Letter from Sarah



Dear Church Family,

I sat in front of my computer screen for hours, not knowing where to start or what to say. I read passage after passage and prayed. My prayers are many. All our prayers are many. What does the Lord require of us at a time when brokenness and division and fear are rising like the tide? How do we walk with integrity as the children of God when it is hard to know what to do or where to start?

As I prayed this week, I kept going back in my mind to this verse in 2 Chronicles 7. Solomon and all of Israel had finished building the Temple for the Lord. When Solomon finished praying, fire came down from heaven, and the glory of the Lord filled the temple. God's very presence and power filled the Temple, and for the rest of their lives, they would remember and testify to this moment.

And the people did the only reasonable thing to do. They fell with their faces to the ground and worshipped the Lord God Almighty, saying, "HE is good; HIS love endures forever." When Solomon had finished all he had in mind to do, the Lord appeared to him that night and said, "If my people who are called by my name will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and I will forgive their sin and will heal their land."

Every part of that passage stuck with me: "If my people who are called by my name..." If every person who lives under the lordship of Christ, every professing believer in Jesus Christ, would fall on their knees in prayer and seek his face - just imagine what would happen. Imagine the change that would sweep through our nation if all Christians took the teachings of Jesus seriously above all else, above party and policy and position.

Just Christians being Christlike. What a thing that would be.

Later in John's Gospel, Jesus will tell his disciples how to live, honor him, and be his disciples. He said, "A new command I give you, love one another. As I have loved you, so you must also love one another. By this, everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another." That's where we start. We start with prayer, humility, and love. We do the next right thing each day to bring about a more just world. I want to live in a world where Christians behaved like Christ.

And it starts with me. So I will stand on the side of Christ. Always. My heart belongs to the Lord, and I am bound by my oath and promise of surrender. Every day, it is my responsibility to wake up, pray up, and then live up to the person I have been created to be. I am committed to reading the Word of God every day and putting into practice the teachings of Christ. I will serve the people he served. I will care for those he cared for. I will kneel down in the dirt with those left for dead. I will speak love and truth and be quick to seek forgiveness for words spoken in haste. I will lead with love and grace. I will be the voice for the voiceless. I will look to the Lord today for him to provide my daily bread and trust him with my tomorrows. I will do what good I can wherever I can. I will always be on the side of grace and love. I belong to Jesus, come what may. I will bear his image as best I can and live his teachings as faithfully as I am able.

And, it starts with you. He's calling you to a life of surrender, a life of following him and living like him. He's calling you to not despair but to live in hope and in trust. He's calling you to lead with love, grace, and truth. He is with us and for us. He will never leave us. So let's trust him enough to do the next right thing.

Let's put our love in action one day at a time.

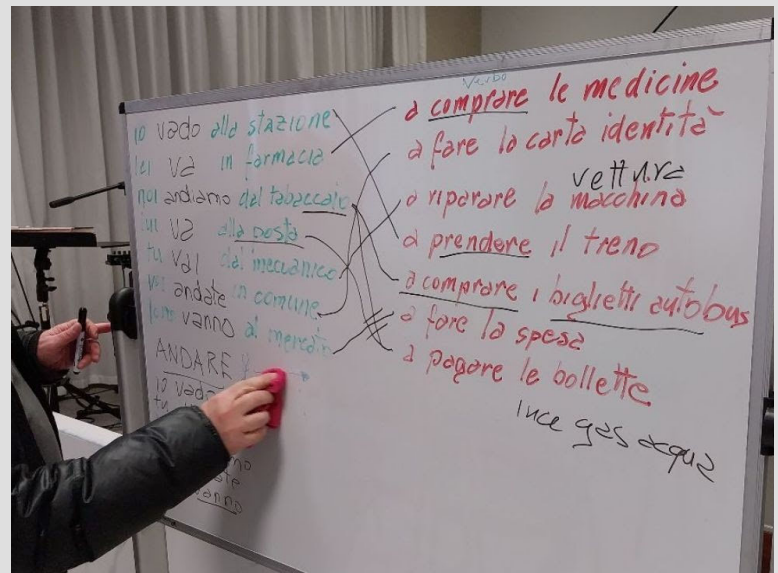
Grace and Aaron are using their unique individual gifts and skills to provide people access to God's life-transforming Word. Aaron serves refugee and asylum-seeking peoples who have come to Italy from across the African continent. He cultivates opportunities for Scripture engagement by connecting with those who do not have the complete Bible in their language, while exploring potential for Bible translation projects. Grace is an assistant to the Africa Area team, which works to support existing Bible translation projects in many ways, including consultant checking, desktop publishing and training workshops. This team's work accelerates the process of getting Scripture into the heart languages of Bibleless people groups.

In June of 2026, I (Brad) will have the opportunity to go visit the Ogburns in Milan and witness the work God is doing in and through them there! They are working tirelessly to translate God's Word into the languages of the people they are ministering to. What an incredible and important task God has bestowed upon them!

Serving Opportunities

What is CareForOKC?

CareForOKC is our church's community ministry. It's located on the Ground Floor of FBCOKC and serves clients on Monday afternoons from 4-6pm. We have a food pantry which is like a tiny grocery store. Canned vegetables, meats, produce, milk, eggs, pastas, bread, deserts, and a lot more. Clients get to shop for groceries. We also have a clothes closet that has clothes for women, men, and children. If you've never been to CareForOKC, we'd love for you to come down and take a tour. We serve over 75 families every single week.

Who does CareForOKC serve?

CareForOKC serves the working poor, those experiencing homelessness, immigrants and refugees new to Oklahoma City, folks who may have lost their jobs or are in another life transition, victims of domestic violence, the disabled, and many more.

How does CareForOKC provide this service to the community?

We have an incredible lay team of volunteers that serve clients on Monday nights. Volunteers check in clients, assist them in the food pantry and clothes closet, and help people get their food/clothes loaded into their vehicles. In addition to Monday afternoons, we have drivers who pick up food donated from Wal-Mart and bring it to CareForOKC, we have other volunteers who come up during the week and restock the food pantry shelves or process clothes in the closet.

Where Does the Food Come From at CareForOKC?

CareForOKC has partnerships with a local Wal-Mart where we pick up donated food twice a week and deliver it to the church. We also have a partnership with the Regional Foodbank of Oklahoma that enables us to buy bulk food items at a discounted cost. Occasionally, we will receive free items from the foodbank in addition to the goods we buy. In addition to Wal-Mart and the Regional Foodbank, we receive food and monetary donations from our FBCOKC church family and the community.

How can I pray for and support this ministry?

You may noticed that your grocery bill is more expensive these days. Items that we purchase from the Regional Foodbank for our food pantry, which are often heavily discounted, are becoming more expensive or even not available. Due to the recent cuts to federal aid, our CareForOKC team is spending more money purchasing food to help keep our shelves stocked each week. Our reality is not unique. Community ministries in our area and across the nation are working to find creative ways to continue serving folks despite the effects of inflation and budget cuts. God has been so faithful in providing for our needs and we trust that God will continue to be faithful as we love our neighbors as ourselves. We can't express how thankful we are for your prayers, countless volunteer hours, food and clothes donations, financial gifts, and so much more. His master replied, *'Well done, good and faithful servant! You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things. Come and share your master's happiness!'* Matthew 25:23.

As I sit here on a Sunday afternoon, watching the New England Patriots and the Denver Broncos compete in the AFC Championship game, I find myself reflecting on the competitive spirit that has shaped my life. I don't have a strong preference for either team; instead, I appreciate the thrill of watching two talented squads battle it out to see who comes out on top.

This love for competition was ingrained in me from a young age, largely due to my father, a passionate sports enthusiast and coach throughout his teaching career. With only one television in our home, it always seemed to be tuned to a sporting event. The excitement of athletes digging deep within themselves to achieve their goals resonates with me on a personal level.

The game also brings back memories of my time in Katy, TX, where Mike and I raised our children. There, I had the privilege of working at a Texas 6A high school, where football was woven into the community's fabric. "Friday Night Lights" was more than just a saying; it captured the essence of the residents' unwavering support for the Katy High School Tigers. At the heart of this exciting culture was Mike Johnston, affectionately known as "Coach." He wasn't just a skilled football coach; he was a visionary dedicated to shaping the character of young men. He instilled in his players a mantra: "When excellence becomes tradition, greatness has no limits." This philosophy created a culture of high expectations and a relentless work ethic of preparing yourself so you could give your best.

However, my heart feels heavy as I reflect on Coach's recent passing. He was more than a coach to so many; he was a steadfast friend and a man of profound faith. Though far from perfect, he exemplified his beliefs both on and off the field, demonstrating a love for Jesus that inspired everyone around him. As I contemplate his legacy, I am reassured that he has found his place with Jesus.

Coach taught us that even the smallest talents could blossom into something remarkable, enhancing character and enriching faith. Throughout life, people come and go, each leaving unique impacts. Coach Johnston had a remarkable career and meant something special to countless individuals. Although I wasn't one of his players, I cherished his friendship and the unwavering trust in God that he demonstrated. As he faced the end of his life, grappling with pain and uncertainty, I prayed for his strength—to trust in his instincts and cling to a faith greater than himself. I have learned that true excellence isn't measured by victories but by the growth and development of our faith in Jesus that shapes us as individuals, creating a legacy that endures beyond our time on earth.

As I reflect on the qualities evident in Coach Johnston's life, I strive to embody his strong traits: hard work, tenacity, a love for people, and a profound belief in Jesus. I aspire to love and serve Jesus wholeheartedly during my time here. When my journey comes to an end, I hope others will remember me with the same reverence they held for Coach: *"Well done, good and faithful servant."* -**Toni**
