



In Search of Job's Redeemer

Job 19:23-27

In what ways could you identify with how we resist the finality of death?

Something deep within us resists the idea that death gets the last word.

That instinct only intensifies when the innocent die. In moments like that – when the wrongness of death is unmistakable – we find ourselves thinking – *This can't be how the story ends.* And

when it isn't made right in this life, something in us insists there must be more.

That cry is found in the book of Job. Job has lost everything. Yet he dares to hope and confesses, *I know my Redeemer lives!* Job's hope is a blurred hope. He doesn't know how his Redeemer will act – only that He will. And it is in Christ that what remains blurred in Job finally comes into focus.

Today, we'll see how Job's words come into focus in Christ.

Job, penniless, friendless, and helpless, dares to call God his living Redeemer. His hope presses beyond this life toward personal encounter with God. In Christ, what is blurred in Job comes into focus: the Redeemer enters suffering, passes through death, and is seated in power. This week, practice this little prayer without explaining, fixing, or resolving anything: “I trust You, my living Redeemer.”

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
