



## Council Meeting Minutes

from Nov. 24, 2025

- Pastor Steve opened the meeting with prayer. October minutes were revised.
- Discernment Team: Sara Smoker reported that a church treasurer has been selected - David Mueller - and a church council secretary - Sara Smoker. They will start after approval by a congregational vote at the Annual Meeting in January.
- Vision Team: Jesse Mueller reported that the Covenanting and Anointing Service will be January 25, 2026. The pastor review is complete for 2025 and results will be shared in the December or January council meeting.
- Care Ministry: Steve said in their meeting they talked about cares in the church. Marilyn Schrag is going off the ministry and Marylin Balzer will be going off at the end of the year.
- Hospitality Ministry: Kaitlen/Brocia reported that there will be a ladies/girls brunch on December 6, and a New Year's Eve activity at 7 p.m. with a white elephant gift exchange and games, etc. The youth group is planning to go to Snow Camp (Feb 13-15) and would like to have a fundraiser lunch on January 25 at the Annual Meeting to help with expenses.
- Mission Ministry: Dwight reported that approximately 300 people (including takeout) were served at the Mission Supper. Approximately

\$5900 was donated (before expenses taken out). Everence matching funds are still available. Dwight encouraged people to submit an application.

- Nurture Ministry: Debbie reported that the fall mission offering will be used for 4 Angel Tree names. The remainder of the money will be used to provide a meal for the Health and Rehab staff. Kaitlen and Casey attended the WDC Kids Meet Christ Workshop, which focused on how to include kids in worship. An adult Bible study will possibly start January 14, 2026. Children's Christmas program practice will be December 3 and 10. The program will be December 14.
- Stewardship Ministry: Treasurer's report - Larry reported a budget balance of \$2022.50 at the end of October. James reported that they received 2 bids from roofing contractors and have approved one. Work on the roof won't start until next summer (no leaks at this time). James also reported they have been working on budgeting for next year. Mick Bean joined the stewardship ministry.
- Worship Ministry: Steve reported that they are working on Advent readings and cleaned up the choir room.
- Pastors Report: Steve reported that he attended a preaching master class at Bethel.
- Council continued membership discussion from the October meeting. More discussion in December and possibly voting on adding an addendum or changing the constitution to add covenant members.
- The next council meeting will be December 15, 2025. The Annual Meeting is January 25, 2026.


### Adult Bible Study

This month features Kyle, Tia and Lucy since they moved to Halstead in 2021.


