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From Pastor's Pen:

"For [Christ] himself is our peace, who has made us both one and has broken down in his flesh the dividing wall of hostility...that he might create in himself one new man in place of two, so making peace." (Eph. 2:14, 15b)

My beloved in Christ,

It is tragic that in the week following the celebration of our shared heritage of liberty an assassination attempt would be made upon one of our former presidents. Lives were lost and families traumatized because an unstable young man was taken captive by the vile hatred that has taken ahold of our nation.

Party differences in matters of social mores and governing philosophy have turned from civil, respectful dialogue into mean-spirited accusations and slanderous speech. The flames of hatred are being fanned by politicians and the media so that even those of us who claim to be Christian, who say we believe that we should love others as Christ has loved us, are being taken captive by the father of lies who was a murderer from the beginning. [Cf. Jn. 8:44]

I have heard professing Christians say that they "hate" people who belong to an opposing political party. I have seen some openly lament that the shooter missed his target. This breaks my heart and it should yours, also.

Christ has redeemed us to live in godliness and righteousness. He has called us to love and forgive one another. He has commanded us to build each other up, not tear one another down. I think it is high time that we think more about God's will for us than the platforms of our preferred party. I think it is time that we stop thinking about being Red or Blue and start thinking about living as children of the light. I think that it is time that we focus on our unity in Christ and our shared citizenship in His kingdom instead of seeking to divide and obtain political victories.

In the verse above from St. Paul's letter to the Ephesians he was speaking primarily about the dividing wall between Jew and Gentile that Christ broke down by offering His flesh on the cross to reconcile both to God. Yet, I believe that it is still applicable to us and any dividing walls that this world is attempting to erect between us. Christ has come to be our peace, to break down those walls that divide us, and to create something new, unified, and beautiful out of us.

Therefore, I urge you to not let the ancient murderer lead you to commit murder in your heart. Do not let the father of lies tempt you to bear false witness against your neighbor. Remember that love covers a multitude of sins. Remember the admonition "as far as it depends on you live at peace with one another." Remember to always attempt to explain things in the kindest possible way. And remember to always let your speech be seasoned with grace.

My prayer for us all is that we will live in ways that are worthy of our calling and do the good works for which we have been created in Christ Jesus. My beloved, make peace!

From the Deaconess' Desk

I recently had the opportunity to visit the Pregnancy Resources that just opened in East Moline. As many of you may already be aware, this center is the third of its kind in the area with the other two locations in Moline and Davenport. This was a wonderful opportunity to see one of the many resources that our community offers to support people at a vulnerable time in their life.

Many resource centers such as this one make it their mission to inform their patients about all the options that they have in front of them. It is their goal to do this with compassion and understanding as the patients may be undergoing stress, hardship, or isolation due to their current circumstances.

Too often, people feel forced into decisions that they later regret because the weight of the situation clouded their vision and made the path in front of them look short, dark, and terrifying. While the path may still be scary, sometimes all it takes to lift the clouds and shine some light into the situation is hope.

This hope can come in the form of a friend walking side by side with them through appointments and paperwork. It can come in the form of information about options that they may have never considered before. It can come through provision of material resources. Most importantly, hope comes through the sharing of God's good promises for His children

Our Father promises to never leave or forsake us. He promises to forgive our sins for the sake of His Son Jesus Christ. Where we face uncertainty, we can rely on the truth that God is in the midst of our lives, walking with us and guiding us. And where we face regret or guilt, we rely on the blood of Christ which has cleansed us and given us new life.

I will leave you with a recent *Life Thought* from Lutherans for Life:

"Choice does matter when it comes to surprise pregnancies and terminal diagnoses. But it is the Heavenly Father's choice that makes the difference (Ephesians 1:4-5). He summoned every life even before our circumstances, and He sustains each one even when we don't find the circumstances ideal."

Notes from the Balcony

Here we are in August. This month always seems to come before I am ready for it. August means the wrapping up of summer, ushers in the new school year, and signals the end of that little bit of extra time to do summer projects. In my earlier days, August meant gathering (not buying) school supplies for a new year and carrying them in a pencil box down the lane through the cemetery to the two-room Lutheran school I attended. It always smelled and looked so fresh and new that first week. The parents of the students had given the school a once over. My favorite sight was the newly refinished wood floor which looked so beautiful on the first day of school.

What does the Bible have to say about education? Here are just a few verses on the subject:

“The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge:

 Fools despise wisdom and instruction.” Proverbs 1:7

“Make me to know your ways, O Lord;

 teach me your paths.” Psalm 25:4

“Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light.” Matthew 11:29-30

How about the hymnal? Are there any hymns that champion learning? Yes! Members chose two of these hymns as one of their favorite hymns. One emphasizes the sure knowledge of Christ’s resurrection and its connection with baptism. *We Know That Christ Is Raised* (LSB 603) was written by British Old Testament scholar, hymn writer, and minister John B. Geyer (1932-2020). He was a scholarly type and worked in several institutions of higher learning and wrote a commentary titled, *The Wisdom of Solomon*. This hymn was written while Geyer was a tutor at Cheshunt College, Cambridge, U.K., where work was proceeding on in vitro fertilization. *We Know that Christ is Raised* was written to correlate the doctrine of baptism to that research. The original words of this hymn used language related to this experimentation such as “the Spirit’s fission shakes the church of God” and “as Christ’s new body takes on flesh and blood.” Our present version focuses more on Christ’s resurrection and baptism.

The second favorite hymn that focuses on education can be found in the *Christian Home and Education* section of the hymnal. It is *Oh, Blest the House* (LSB 862). Christoph Carl Ludwig von Pfeil (1712-1784), who studied law and became a German civil servant, has had 950 of his hymns published. Originally written for the Gospel reading of the First Sunday after Epiphany, it recounts the boy Jesus’ visit to the temple when He was twelve. The hymn reminds parents that the house is blest where Christ is the center and encourages nothing to be spared in care or cost to bring up children to know the Lord. That house will be filled with faith, hope, and love as well as peace and joy in service to the Lord.

May we always look forward to and never tire of learning of Jesus. Happy August!

Current DFM Project

Amount to be funded: \$25,000

Project: Replace furnaces at Immanuel Lutheran Student Center, Macomb

Church services are held at 11:00 a.m. every Sunday in the student center's Chapel of St. Timothy the Learner. Students attend, as well as members of Immanuel Lutheran Church, CID's partner in campus ministry in Macomb. On Wednesday evenings, students are invited to meals prepared by church member families in the student center kitchen, prior to a weekly Bible study session also in the student center. The pastor's office and church office for Immanuel, Macomb are located in the center, highly accessible to students.

The student center celebrated its 50th anniversary some five years ago. Now furnaces need to be replaced. The current Dollar for Missions project is to provide \$25,000 for furnace replacement to keep the student center both operational and operating for years into the future.

Mercy and Grace Lead to Generosity

Thanks be to God for His inexpressible gift" (2 Cor. 9:15)! This is St. Paul's exclamation upon hearing the Corinthian church's response to the preaching of the Gospel of Jesus Christ and his request for support for the church in Jerusalem. The Christians in Corinth heard and received God's mercy in Christ, and they responded to St. Paul's call to support Christians in Jerusalem with a collection. The Corinthians' joy filled Jerusalem's need.

This is the reality of stewardship. Because of God's generosity in the giving of His Son to die on the cross for us, we are to be generous with all that we receive from Him. What do we receive? Everything. All that we are and all that we have is the Lord's. He is the creator and the giver. We are His creatures and those who receive what He gives.

It sounds easy. And it is. But then again it isn't. Stewardship is easy because it is God's work. Through what God gives, we give to others. Through what God gives, we support the work of the church for the life of the world. He gives; we receive. And like our generous Father in Heaven, we, as His children, use what He gives to us to love and serve others.

But stewardship is also difficult. That is because it goes against our natural inclination to think that what I have is mine to do what I want with. This is our sinful nature. It is our selfishness and our greed. How can we who have been given everything — life, food, clothing, house, home, forgiveness, divine sonship, an eternal inheritance — be so stingy with what we give to the church, the place where we hear about and receive all that God gives us and does for us? We are all guilty of this kind of thinking. And the only godly response is to repent and trust in the Gos-pel.

For if God has given you His own Son, will He not give you all things? Yes. He will. This is His sure and certain promise. God provides for His people. He provides everything we need for this body and life and for the life that is to come.

The church is a mercy place. It's a place where God's mercy in the death and resurrection of His Son, Jesus Christ, is given and received. For us who believe it means forgiveness, life and salvation in the face of sin, death and the power of the devil. Here in the church, we inhale God's mercy in Word and Sacrament, and exhale this same mercy in love and service to our neighbor. And that is an enduring, joyful thing to do. Our joy fills our neighbor's need because His joy filled ours (Heb. 12:2). Thanks be to God for His inexpressible gift!

From the CID

Dear St. John's,

[Jesus said] *"If your right eye causes you to sin, tear it out and throw it away. For it is better that you lose one of your members than that your whole body be thrown into hell."* Matthew 5:29

Jesus isn't teaching us how to maim ourselves into heaven with these words. But neither is he just trying to reveal our inability or unwillingness to truly repent. What he IS doing is teaching us about prudence, discipline, and self-control for the sake of our eternal salvation. A wise Christian recognizes that there are particular people, places, and things that are prone to lead him into sin, AND he knows that if he would curb their influence, he ought to avoid them. So, for example, someone who is given to Drink, should avoid bars or people that make him want to drink. Someone who is a glutton should avoid going to buffet restaurants. It's a matter of "cutting out" of your life anything that you know leads to sin — regardless of how otherwise neutral or even good it is, such as an eye or a hand. This is the wisdom of God's law applied, particularly in its curbing use. With these words from the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus is giving us practical advice — not to save ourselves, but to keep us safe from spiritual harm, and like all gifts from him, we ought to receive it in good faith and with thanksgiving.


