## From Pastor's Pen:

*"...be renewed in the spirit of your minds, and put on the new self, created after the likeness of God in true righteousness and holiness." (Eph. 4:22-23)*

Dear friends in Christ,



The Apostle reminds us that *"our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms. Therefore, put on the full armor of God, so that when the day of evil comes, you may be able to stand your ground, and after you have done everything, to stand. Stand firm then, with the belt of truth buckled around your waist, with the breastplate of righteousness in place, and with your feet fitted with the readiness that comes from the gospel of peace. In addition to all this, take up the shield of faith, with which you can extinguish all the flaming arrows of the evil one. Take the helmet of salvation and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God."* (Eph. 6:12-17)

Your life can be like that little boy, blessed and wrapped in newness, who enjoyed his best first day, ever. Renewed by the Spirit, clothed by Christ in a new self, and wearing the full armor of God, I pray that you every day you will be found grinning ear-to-ear because of the gifts God has given you. I pray that, living under God's grace, forgiven and loved, you will be able to at the end of each day, this was the best first day of my new life, ever.

## From the Deaconess' Desk



*"I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me" ~ Philippians 4:13*



This month, the Wednesday morning Women's Bible study will start up again and we will be diving into the book of Philippians. As I am preparing for study in this book, I am drawn to the verse above and how I have heard it used in many contexts apart from its true meaning. Only a couple weeks ago, I saw it pasted onto a video of someone lifting really heavy weights in the gym. While I am sure that it is indeed a God pleasing thing to be good stewards of our bodies, physically lifting heavy weight is not what St. Paul was referring to here.

This verse is one among many that are frequently and conveniently picked out of the Bible in an attempt to provide a quick and helpful solution to the troubles that others may be facing. While the intention behind this is genuine and good, let's face it, these platitudes are rarely all that helpful without understanding the true meaning of the larger context.

For example, here in Philippians, Paul is referring to his ability to be content in any circumstance. He is referencing the strength that Christ gives him to bear his burdens and accept joy in whatever place he finds himself in. Having been taught this, we can use this verse as a reminder to find joy and contentment in our lives, no matter what we are going through or what challenges we are facing. With this background, we can also avoid applying it to the wrong circumstances.

Ultimately, having small, memorable verses in our pocket to cling to and give us encouragement is for our benefit. I would encourage us all to take a deeper look however at the larger context behind our favorite verses. We just might find some background or insight into the Scriptures that we had overlooked previously. Personally, I have found that just about any time I study a verse again with fresh eyes, I gain something new from it and am encouraged to continue learning.

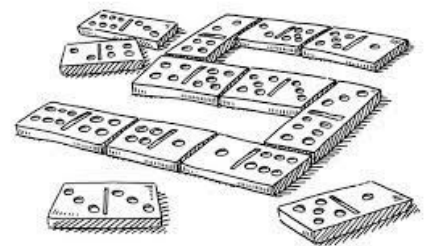
**SATURDAYS at 8:00AM, beginning September 14th**

### FOOD PANTRY

Harvest season is on the horizon... There will soon be a crisp chill in the air...Do you have a favorite homemade soup recipe? Bring a copy of your recipe to the office for Annie to copy, and perhaps some cans of its key ingredients, and we will share your recipe with the families who come to us for assistance.

Please, if you are able, share your fall "harvest" with those less fortunate. Any cans of fruits and vegetables would be greatly appreciated. There will be a box in the concourse for your donations.

In July of 2023, the St. John's food pantry served 140 families, with 430 individuals and 167 children. Our Riverbend food order was \$1085.04 for 2961 lbs of food.

In July of 2024, the St. John's food pantry served 161 families, with 521 individuals and 209 children. Our Riverbend food order was \$2919.84 for 5330 lbs of food.

At the end of July 2023, we had served 748 families.

At the end of July 2024, we have served 989 families.

That is a 30% increase over last year!

Yes, this was a much more expensive order than last year, but as we all know, the effects of inflation on groceries has burdened many families beyond their means. We are trying to aid more families with higher prices and it is a challenge. If you had ventured back into the food pantry the week prior to our Riverbend delivery, you would have seen almost completely empty shelves! We are doing everything we can to be good stewards with our budget, and good neighbors to those in need.

### Stewards, Called to Forgiveness

Human beings were created and redeemed to be stewards. Bearing the image of God (Gen. 1:26–28), the steward was created to reflect the Creator within creation. In a way, stewards are simply mirrors. Mirrors cannot do anything to the image that is placed in front of them.

A mirror was the first item in creation that embodied the computer term GIGO. “Garbage in, Garbage out.” In a computer, if you enter good data, you get a good result. You enter bad data; you will get a garbage result.

In photography, you can run an image through a filter, which can remove imperfections. Myriad apps allow for the option to cut people out, add people in and change backgrounds all in an attempt to make the perfect image. Mirrors cannot do that. They do not provide anything new. Mirrors are created to reflect, not process, an image. They simply reflect the person standing in front of them.

Stewards are like this. Created to reflect, a steward will reflect the God in front of them. The steward will either reflect a godly stewardship that holds that God is the owner of all things (Ps. 24:1) and is the One to whom they are accountable, or they will reflect the god of self and see the created order as something to be possessed, used, and in far too many cases, abused. It is not a question of IF the steward reflects, it is really a question of WHO is being reflected.

For this reason, the Lutheran Service Book has included a necessary hymn worthy of meditation: “Forgive Us, Lord, for Shallow Thankfulness” (LSB 788). Its first verse reads:

Forgive us, Lord, for shallow thankfulness, For dull content with warmth and sheltered care, For songs of praise for food and harvest press, While of Your richer gifts we’re unaware.

This is a fitting call to repentance for every steward. Our thankfulness is so often shallow. We get comfortable with the overflowing blessings we have entrusted to us by the Lord. These trusts are so many that the steward often forgets the One who entrusts them. Worse, with so many physical trusts evident, the steward loses sight of the greatest trust: the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The failed steward sees so much plenty that they lose sight of the treasure: Jesus!

So, we confess our shallow thankfulness. In absolution, the imperfections of the failed steward are wiped away and a new image is sent into the world. We release our hold on stuff. We rethink our relationship with the created order and recall that it is all to be used FOR JESUS! This keeps the richer gifts in view, for us and for those we know and love who need Jesus.
