

THE GIFT WE NEED EVERY WEEK

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Beginning this Lent, we will celebrate the Lord's Supper every Sunday. This is not a change made lightly, nor is it meant to turn Lent into something it is not. Rather, it flows directly from what Lent is, and what the Sundays in Lent, and every Sunday, most certainly are.

Lent is forty days long. That number matters. Forty days recalls Israel's wandering, Moses on Sinai, Elijah's journey, and our Lord's forty days of fasting and temptation. Yet if you count the days from Ash Wednesday to Easter, you will notice something curious: there are actually forty-six days. Why? Because the Sundays in Lent are not counted as part of Lent at all. They never have been.

Sundays are always celebrations of the resurrection. Even in the most penitential season of the Church Year, when the Alleluia is set aside, and our eyes are fixed on Christ's journey to the cross, each Sunday stands as a "little Easter." The fast pauses. The tomb looms in the distance, but the risen Christ still meets His people.

And how does the risen Christ come to us? He comes with gifts. Holy Communion is not our sacrifice to God, but God's gift to us: the true body and blood of Christ, given and shed for you for the forgiveness of sins. We need this gift often because we are sinners often. We are weak often. We are burdened, tempted, anxious, and worn down by the world, our flesh, and the devil, often.

Weekly Communion is not about doing "more church." It is about receiving more mercy. It is about being fed by Christ Himself, who knows exactly what His people need on their journey through repentance and faith. In the Lord's Supper, Christ strengthens faith, forgives sin, comforts troubled consciences, and binds us to Himself and to one another.

Lent reminds us of our sin and our need for repentance. The Sundays in Lent remind us that repentance is never an end in itself. It always leads us back to Christ and His gifts. That is why, even as we walk the road to the cross, we gather each Sunday around the altar, to receive the very life Christ won for us there.

In the midst of a somber season, the risen Lord still says, "Take, eat... Take, drink." And it is good, indeed, necessary, that we receive all of God's gifts as often as He gives them.

THROUGH THE CHURCH YEAR: WHY DO WE CELEBRATE LENT FOR SIX WEEKS?

Don't forget what Lent is all about! It is a time when we are reminded of what Jesus gave up for us, and a time when we look forward to and prepare for His death and resurrection!

During these forty days of Lent, we remember the faithfulness of God to His people and how His faithfulness is complete in Jesus Christ, our Savior. Jesus remains faithful to us, always being where He promises to be: in His Word and Sacraments.

To the Parents: Continue to encourage your children in their Lenten preparation. During worship, point out the places where our Lord comes to us (i.e., God's Word, Holy Communion, Holy Baptism, Holy Absolution). Remember that being their example and companion on this Lenten journey makes a difference!

We celebrate Lent for six weeks. Not counting Sundays, this adds up to forty days. These forty days remind us of Christ's temptation in the wilderness (Matt. 4:1-11). There He was without food for forty days. We remember the temptation of the Israelites in the desert after the Lord had delivered them from Egypt. This lasted forty years (Num. 14:34). Finally, we can remember the story of Noah and his family. After forty days and forty nights in the ark, it finally stopped raining, and the Lord delivered them just as He promised. (Gen. 7:17).

HEROES OF FAITH: ST. POLYCARP OF SMYRNA

Each month, we will highlight one of the many heroes of the Christian faith who have stood firm in the truth of Holy Scripture. We will look at the apostles who knew our Lord Jesus Christ personally, his friends who were witnesses to His miracles, the faithful ancestors of the Old Testament who patiently awaited His first Advent, as well as the many other Godly men and women who have been bold witnesses throughout the years, to the one true faith. We look to them not as people to be worshiped or prayed to but as ordinary sinners, like us, to whom the Holy Spirit gave faith to be extraordinary. They are holy because the blood of Christ forgave their sins. They are holy because the Holy Spirit gave them a living faith in which the love of Christ shone through.

On February 23rd, the Church remembers St. Polycarp of Smyrna, pastor and martyr.

Polycarp was a disciple of the apostle John and served faithfully as bishop of Smyrna for many years. In a time of persecution, false teaching, and fear, Polycarp remained steadfast in the apostolic faith, shepherding Christ's flock with the Word of God. In his old age, Polycarp was arrested and ordered to renounce Christ. When urged to deny Jesus and save his life, Polycarp famously replied, "Eighty-six years I have served Him, and He has done me no wrong. How can I blaspheme my King who saved me?" He was burned at the stake, confessing Christ to the end. We remember Polycarp not for his courage alone, but for the faith God sustained in him. His martyrdom proclaims the same truth he preached: Jesus Christ is faithful unto death, and His cross is stronger than the fires of this world.




NEXT MEETING



THE LUTHERAN CONFESSIONS: ARTICLE XIX

THE CAUSE OF SIN



Article XIX, entitled, *The Cause of Sin*, may at first glance seem to be unnecessary. Is an explanation of such a basic doctrine really needed? Although there was no disagreement on this doctrine between Catholics and Lutherans at that time, many errors have been spread about the cause of sin.

When we discussed Original sin (AC II), we traced sin back to the fall of Adam and Eve. But this article causes us to go back even farther. The sin of Adam and Eve in the Garden was caused by the seduction of the devil in the form of a

serpent (Genesis 3:1-5). The apostle John makes it clear that the serpent who deceived Eve was the devil, "So the great dragon was cast out, that serpent of old, called the Devil and Satan, who deceives the whole world" (Revelation 12:9). As a result of the temptation by the devil, many people will be lost, condemned to hell. For this reason, Jesus describes him as a murderer (John 8:44).

AC XIX begins by declaring God is not the cause of sin, rather the devil and our own sinful flesh is the cause: "Our churches teach that although God creates and preserves nature, the cause of sin is located in the will of the wicked, that is, the devil and ungodly people. Without God's help, this will turns itself away from God, as Christ says, "When he lies, he speaks out of his own character" (John 8:44).

Polls show well over half of American adults deny the existence of the devil! Even the majority of professing Christians deny that the devil is a real personal being! Scripture is clear about the existence of the devil and his purpose. Scripture warns that the devil is dangerous and on the prowl (1 Peter 5:8-9), deceitful and crafty (2 Corinthians 11:3), he disguises himself to look good (2 Corinthians 11:14), and is at work in the world leading people into all kinds of sin (Ephesians 2:1-2).

Those who think the devil is not real, and he is only a symbol of evil, are ignorant and foolish (1 John 5:19). He is the very source of evil and sin in the world, and his primary goal is to lead people away from God and away from the true knowledge of Christ as our Savior from sin.


The devil and his evil angels are even at work, leading people away from the truth by introducing error into the teachings of the visible church (1 John 4:1-3). The devil is also at work through the Anti-Christ to lead people from the truth (2 Thessalonians 2:3-4, 8-10).

The devil is very real and a dangerous adversary for every human being. The reality of the devil and his role in connection with sin does not excuse sin or relieve human beings of our responsibility for it. Despite the work of the devil, our guilt and our responsibility for sin remain.

Some would like to make God responsible for sin. But God's will is in complete opposition to sin and the devil (Psalm 5:4-6). Although God hates sin, He does permit sin and evil in the world. God allows evil to come upon unbelievers and believers alike. No one is immune from the effects of sin, but at times, we might wonder why God allows bad things to happen to His children. One example is Job, who God allowed to be tested by the devil to strengthen his faith. James reminds us God is not to blame for troubles in our life, "Let no one say when he is tempted, 'I am tempted by God'; for God cannot be tempted by evil, nor does He Himself tempt anyone. But each one is tempted when he is drawn away by his own desires and enticed" (James 1:13-14).

Much more could be said about sin and its cause. Knowing the devil is very real, and he is after us, can at times cause us to despair. By ourselves, we don't stand a chance against the attacks of the devil and the struggles with our own sinful flesh. Our sin already condemns us! But do not lose hope! (1 John 3:8).

At times, we may feel powerless against the devil, but the LORD has given us all we need to defend against his attacks. Paul tells us to trust in the Lord, our defender (Ephesians 6:10-11). Thanks be to God whose Word defends us from the attacks of the devil, and keeps us on the narrow way. May He continue to be with us until the end!

SENT IN LOVE

Recently, a letter was mailed to members of our congregation who have not attended worship in a year. I want the entire congregation to understand why this letter was sent and, just as importantly, the spirit in which it was written.

This letter was not sent out of frustration, pressure, or judgment. It was sent out of deep pastoral concern and Christian love. As Christians, we confess that God has chosen to care for His people through means that are concrete and personal: the preaching of His Word, the forgiveness spoken in His name, the water of Holy Baptism, and the true body and blood of Christ given in the Lord's Supper. When members are absent from the Church's gathered life for extended periods, it is not simply a matter of attendance; it is a matter of spiritual care.

Out of that concern, I reached out personally to let those members know they are remembered, prayed for, and always welcome. I share the letter here so that the congregation can see for themselves that its tone is warm, gentle, and inviting:



Grace, mercy, and peace to you in Christ Jesus.

As we begin a new year, I have been praying for you and thinking about the members of our congregation whom I have not seen for some time. I write to you not out of disappointment, but out of deep pastoral love and genuine concern for your faith and life in Christ.

Our Lord knows how easily we are pulled away by the weight of life, busy schedules, hardships, disappointments, and even quiet struggles that others may never see. Yet Christ has not withdrawn from you. He continues to come to His people in concrete, life-giving ways: through His Word proclaimed, through the forgiveness spoken, through the water of Holy Baptism, and through His true body and blood given for you in the Lord's Supper. These Means of Grace are not rewards for the strong, but gifts for the weary, the struggling, and the burdened.

If there is something that has been keeping you from church, something painful, difficult, or unresolved, I would very much welcome the opportunity to visit with you, listen, and walk with you as your pastor. And if you have found another Christian congregation where you are regularly hearing God's Word and receiving His Sacraments, I would be grateful to know that as well.

Please know this: you are missed, you are prayed for, and you are always welcome. My hope and prayer is that this new year might be a time of renewed life together around Christ and His gifts.

Adopting a Seminarian


