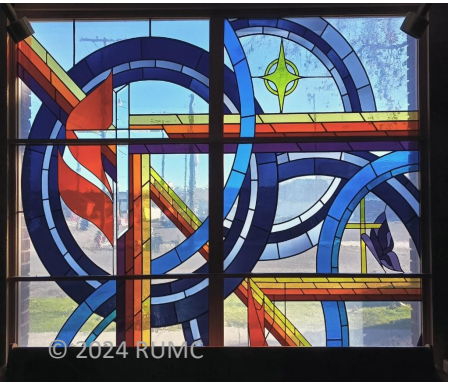

LEADERSHIP BOARD NEWS

The Leadership Board met on January 21, 2026. The Board meets the third Wednesday of each month at 4:30 p.m.. Every meeting is open to anyone who would like to attend, although an executive section may be called. Each meeting includes a time for Trustees, Finance, and Staff-Parish Relations.

There will be a “State of the Church” address after worship on Sunday, March 1, 2026. This meeting is to inform the congregation of the activities of the Board, and to answer questions. Each year, the Board writes and signs a covenant of behavior, which will also be shared with the congregation at the meeting.

As **Trustees**, the Board has had the floor in the upstairs boy’s restroom replaced, and are working to make the parsonage more ADA accessible by installing rails to the front and back steps. To prepare the parsonage for the next pastor (and make it nicer for the current pastor), the floor in the main bathroom will be repaired, and toilets in two of the bathrooms will be replaced.

As **Finance**, the Board met with the church financial manager, Jennifer Hieb, to discuss the budget for 2026. The budget will be shared at the State of the Church meeting. The Board is in the process of considering other possible outreach uses for the donations that supported MCEA. The Board acknowledged that communication as to why the church no longer financially supports MCEA (Minidoka Christian Education Association) needs to be shared with the congregation at the State of the Church. Members of the church are welcome to donate directly to MCEA.

As **Staff-Parish Relations**, the Board discussed the process of a change in pastors. There will need to be an increase of money saved for moving costs for a new pastor. The Annual Conference and the local church share the costs. No names have yet been shared with the Board, and once a new pastor has been determined, no name may be shared with the congregation until the planned appointment has been announced by the conference.

If you have any comments or questions, please speak with a Leadership Board member. The members are Barbara Rodgers, Marion Weickum, Britton Bell, Andy Lehr, Marybeth Kraemer, Jackie Hiaring, Rap Howell, Joyce Orem, and Brian Williams. Stan Bruns (Lay Leader) and Pastor Brenda are part of the Board with voice only because of their church roles.

LEADERSHIP BOARD ADOPTS GOALS FOR 2026

The Leadership Board held their retreat on Saturday, January 10th at the Rupert United Methodist Church. The board reviewed the values of the church.

The board set new goals for 2026.

1. Developing Laity Leadership – In 2026, Rupert UMC will strengthen its laity by engaging at least one lay person per quarter in a leadership development opportunity from the conference or other source. Funding will be provided by the church.

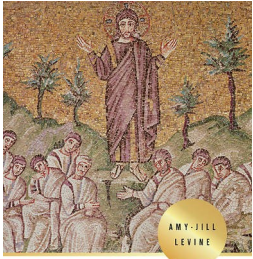
Action: quarterly class

2. Cultural Awareness – In 2026, Rupert UMC will increase cultural awareness of the congregation through the use of at least 4 resources or experiences.

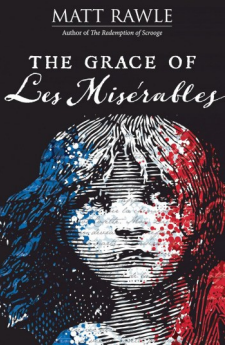
Actions: movies, quarterly speakers, visit to Fort Hall and invite Phill Allen (Nez Perce) from Lapwai in August 2026

ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL NEW CLASSES

From January 25 through March 1, the adult Sunday school class will be studying Amy-Jill Levine's Sermon on the Mount, a beginner's guide to the Kingdom of Heaven. According to Adam Hamilton, "Amy-Jill Levine's book is an essential guide to Jesus's Sermon on the Mount. Professor Levine invites us to hear the Jewishness of Jesus's words, understand them in the light of the world to which he spoke them, that we might better understand how these words speak to us today. From March 8 through April 12, the class will be studying Matt Rawle's, The Grace of Les Misérables. In this six-week study, we will explore six themes—grace, justice, poverty, revolution, love, and hope—each represented by a character in Hugo's story. *In preparation for this study, you are invited to the parsonage on February 28 at 5:00 p.m. for dinner and a viewing of "Les Misérables."*

HOW DO WE CONTINUE WITH ALTAR FLOWERS?

Each week's altar flowers cost the church \$30 (\$15/bouquet). That doesn't sound like much, but it adds up to \$1,560/year. That amount would more than cover the church's lawn mowing costs for the year!

To fund the altar flowers, people sign up to sponsor the flowers for a week. They may either sponsor one bouquet, or both bouquets. They are welcome to take the flowers home after the Sunday service or leave them for the administrative assistant to enjoy during the week. There is a sign-up sheet in the fellowship hall to request bouquets. The next step is to write a check to the church with "altar flowers" listed in the memo.



In January, only January 25th flowers were sponsored. That means the church paid \$90 out of our general budget for the month to cover the cost of flowers. So far, only two bouquets have been sponsored for February, which means that the church may again need to spend \$90 of our budget.

If the beauty of flowers enhances your worship experience, or you want to honor someone, or remember someone, please consider signing up to sponsor a week, or two, or three in the fellowship hall.

EASTER EGG HUNT COORDINATOR NEEDED

OPEN HEARTS FOOD PANTRY



Open Hearts Food Pantry is located at Rupert United Methodist Church 605 H Street, Rupert Idaho. The pantry is open Mondays & Wednesdays 11:00 am to 1:00 pm, closed on Federal Holidays. Clients can receive one food box a month along with fresh produce, dairy products, bread and choice of meat. Clients can return once a week during the month for additional fresh produce and bread if it is available. Open Hearts Food Pantry fed an average of 300 households per month which is an average of 950 people per month during 2025. We also distributed approximately 38 commodity food boxes to low ncome seniors each month. Our Food Pantry has multiple community partners including our congregation, Idaho Food Bank, Ridley’s Market, LDS Bishop’s Storehouse, Zarybinski Foundation, Lions Club, Humanitarian Center, Rupert Elks, Kentucky Fried Chicken, Crop Walk, Miller Research, DOT Foods, Amalgamated Sugar, Beet Growers Association and local Churches.

We have approximately 15 volunteers who help with food distribution, client registration, unloading trucks and paperwork. The pantry has been blessed since the pandemic with major corporate donations that have allowed for the purchase of a storage shed and new appliances. Our pantry started out many years ago giving food boxes to a few people who came into the church office needing food and has grown into a community service that can help those in our communities that are food insecure. We have not always been called Open Hearts Food Pantry but decided on that name a few years ago when we became partners with the Idaho Food Bank.
