QUESTIONS FOR SMALL GROUPS & PERSONAL REFLECTION:

1) Read through the book of Jonah. As you do make a list of the verses where the following attributes of God are displayed: a) sovereign rule, b) holiness, c) almighty power and d) mercy and grace. 2) What were your thoughts / feelings about the story of US Army Chaplain Henry Gereke and the Nuremberg prisoners? Would you have answered the call to minister? Did you like the ending?

3) In the message it was stated that the parable of the prodigal son closely parallels the story of Jonah. Read the parables in Matthew 18:21-35 and 20:1-16 and consider how these also parallel Jonah. What are the similarities? What are the heart conditions that the LORD is trying to expose?

4) Towards whom do you harbor the anger of Jonah? To what have you assigned too much value? What does repentance look like?
