From the Pastors Desk:

The Season of Lent and the Posture of Consecration



Each year, as Lent approaches, I find myself drawn back to these words of Jesus from the Sermon on the Mount. This sermon—perhaps the most widely recognized teaching of Jesus—was delivered on the hills surrounding the Sea of Galilee. Standing there, it becomes immediately clear why Jesus chose this place. The hillside forms a natural amphitheater. The wind is gentle, the water calm. Creation itself seems oriented toward listening. I can imagine the people gathering to listen. People with expectations, with questions, with suspicion about what kind of message this could be. The anticipation among people who were struggling—fearful and anxiety-ridden about their future—ultimately pressing the question: “Where is God in all of this?” Jesus would soon reveal that God is among them already. Our tour guide emphatically made one thing very clear, and that was that we did not know exactly where Jesus stood to give this message, but we are certain it was on this hill and beside this water. You are standing in the footsteps of Messiah.

In 1936, construction began on the Church of the Beatitudes, completed two years later on that very hillside—a physical formation of Jesus’ words. Built in an octagonal design symbolizing the eight Beatitudes, the church overlooks the sea near Tabgha, resting atop the ruins of an earlier Byzantine structure. Formed from dark basalt and light limestone, the building carries both weight and contrast. Inside, the sanctuary follows the shape of the structure, with the altar placed at the center—constantly reminding worshippers that Christ is not on the margins, but at the center of all things.

That design teaches us something essential about the spiritual life. Before transformation comes **orientation**. Before action comes **posture**.

The Beatitudes are not merely ethical instructions; they are words of spiritual reorientation. When Jesus says, “Blessed are those who mourn,” He is not commending despair, but inviting honesty. Blessed are those who grieve the brokenness of their relationship with God. Blessed are those who recognize their need. This kind of mourning is not self-condemnation—it is the doorway to comfort.

Lent calls us into that posture. It asks us to stop managing appearances and instead face Christ at the center. To mourn what is disordered, fractured, or distracted in us. This humility does not weaken us; it prepares us. Consecration is not something we achieve through effort; it is what happens when our lives are rightly oriented toward Jesus and willingly placed before Him in surrender. To quote John Wesley: “I am no longer my own, but Thine.

” As Lent begins, the question before us is simple, but searching:

What are we facing—and how are we standing before God?

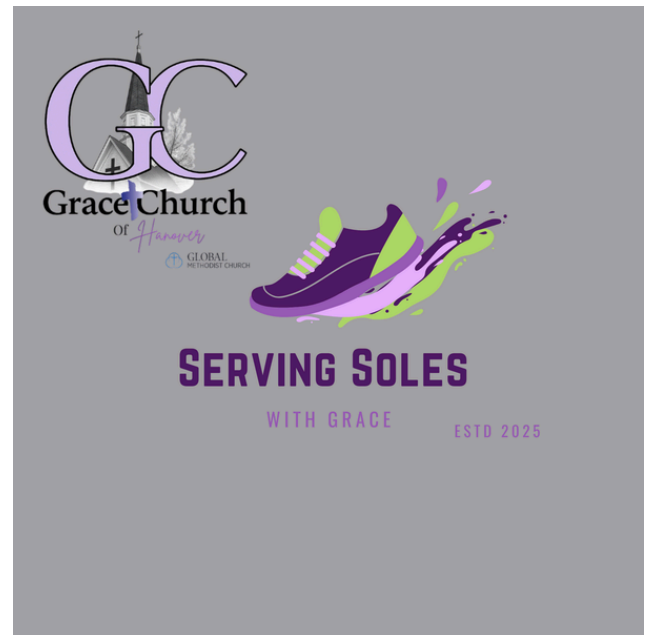

Theology Matters: Salvation is for Everyone

February has arrived, and the groundhog saw his shadow, which tells us that we will have 6 more weeks of winter. It's a funny tradition, but did you know that it is based in the Christian calendar? February 2 is the Christian feast of Candlemas, and it is the remembrance of the day that Mary and Joseph presented baby Jesus at the Temple according to the Law of Moses. The story can be found in Luke 2:22-38. It includes the Holy Family's interaction with the prophets Simeon and Anna. I encourage you to read it! But Pastor Matt, what does that have to do with the groundhog?

In ancient Germanic and Anglo-Saxon tradition, if the weather on Candlemas was bright and sunny, that meant that winter wasn't quite finished, well, wintering! However, if it was grey and cloudy, then it meant an early spring. In the Germanic countries, they would watch for the badger to emerge from his hole and see if he ran back again, realizing that winter was not yet through. When these Germans came to Pennsylvania, where no badgers dwell, they transferred the tradition to the groundhog, and thus, we have it to this day.

Now, on to deeper theological matters. Last month, I introduced you to five hallmarks of what it means to be a Methodist Christian. I suggested that our tradition had certain distinctives that were beneficial. The first was:

- The gospel is for everyone; everyone can be saved; everyone can know they are saved.

This also called the Methodist "Four Alls"

- All need to be saved
- All call be saved
- All can know they are saved
- All can be saved to the uttermost

This distinctive is unique to those churches that came from the work of the Wesleys (think Methodists, Pentecostals, Nazarenes). It stands over and against the tradition of the Calvinist/Reformed churches (think Presbyterian, German Reformed, United Church of Christ, or Baptist), and John Wesley spent much time in deep theological debate with Calvinist Christians. The historic title for the Methodist viewpoint is Arminian, named after the Dutch theologian, Jacob Arminius (1560-1609). The title tends to get hyphenated with Wesley's name to become Wesleyan-Arminian when people refer to it.

OK, so enough with the complicated names. What does all this mean?

The Wesleyan-Arminian perspective says that though human beings are, on their own, completely unable to save themselves, due to their sin nature, that God has granted grace enough to every human being so that he or she can hear the gospel and choose (or not) to repent. John Wesley called this Preventing or Prevenient Grace, and that grace is for "whosoever will," and that means anyone. Along with John 3:16, Wesley would point to John 1:9, "The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world." All people can receive the gospel and be saved. Everyone has a free choice to accept or reject Jesus thanks to God's free grace.

Theology Matters: Salvation is for Everyone continued

In contrast, the Reformed churches, who followed the ideas of John Calvin (1509-1564), teach that human beings are, on their own, completely unable to save themselves, due to their sin nature. However, God has foreknown and chosen those who would be saved “before the foundation of the world.” Those whom God elected are those to be saved. God then draws those from their sin with his irresistible grace. This perspective is based on Ephesians 1:4, 11-12, and 2 Timothy 2:10. Only God knows who the elect are, and in this, you might never be completely sure of your own salvation. Those who were not among the elect are not saved. This perspective is generally taught very strongly today in conservative Baptist and Presbyterian churches.

Turning back to our Methodism, Wesley would point to the assurance that Christ has saved us. In this, you can know with full confidence that Jesus has redeemed you and has begun a new life within you. We would point to Romans 8:15-17 for this truth:

For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you received a spirit of adoption. When we cry, “Abba! Father!” it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs: heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ, if we in fact suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him.

As you learn to live in Christ day by day, Christ’s work becomes deeper and stronger within your own character. We understand that through his continued work of grace, which Wesley would call Sanctifying Grace, we grow more each day into the image of God. For Methodists, salvation is not simply a change in eternal destination. Instead, it is a lifelong pursuit of Jesus Christ that builds a more holy character in each person. For us, eternity begins now, and our walk toward perfect love is our new journey. “The one who began a good work in you will continue to perfect/complete it until the day of Jesus Christ.” – Philippians 1:6.

It is my hope and prayer that as we remember that salvation is for everyone, that we will go out into the world excited to share Jesus with everyone. As we grow together in Christ, we will learn how much he loves us and be assured of that love through our whole lives.

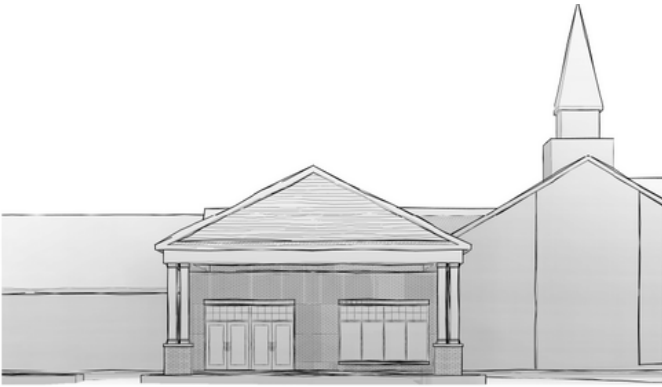

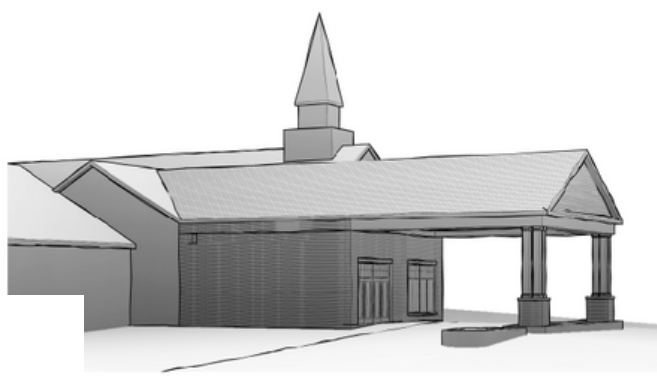

BUILDING COMMITTEE



The images show the proposed renovation and addition work for Grace Church. The darkened gray area is our new lobby with a covered opening for drop off and pick up. This will also include the repair and recoating of our parking lot.



The Committee has been hard at work over the last few months. First, the steeple repair project was a complete success! We removed the steeple, did some necessary repair and restoration work, which included the opening of the louvers once again. Then the steeple was returned to the roof and reattached in a way that will stop the leaks above the sound booth. All of this dangerous crane work happened without incident. Praise God!

Secondly, the plans for the new lobby and port-cochere have been nearly completed. We are now working with the contractor to secure solid bid numbers for the construction work. This new area will be a large, welcoming space for our church family, where we can mingle between services and greet one another well on Sunday morning. We will have a new location for the Welcome Desk and for an expanded coffee bar. The port-cochere will enable people to be dropped off at the door, under cover, and we will have new ADA compliant parking spaces to the left of the entrance, right in front of the building.

In the drawing here, you can see what the outside of the new building will look like, and we are all very excited to see this project move forward to construction in the coming months. 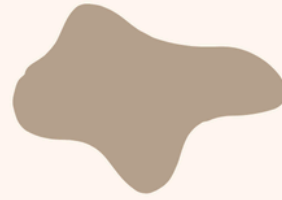
