

## 5-Day Devotional:

### Day 1: Remembering Where We Came From

**\*\*Reading:\*\*** Ephesians 2:11-13

**\*\*Devotional:\*\***

Before Christ, we were all outsiders—separated from God, without hope, living behind walls of our own making. Paul reminds us to "remember" our former condition not to shame us, but to magnify grace. Like the Gentiles who were once "far off," we too were strangers to God's promises. But the blood of Christ brought us near. Today, reflect on your life before encountering Jesus. What walls separated you from God? What made you feel like an outsider? Gratitude grows when we remember the distance Christ crossed to reach us. You were once far off, but now you are brought near—not by your merit, but by His mercy.

### Day 2: Christ, Our Peace

**\*\*Reading:\*\*** Ephesians 2:14-16; Romans 5:1-2

**\*\*Devotional:\*\***

Jesus doesn't merely offer peace; He IS our peace. Through His body broken on the cross, Christ demolished the hostile barriers that separated us from God and from each other. The dividing wall in the Jerusalem temple once warned Gentiles away under penalty of death. Christ's death tore down that wall forever. What walls still stand in your life? Walls of prejudice, unforgiveness, or pride? Christ's peace isn't passive—it actively breaks down hostility. Today, ask the Holy Spirit to reveal any barriers you've erected between yourself and others. Remember, Christ didn't die to create comfortable isolation but to forge radical reconciliation. His peace demands we lay down our weapons of division.

### Day 3: One New Humanity

**\*\*Reading:\*\*** Ephesians 2:15-18; Galatians 3:26-29

**\*\*Devotional:\*\***

Christ didn't make Gentiles into Jews or Jews into Gentiles—He created something entirely new: the Church, God's redeemed humanity. In Christ, the categories that once divided us—race, economics, education, social status—lose their power. We become "one new man," unified not by human effort but by the Holy Spirit. This unity isn't uniformity; it's diverse people finding their identity in Christ alone. Examine your heart today: Do you view other believers as competition or family? Do cultural differences threaten you or enrich your faith? The world builds fences; Christ builds family. You're not called to tolerate other believers—you're called to embrace them as blood-bought siblings in God's forever family.

#### Day 4: Citizens and Family Members

**\*\*Reading:\*\*** Ephesians 2:19; Philippians 3:20-21

**\*\*Devotional:\*\***

"You are no longer strangers and foreigners." These words revolutionize our identity. Once outsiders, we're now citizens with full rights and privileges in God's kingdom. More than that—we're family members in God's household. Citizenship grants legal standing; family grants belonging. You're not merely tolerated in God's presence; you're treasured. You don't have to earn your place at the table; Christ secured it. Today, let this truth sink deep: you belong. You're not an interloper in the circle but a beloved child at home. When insecurity whispers that you're not enough, remember whose name you bear. When loneliness creeps in, remember whose family you're in. You are home.

#### Day 5: Living Stones in God's Temple

**\*\*Reading:\*\*** Ephesians 2:20-22; 1 Peter 2:4-5

**\*\*Devotional:\*\***

You are not an insignificant part of God's building project—you're a living stone, uniquely shaped and purposefully placed. God's temple isn't made of dead materials but living hearts where His Spirit dwells. Built on the foundation of Scripture with Christ as the cornerstone, this temple keeps growing as more stones are added. What's your role in this construction? Perhaps you're called to mentor, serve, pray, encourage, or provide practical care. Every stone matters; every gift counts. Today, ask God: "Where do I fit in Your temple? How can I support others in their place?" Don't compare your calling to others'. Your unique shape fills a space no one else can. You're not random—you're essential to God's dwelling place.
