Wednesday Night Live Class

For the Bible Tells Me So:

A Brief History of Biblical Scholarship and Translation

The Holy Bible is the central text of the Christian faith. The 66 books of the Old **and New Testaments represent God's Word, God's special revelation, and the saving knowledge of the person and work of our Lord Jesus Christ.**

Originally written primarily in Hebrew and Greek, the Bible has been translated into every language under the sun. Since the 16th century, there have been over 900 English translations of the Bible produced.

How did this hodgepodge collection of ancient texts make its way into the Bible that we know and love today? Who decided which books were included and which books were left out? Why are there so many different translations? Are some translations better than others?

Join Pastor Seth Saathoff as we explore these questions and more. During this class, we will examine the formation of the Biblical canon, the history of English translations of the Bible, the genesis of modern Biblical scholarship and textual criticism, and the challenges of modern translation.
