



5-Day Devotional: The Simple Gospel

Day 1: God's Faithfulness Never Fails

Read: Romans 9:1-5; Genesis 15:1-6

Paul's heart broke for his fellow Israelites who rejected Christ, yet he never doubted God's faithfulness. Throughout history, from Abraham to Jesus, God kept every promise. Today, you may look around and see unbelief, division, or disappointment, but God's Word has not failed. His promises stand firm regardless of human response. Your salvation doesn't depend on your performance but on God's unchanging character. He who promised is faithful. When circumstances shake your confidence, remember: God has never broken a promise, and He won't start with you. His faithfulness transcends human failure and remains your anchor in uncertain times.

Reflection: What promises of God do you need to trust today, even when circumstances suggest otherwise?

Day 2: It's Not About You—It's About Jesus

Read Luke 9:23-25; Philippians 2:5-11

Our culture breeds radical individualism, even infiltrating our faith. We evaluate church by what we "get out of it" rather than how we honor Christ. But the entire biblical narrative—from Israel's preservation to the Messiah's arrival—centers on Jesus, not us. When you deny yourself, take up your cross, and follow Him, you paradoxically discover your true identity. You were created by God, for God, and only in relationship with Jesus do you become authentically human. Stop asking what God can do for you. Start asking what you can do for His glory. Make your life about Jesus, and watch how everything else falls into proper place.

Reflection: In what areas of your life have you made yourself the center instead of Christ?



Day 3: The Passion for Lost People

Read Romans 10:9-15; 2 Corinthians 5:14-21

Paul would have traded his own salvation if it meant his fellow Jews could be saved. When did we lose this desperation for lost souls? We've become comfortable, preferring convenience over the hard work of evangelism. But people around you are dying without Christ, destined for eternity separated from God. Every workplace, grocery store, and neighborhood is a mission field. Sharing the gospel is hard—it makes you different, separates you from the crowd. But hard things prepare you for harder things to come. Someone's eternal destiny may depend on your willingness to step out of your comfort zone today. Will you do the hard thing?

Reflection: Who in your life needs to hear the gospel, and what's preventing you from sharing it?

Day 4: Salvation by Grace Alone

Read Ephesians 2:1-10; Titus 3:3-7

Stop working so hard to earn God's love—you already have it. Salvation isn't achieved through good behavior, religious activity, or moral effort. You cannot buy it, earn it, or deserve it. God is love, so God loves you, period. The gospel is simple: confess Jesus as Lord, believe God raised Him from the dead, and you will be saved. Not might be saved—will be saved. God took all your craziness into account when He saved you. He redeems the dishonorable and makes it honorable for His glory. Rest in His grace. Stop striving and start surrendering. Your acceptance is already secured in Christ.

Reflection: Are you still trying to earn what Jesus already freely gave you?



Day 5: Unity in the Simple Gospel

Read Ephesians 4:1-6; 1 Corinthians 1:10-13

For centuries, Christians have divided over complex theological systems, losing sight of the simple gospel. When doctrine produces division rather than love, something has gone wrong. Jesus said the greatest commandments are loving God and loving people. The fruit of the Spirit includes unity, peace, and joy—not quarreling and division. Scripture interprets Scripture. Don't force alien paradigms onto God's Word. The gospel is clear: Jesus died, rose again, and anyone who repents and believes can be saved. Period. Let's stop fighting over secondary issues and unite around the primary message. Our world desperately needs to see Christians who love God, love His Word, and love people sacrificially.

Reflection: How can you promote unity in your church while maintaining biblical truth?
