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Pastor's Paragraphs

'Il admit that "homecoming" does not evoke strong emotions within me. Since I did not grow up in a local church, I did not get to experience the fried chicken, familiar faces, and seven-layer cake of a general homecoming experience.

I don't have any idea which church it was where I experienced my first homecoming service—honestly, I can't remember it at all (some of you must be thinking: "well, they must have not done it right.").

When I think of the church and home, however, my mind is not fully blank. You see, I moved around A LOT growing up. To this day, if you ask me my hometown, I will pause for a few minutes: "well, I graduated high school in Smithfield... but lived in Buies Creek for college as long as anywhere except Statesville..." I'll struggle to answer where my hometown is and often will just mumble "...well, you see, my mother was a nurse so it was easy for us to move..."

For many of you, "homecoming" evokes happy memories of luncheons and worship services sitting side-by-side alongside those who've been gone far longer than you've even realized.

For me, "homecoming" does not carry such emotions, but it does still carry strong memories.

I remember Olive Chapel Baptist, where I first entered a church of my own accord— and where I became a follower of Jesus. I remember New Horizons Church where I discovered that church could meet in a store-front and still offer Jesus, somehow. I remember Fairview Baptist where I was given the chance to lead in ways that I'd previously not in my fifteen years of life. I reflect on FBC

Smithfield where I found my calling toward higher theological education fostered. I reminisce about Bells Baptist, Baptist Chapel Baptist, Plymouth Church, Oakmont Baptist, Mosaic Church, and FBC Raleigh — places I would serve or worship that gave me the space to be the minister or lay leader God was calling me to be in that season.

You see, for me, the word "homecoming" does not evoke memories of any one place, but rather multiple places. Congregations where I was made aware of my calling, encouraged to explore it further, and given leadership opportunities to experience it first hand. I remember faces and the names of people who reminded me that God was always calling me to something more than I'd experienced to that point. I remember the desserts of grace with sides of encouragement.

Today, as we continue to seek where Christ is calling us as a congregation I know that, for many of you, "homecoming" brings you back to faces and places long gone. The memories might even evoke longings to go back to "the way it was." As someone who has been at BBC for only (almost) three years, I cannot share those feelings because I did not live them.

What I can fully say is that I know we follow a God who recognizes the fullness of the path we journey. I can say that I know that the God that guided your grandmothers and grandfathers and mothers and fathers is still guiding us today. I can say that the good news of Jesus has not changed as we move forward together.

I can also say that I know that Christ is calling us to a reality where "homecoming" is more than just memories— but also a challenge to ask "what's next?" How can we make this "home" even more Christ-like than it ever has been? This is our challenge. May we hear the God of immeasurably more calling us to home— but to oh, so much, more.



The View from Debbie's Desk

s I'm writing this. I'm a little emotional. As most of you know both of my parents passed away less than 2 years ago and only 6 ½ months apart. Today they would have been married 60 years. I had really been looking forward to celebrating their anniversary with them this year. 60 is huge to me. So special. They almost made it to 60 but no not quite. One good thing is that they're together now. They've had their homecoming. They are now with Jesus.

A little about how they became my parents. My birth mother got pregnant in the Army and was told she had to get out. She never told anyone who my birth father was. I've wondered if she even knew. She went home to Ohio to have me. Her brother (Lester) was living at home at the time. Mary (my birth Mother) went into labor and my Uncle Lester, and my grandmother took Mary to the hospital for me to be born. My Uncle Lester was there for me from the beginning. He was my rock. I could always count on him. He was my hero.

Mary had me before she was ready to have children. From what I've been told after I was born, she went a little wild. She married a guy and then had 5 more children. He ran away and didn't come back. She had 6 children to take care of on her own. I know that was tough. She used to pawn us off on her brothers and their families (she had 5 brothers), we would stay with them for a few weeks or months at a time. She always sent me to My Uncle Lester and his wife, Sandy's home. I stayed with them many, many times. When I was in 2nd grade, I stayed the entire year with them.

The summer before I started 5th grade Mary asked Uncle Lester and Aunt Sandy if I could go live with them again for a while. This time they told Mary that if I went to their home, it was to stay for good. That they wanted to adopt me. They told her that they loved me and that it was hard on them when I left. Mary didn't fight it. I went to live with them on

a trial basis. They told me that I had a choice of whether to live with them or not and that I would live with them until I decided. I was 10 and I was torn about what to do. I had loyalty to Mary and loved her, but you know how much I loved my Uncle! Plus, I had guilt about leaving my half brothers and sister. Some advantages living with my Uncle and Aunt were: I had food to eat every day, new clothes and a nice home to live in. There were rules but I liked that too. I came from a home with no rules. I found out that I liked the dependability of rules. Plus, they took care of me and made sure no harm came to me.

My Uncle and Aunt could see that I was struggling with my decision, so they sent me to spend a few days with my grandmother (Mary and Lester's mom) to decide. She convinced me that I would be better off with my Uncle and Aunt rather than my birth mom. We went to court. (Mary didn't show up to fight for me) I talked to the judge and then he ruled that the adoption could go through, and I was adopted that day. Uncle Lester and Aunt Sandy were now my Dad and Mom. I was officially home. It was where the Lord wanted me to be. It was my homecoming. I love both my Dad and Mom with all my heart. The Lord, of course, knew what was best for me and gave me the best parents anyone could ever ask for.




We need your help to make this event the best it can be! We are looking for:


