knows no boundaries. The brain worries, the heart hopes. No wonder movies tell us to 'follow our heart.' Seems like way more fun.

In the Bible, the 'heart' is the core of a person. Biblical scholar Leon Morris says the term *heart* "stands for the whole of our inner state, thought and will as well as emotions... the very center of our being." Everything we think, feel, say, and do springs up out of our heart. And that's true no matter who we are, or what mental or chemical state we find ourselves in. My heart is the true me.

Sometimes we say, "Love the sinner, hate the sin." There's something to that. But where does a sinner's sin come from? Let's put some labels on sin for a minute. When you envy your neighbor's tractor, or his wife; or envy her home or her children, where do those feelings come from? When you find yourself lost in a fantasy of sexual immorality, where does that come from? To use Jesus' list, where do "evil thoughts, sexual immorality, theft, murder, adultery, coveting, wickedness, deceit, sensuality, envy, slander, pride, foolishness" come from? Jesus' answer is this: "All these evil things come from within..." (Mark 7:22-23).

FILL'ER UP

How much time has to go by before a new thing is no longer new? We are enjoying the great blessing of doing ministry together in our new building, but people are always surprised to find out that we have been in here for 6 years already. Furthermore, it is also surprising to discover a growing challenge that is getting more and more of our attention lately. The challenge in question is the fact that we are already running out of room.

Over the years we at Lewis Lake have experienced the reality of the 80% rule. This rule is kind of a weird observation of human nature pointing out that a group of people will rarely grow any larger than 80% of its total seating capacity. As I look out upon the congregation on Sunday mornings it definitely feels like we are pretty full. Now, it is true that, while we are setting up extra rows in the back, there empty chairs here and there further up towards the front. But that is part of the 80% rule. People do not like to be squished in tight. We need a little elbow room, especially out here in the country.

In response to this growing situation the

Pastors and Elders and other leaders have
been pondering what could be done. The
usual thing to do is to either go with multiple
services or to build on to our building. Both
of these solutions have problems and
challenges that would require us change and
adapt to a new way of being the Church here at Lewis
Lake. So, as you can see, there is no easy way to apply
a quick fix to this challenge.

In the movie, "Jeremiah Johnson", an old mountain man asks Jeremiah if he can skin a Grizzly Bear. Jeremiah boldly declares that he could, as fast as the mountain man could bring him one. As Jeremiah waits in the old man's cabin he hears him coming, followed by a "Grizz"! The old man delivers the bear alive to Jeremiah and then bails out one of the cabin windows. "Skin that



one", he shouts with a laugh, "and I'll go get you another one!"

In the same way, it would seem that, if a Church is willing to take the true, apostolic gospel seriously and commit to discipling new believers in the faith, the Lord seems to be saying "Ok, let's go." and He brings people our way. But the Lord keeps bringing people to our door and we are simply trying to keep up with what He is doing.

So, as we come to Church on Sunday

mornings, there are some things we can do right now.

· First, look for those empty chairs farther up towards the front and consider trying to fill in the gaps.

Second, introduce yourself to someone you don't know and get acquainted with them.

 Third, be praying for God's leading as we seek to understand how we can make room for all those whom God is calling.

"Evil things" come from within. Sinners sin because at their heart, at the core of their being, they're sinners. Profound, I know. Sinners *want* to sin. Sin makes them *happy*. And this is true even though sin harms a person and ruins his life. Small wonder that purity of heart sounds boring. Small wonder seeing God doesn't strike people as very exciting. Why would it?

The pure heart, on the other hand, is enthralled by pure things. It is fixated on things that are true, honorable, just, pure, lovely, commendable, etc (Phil. 4:8). Rather than being obsessed with self-satisfaction, the pure heart loves others, and is therefore "patient and kind... does not envy or boast... is not arrogant or rude... does not insist on its own way... is not irritable or resentful... does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but rejoices with the truth" (1

The problem we all face is that we're born with impure, selfish hearts. Patience, for instance, is not a default attitude we're born with. Have you ever heard a hungry baby say, "Take your time, Mom, I'm in no hurry." I haven't. Toddlers have to be taught manners; rudeness, arrogance, and unkindness are default positions. There's something fundamentally wrong with our hearts.

This is why the Bible insists we need a heart transplant. We need a heart that longs for purity, and none of us are born with one. So God puts a new heart in his people, a heart that responds positively to his Word. A heart that wants to please God. A heart that his salvation finds joy in pleasing God.

I'm always glad when people come to Lewis Lake, whatever their reason. Maybe it's because we have such an excellent kids ministry, maybe it's because we have great music, maybe it's because the service time is convenient, maybe the pastors are so good looking and

the sermons are so riveting. Those are all fine reasons, even if some are implausible!

My favorite reason people attend is when people just want to be in God's house, with God's people, seeking God's face and studying God's Word so they can go out and live it better. They're pursuing purity of heart, and they won't rest until they get it. And just as sinners are never happy unless they're pursuing some kind of sin,

these people are restless unless they're pursuing God. And they have a profound happiness about them, a happiness non-Christians will never understand. But they can, and often do, appreciate it very much and wish they could have that kind of happiness.

This side of heaven we'll never get *all* the sin out of our actions, and there's some remnant of sin still in us, but new-hearted Christians really do find genuine joy in doing – and not doing – things those still enslaved to sin can never enjoy. Which means we'll always be a little weird.

The Happy Heart

"Who shall ascend the hill of the LORD? And who shall stand in his holy place?" David asked, assuming that some people would actually *want* to ascend the Lord's hill and stand in his holy place. He answers his own question, "He who has clean hands and a pure heart" (Psalm 24:3-4). No one stands before God without a pure heart. But for him who does, "He will receive blessing from the LORD and righteousness from the God of

his salvation" (Psalm 24:5).

Again, the impure heart really doesn't have any interest in righteousness. But we've already seen Jesus say, "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied" (Matt 5:6), so we know that some *do* long for righteousness. They won't be happy until they get it anymore than a thirsty

man won't be satisfied until he has a tall glass of cool water. Jesus promises they will be satisfied.

The pure heart ultimately finds its happiness in seeing God. "This is eternal life," Jesus told his Father, "that they may know you, the only true God, and Jesus whom you have sent" (John 17:3). Jesus doesn't simply mean that knowing God means you'll live forever, he means the only way to experience life as it was designed to be lived is to know God. Only knowing Jesus is finally satisfying.

Hell is unsatisfying for eternity. An eternity of longing for things that can't quench the thirsty soul, and not being able (or willing) to have what does satisfy – knowing God. It's an eternity of dying. Heaven is the happiness of seeing God. God's presence is finally the only thing that can satisfy our deepest longings. Our longings are just that big. God made them that way.

Which means our satisfaction will be far beyond anything we have experienced or can imagine now. The pure in heart will be happy, for they will see God. If God's given

you a purity-seeking heart, rejoice! Then go out and seek to be pure. If God hasn't, and living for God seems dull and boring, but at the same time you're finding yourself incredibly unsatisfied and unhappy even


