

Transfiguration: The Big Reveal

5-Day Devotional

Day 1: The Revealed Glory

Reading

Mark 9:2-9 After six days Jesus took Peter, James and John with him and led them up a high mountain, where they were all alone. There he was transfigured before them. His clothes became dazzling white, whiter than anyone in the world could bleach them. And there appeared before them Elijah and Moses, who were talking with Jesus. Peter said to Jesus, “Rabbi, it is good for us to be here. Let us put up three shelters—one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah.” (He did not know what to say, they were so frightened.) Then a cloud appeared and covered them, and a voice came from the cloud: “This is my Son, whom I love. Listen to him!” Suddenly, when they looked around, they no longer saw anyone with them except Jesus. As they were coming down the mountain, Jesus gave them orders not to tell anyone what they had seen until the Son of Man had risen from the dead.

Devotional

On the mountain, Jesus didn't become something new—He revealed who He always was. The transfiguration wasn't about transformation but revelation. In our daily lives, we often miss seeing Jesus clearly because we're clouded by distractions, doubts, or our own agendas. Today, ask yourself: Do I see Jesus as merely a good teacher, or as God in the flesh? The disciples witnessed dazzling glory that day, but Jesus offers us something even more intimate—the Holy Spirit dwelling within us. Take time today to pray for clear spiritual vision. Ask God to remove whatever clouds your view of Christ's true identity and power in your life.

Day 2: Listening to the Son

Reading

John 14:6-11 Jesus answered, “I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. If you really know me, you will know^a my Father as well. From now on, you do know him and have seen him.” Philip said, “Lord, show us the Father and that will be enough for us.” Jesus answered: “Don't you know me, Philip, even after I have been among you such a long time? Anyone who has seen me has seen

the Father. How can you say, 'Show us the Father'? Don't you believe that I am in the Father, and that the Father is in me? The words I say to you I do not speak on my own authority. Rather, it is the Father, living in me, who is doing his work. Believe me when I say that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; or at least believe on the evidence of the works themselves.

Devotional

This is my Son whom I love. Listen to Him." The Father's voice from the cloud wasn't a suggestion—it was a command. In a world filled with competing voices, conflicting advice, and endless opinions, God directs us to one source: Jesus. When you want to know who God is, what He desires, or how to live, look to Jesus. He said, "If you've seen me, you've seen the Father." There are no hidden secrets, no obscure passages that unlock God's "real" character. It's all revealed in Christ. Today, commit to listening—really listening—to Jesus through Scripture, prayer, and worship. Let His voice become the loudest in your life.

Day 3: Repentance Brings Refreshing

Reading

Acts 3:19-20 Repent, then, and turn to God, so that your sins may be wiped out, that times of refreshing may come from the Lord, and that he may send the Messiah, who has been appointed for you—even Jesus.

Devotional

Peter, who witnessed Jesus transfigured in glory, later preached a powerful message: "Repent and turn to God, so that your sins may be wiped out, that times of refreshing may come from the Lord." Repentance isn't just feeling sorry—it's turning away from what's destroying you and turning toward the God who restores you. Are you drinking from poisoned wells of anger, bitterness, or hidden sin, then expecting Jesus to provide an antidote? Today is your day to stop returning to what harms you. Name your struggles honestly before God. Leave them at the cross. Jesus offers living water—miracle power for your life—but you must stop going back to the old well.

Day 4: The Journey to Jerusalem

Reading

Luke 9:51 As the time approached for him to be taken up to heaven, Jesus resolutely set out for Jerusalem.

Devotional

"Jesus resolutely set out for Jerusalem." After the mountaintop revelation, Jesus didn't linger in glory—He headed toward the cross. He knew what awaited Him: betrayal, suffering, death. Yet He went willingly because He knew something greater awaited beyond the tomb: resurrection and your salvation. The transfiguration was a spoiler alert—showing that death wouldn't have the final word. As we journey through Lent toward Easter, we walk with Jesus to Jerusalem. What does it mean for you to "resolutely set out" in faith? What difficult obedience is God calling you toward? Trust that beyond every cross lies resurrection power. Jesus went to Jerusalem for you. Will you follow Him?

Day 5: How Great Is Our God

Reading

Revelation 1:12-18 I turned around to see the voice that was speaking to me. And when I turned I saw seven golden lampstands, and among the lampstands was someone like a son of man, dressed in a robe reaching down to his feet and with a golden sash around his chest. The hair on his head was white like wool, as white as snow, and his eyes were like blazing fire. His feet were like bronze glowing in a furnace, and his voice was like the sound of rushing waters. In his right hand he held seven stars, and coming out of his mouth was a sharp, double-edged sword. His face was like the sun shining in all its brilliance. When I saw him, I fell at his feet as though dead. Then he placed his right hand on me and said: "Do not be afraid. I am the First and the Last. I am the Living One; I was dead, and now look, I am alive for ever and ever! And I hold the keys of death and Hades.

Devotional

The same Jesus who was transfigured on the mountain, who walked to Jerusalem, who died and rose again, now reigns in glory. John's vision in Revelation shows Christ in blazing, eternal glory—eyes like fire, voice like rushing waters, face shining like the sun. This is your Savior, your King, your Friend. He holds the keys to death and Hades. He conquered sin and the grave. He offers you forgiveness, healing, and eternal life. When life feels overwhelming, when darkness closes in, remember: you serve a great God. Sing it, declare it, believe it—"How great is our God!" Let this truth transfigure your heart today. You belong to the King of Glory, and nothing can separate you from His love.

As you complete this devotional journey, carry the vision of Christ's glory with you. Let it transform how you see yourself, your circumstances, and your future. Jesus is revealed—now live in the light of who He truly is.
