From Pastor's Pen:

"Seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the LORD on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare" (Jeremiah 29:7).

Dear friends in Christ,

Recently one of our members asked me why, from the pulpit, I do not tell people who they should vote for as Christians. Well, with our two-kingdom understanding, and considering the harm that has been done to both the Church and the State when the two sought to be joined, the answer is obvious. The Church is not given to establish earthly powers, but to proclaim the Word of God and administer Christ's sacraments so that the kingdom of grace may abound.

While it is not the place of the Church to tell God's people "who" to vote for, it is entirely appropriate for it to tell them that they should vote and "how" to vote.

If the words from Jeremiah were true for God's exiles in Babylon, then they are certainly true for us exiled in this very "Babylonian" world. Christians in many countries in this world are oppressed and persecuted. They suffer under governments they are powerless to change; governments that hate their faith and silence their voices. We are blessed to live in a country where we have the blessed privilege of choosing our governing authorities and influencing their policies for the "welfare of the city."

So, yes, I am telling all of you to vote. In our constitutional republic you are the government, and voting is a civic duty that Christians should take seriously. As citizens of a country, we have been given the responsibility to vote for leaders who will govern justly and righteously. However, this responsibility should not be taken lightly, and we must approach it with wisdom and discernment.

For this reason, yes, I am going to tell you "how" to vote. Whether it be local, state or national elections our vote it is important that you evaluate political platforms and candidates through the lens of biblical values. The Bible teaches us to care for the poor, defend the oppressed, protect life, speak-up for those who cannot speak for themselves, and promote justice and righteousness. Therefore, Christians should examine every candidate's policies and positions to determine which ones align with biblical principles. After all, isn't it safe to say that God's revealed will is trustworthy and best for all?


As Christians we should approach the voting process with prayer and discernment, so under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, we may make informed decisions that align with our faith and values. Let us remember that we are called to be the salt and light of the world, so influencing our society with Biblical values and principles is important. In addition to our daily witness in word and deed, one way we can exercise our influence is by voting in a way that impacts the social and moral issues that shape our communities.

In all of this, however, we must remember that our ultimate hope does not rest in any political party or candidate for office, but in Jesus Christ who rules all things, in heaven and on earth, for our sake – for the sake of His Church. Our primary citizenship is in His kingdom, not in the kingdoms of this world. This means that our voting decisions should be guided by a desire to promote righteousness, justice, and the common good according to Biblical principles rather than personal or partisan interests.

In closing, I remind you to remember that our faith in Jesus calls us to love our neighbors, including those who may hold different political views. Therefore, even as we participate in the political process, we should model grace, civility, and respect towards those who may disagree with us, remembering that our unity as brothers and sisters in Christ is far more important than any temporal, political outcome.

Notes from the Balcony

On our trip home from Fort Wayne last week, the bright sun lit up the golden fields and blue sky making them the perfect backdrop to the fall leaf colors we enjoyed as we traveled. As we discussed the pretty scenery, Caleb reminded us that the variety of colors are always present in the leaves but during the summer they are covered up by the green pigment of chlorophyll. This started a discussion surmising that there are probably other beautiful things in life that are hidden behind what is generally apparent. From rainbows that are hidden in visible white light to the delicious raspberry syrup hidden in a DeBrand chocolate, or the beautiful insights that had been hidden in tough times to a really beautiful aspect of a friend you hadn't noticed before, or a new perception found in a familiar Bible verse, this existence is full of seen and unseen beauty.

The apostle Paul well understood how the sufferings of this world can mask the beauty of life in Christ. 2 Corinthians 4:18 provides a good summary of this truth:

“as we look not to the things that are seen but to the things that are unseen. For the things that are seen are transient, but the things that are unseen are eternal.”

While this verse could almost be applied to a fall leaf, Paul, of course, invites us to a more spiritual understanding. The beauty of eternity and all things eternal always exist but during this earthly life they can be covered up by day-to-day concerns and especially by trials.

LSB hymn #672, *Jerusalem the Golden*, a paraphrase by John Mason Neale (1818-1866) of a three-book poem of challenging meter written by Bernard of Cluny, contrasts the evils of medieval society to the glories of heaven. It is an especially good hymn for the month of November which begins with All Saints Day and ends with a strong reminder that the end is coming when Christ will be recognized as King of all. This hymn encourages its singers to remember the beauty of Heaven which can be hidden behind the cares of this world.

1. Jerusalem the golden, with milk and honey blest,
Beneath your contemplation sink heart and voice oppressed;
I know not, O I know not what joys await me there
What radiance of glory, what bliss beyond compare!
2. They stand, those halls of Zion, all jubilant with song,
and bright with many an angel, and all the martyr throng;
the Prince is ever in them; the daylight is serene;
the pastures of the blessed are decked in glorious sheen.
3. There is the throne of David; and there, from care released,
The shout of those who triumph, the song of those who feast;
And they, who with their Leader have conquered in the fight
Forever and forever are clad in robes of white.
4. O sweet and blessed country, the home of God's elect!
O sweet and blessed country, that eager hearts expect!
In mercy, Jesus, bring us to that dear land of rest,
Who are, with God the Father, and Spirit, ever blessed.

I think I will try to take some time to notice hidden beauty this month, physical and spiritual. I pray God will bless you, my friends, with realized hidden beauties also.

So far in 2024, CID Dollar for Missions contributions have funded the following projects:

1. \$1,800 for weekly mileage for Pastor David Dunlop from Chestnut to two prisons in Lincoln
2. \$300 for Spanish-language hymnals for St. John, Beardstown
3. \$2,100 to pay honoraria for Pastor Pablo Dominguez to conduct two Spanish language services per month at St. John, Beardstown for half the year
4. \$10,000 to continue prison ministries begun in 2024 or to start ministry in prisons not currently being so served.

The current project stands out as somewhat more ambitious: \$25,000 to replace furnaces at Immanuel Lutheran Student Center, Macomb. As of the end of August, we are almost 40% of the way toward completing this project. The consequences of shallow thankfulness

Can you imagine a Thanksgiving dinner without turkey, mashed potatoes, gravy and pumpkin pie? I know I can't! To not have these on the menu, or worse, to run out of them with the family around the table, would be a culinary sin of epic proportions. An attempt to serve bratwurst and hamburgers in place of the standard fare would ring hollow and seem totally inappropriate and out of place. It isn't that the food would be bad; brats and burgers are pretty tasty. But not for Thanksgiving — they just don't go together!

This month, as we continue to walk through the stewardship hymn, "Forgive Us, Lord, for Shallow Thankfulness" (LSB 788), we turn our attention to verse three. Here, William Watkins Reid, Sr., the man who penned this text, draws attention to some things that do not go along with faithful, thankful stewardship.

Forgive us, Lord, for selfish thanks and praise ...

We see this often with small children. They greedily snatch the candy out of a grandparent's hand, savagely destroy the wrapper, and attempt to stuff the entire delicacy in their mouth in one bite, only to have a parent say, "Tell grandma thank you." This is followed by the pro forma thanks that is uttered between chocolate chews. It isn't really thankfulness; it is simply checking a box to keep mom or dad off their backs.

We never really outgrow this either. Our shallow thankfulness takes the form of feigned humility when praise is being offered. We are thankful that our admirers noticed and called us out: "Look at me! Aren't I special?" No thought at all is given to the fact that the Lord was the One who gave us the ability and opportunity for accomplishment. Our false blush is really only masking our selfish, credit-seeking gain. Once again, we find ourselves idolatrously thanking ourselves.

For words that speak at variance with deeds ...

What carries more weight: words or action? The steward who gives voice to the Gospel in the Divine Service but then lives like a pagan in the world does great damage, not only to others but to the Gospel itself! This is the consequence of failed stewardship. It is idolatry that separates the steward from the Lord.

Worse yet, it also impacts others negatively. When the failed steward is the reference point outside the Christian community, there are those who want no part of being Christian or following the Christ they claim. We see this play out in the impact of overt political activity among Christians based on governing policy as opposed to fidelity to the Word of God. When our lips and our lives are out of sync, like what used to happen with old movie projectors, the impact isn't funny — it obscures the Gospel!

Forgive our thanks for walking pleasant ways unmindful of a broken brother's need ...

Our creature comforts often become an obstacle to faithful stewardship. This is true of both individual and corporate stewardship. Financial stewardship is often limited by our desire to be comfortable and have the latest toys and gadgets. Congregational stewardship is often limited by the desire to focus on what is best for the congregation as opposed to how resources might be best stewarded to reach the community with the Gospel.

When we see someone in need, or broken by the world, we often look at them as freeloaders. We admonish them to get a job. We insist that they learn our language, learn our customs, and make them their own. But this gets in the way of seeing every human being the way that Jesus sees them. Remember, that broken person is one for whom Jesus went to the cross to die and rise. When we are unmindful of these needs, our shallow thankfulness also stands in the way of the Gospel.

This stanza reminds us of the challenge we face. Our hearts are master idol-makers. Our shallow thankfulness threatens our souls and hinders others from seeing Jesus as their Lord and Savior. Stewardship is serious business. It is a task for which we were created. In our sinful failings, we are never relieved of these duties. In our Baptism, we are restored to be stewards of the Gospel. Our faithful stewardship is all about that Gospel.

Forgive us when our thanks are shallow, O Lord! In this month of Thanksgiving, grant us the grace to offer heaping helpings of this stewardship so that others may see Jesus!

In John chapter 21, Jesus gave Simon Peter three charges regarding His sheep. These charges are now carried out by the pastors who serve our churches.
